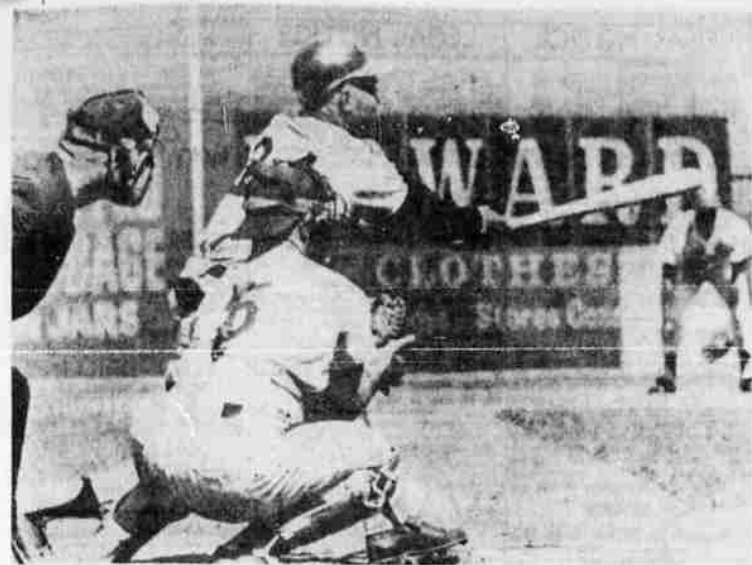

Renfro Comes On Strong As Ducks Down Beavers

CORVALLIS (UPI) — Oregon track fans don't have to worry. Mel Renfro is coming on strong. Renfro won the 120-yard high hurdles in 14.0 and the broad jump in 25-6 1/2 as the Ducks defeated Oregon State 80-53 in a dual meet Saturday.

The efforts were the best of the year for the star junior, who had been beaten three times in the high hurdles and had done only 20-0 in the broad jump this season.

Sophomore Dave Blunt also was a double winner for Oregon, taking the 1000-yard dash in 9.8 and the 220 in 21.7. He ran the final leg in the Ducks' winning 440-yard relay team.

Keith Forman, the Ducks' star senior miler, beat sophomore Morgan Groth in 4:03.3. Groth was timed in 4:03.9. Archie San Romani of the winners came in third in 4:04.9.

Other standout performances for Oregon came from Dave Steen, who won the shot put in 60-6, and Paul Stuber and Terry Llewellyn, who tied for first in the high jump at 6-10 1/2.

Oregon State's Norm Hoffman ran away from Ray Van Asten of the Ducks in the 880-yard run. His time was 1:30.4. Van Asten was second in 1:31.5.

Oregon, defending NCAA champion which hasn't lost to Oregon State in a two-way meet since 1948, will meet the Beavers again at Eugene May 30.

The Ducks compete against Washington at Eugene and the Beavers take part in the West Coast Relays at Modesto, Calif., next Saturday.

Wilson Sees Strong Olympic Squad

SÃO PAULO, Brazil (UPI) — Kenneth L. (Tug) Wilson, president of the United States Olympic Committee, said today that only about 25 per cent of the U.S. athletes who helped win a near-record 109 gold medals in the Pan-American Games will compete in the 1964 Olympics.

While not wishing to downgrade the athletes who performed here, Wilson said that in view of what was shown in the Pan-American Games he was willing to predict that Uncle Sam's team in the next Olympic games "will be the strongest ever."

The Pan-American Games ended Sunday with the United States taking the final two gold medals for a fine harvest of 109—only 11 short of the record 120 won at the last Pan-American Games at Chicago four years ago.

"Under the circumstances our showing here was better than it was four years ago," Wilson pointed out. "You have to remember that for the Chicago games we had all our top athletes available."

Many U.S. stars could not make it here for the São Paulo games because of studies and business commitments. When the competition was held in Chicago, the top college athletes were in their summer vacation period and the other top ones, through college and in business, could arrange their vacations to coincide with the games.

"I am not downgrading this year's team," Wilson stressed. "But let's face it, a lot of our best athletes could not make it here. That's why I feel we did very well—better than I expected. Our performances here convinced me we will have our strongest Olympic team ever in Tokyo in 1964. Believe me, our team in Tokyo will be a lot stronger than the team we had in Rome."

There were legitimate reasons for Wilson's optimism, for the United States did surprise in men's and women's gymnastics, a sport in which the Russians have been far superior than their American counterparts.

Then, too, Pete McArthur's victory in the 10,000 meter run gave room to hope that perhaps the United States was capable of coming up with a top-grade long-distance runner, something the

Ducks, USC, Indians Win Dual Meets

Track powers Southern California, Stanford and Oregon took dual meet wins over traditional rivals Saturday in a day without many upsets.

USC defeated UCLA for the 31st straight time 99-46 as the Trojans held UCLA's great C. K. Yang to 14 points.

The decathlon ace took wins in the broad jump and pole vault and had a second in the javelin and third in the high hurdles. Yang won the pole vault at 15 feet 8 and then missed three tries at a world record.

USC got a double win from Rex Cawley in the 440 and intermediate hurdles and Bob Pierce and Brian Pokingborne both ran 14.1 in the hurdles to edge Yang at 14.2 in the day's best race.

Stanford's Dave Weill broke NCAA stadium meet and school records when he tossed the discus 193 feet 2 inches against California Saturday at Berkeley. The Cards rolled 92-53 in the 6th Big Meet against California.

Cal's Todd Gaskill hit the best college triple jump of the season, 49 feet 11 1/2 inches.

Cal's Roger Olsen won the high jump and javelin, but Stanford's Larry Questad captured both hurdles and a second in the triple jump.

Oregon downed Oregon State 80-53 at All America football star Mel Renfro ran the highs in 14.0 and broad jumped 25 feet 6 1/2 inches.

Keith Forman ran the mile in 4:03.2 to edge the Beavers' Morgan Groth (4:03.9) and Ducks Archie San Romani Jr. (4:04.7).

Washington State's mile relay team galloped 3:19.1 in the rain to give the Cougars a 74-71 win over the Washington Huskies.

Think you've heard everything? Then just listen to those incredible Chicago Cubs talking pennant!

Ernie Banks started the ball rolling this spring when he first planted the idea that the Cubs could win and now the notion is starting to take root among some of the other Chicago players.

Naturally, the Cubs aren't claiming any pennant yet but they are saying it's possible. And you know something? It is—the way they're playing now.

They climbed to within 1 1/2 games of the National League lead Sunday by completing a three-game sweep against the Milwaukee Braves, 5-2, for their sixth victory in the last seven starts.

Would Be A First

Sudden thought: Wouldn't that be a gasser if they did win? They'd become the first major league club ever to win the pennant without a manager. Bob Kennedy officially is still listed as "head coach" although he's carrying out all managerial duties.

Anyway, Ken Hubbs supplied what proved to be the winning run Sunday with a fifth inning sacrifice fly that scored Lou Brock. Merritt Ranew's first homer of the year gave the Cubs their first run off loser Tony Cloninger in the third inning and Ranew then singled home another run in the fourth. Cal Koonce was the winner although Jim Brewer and Lindy McDaniel both were summoned in from the bullpen in the ninth.

Giants, Mets Split

Elsewhere in the NL, the Los Angeles Dodgers downed the first-place Pittsburgh Pirates, 7-3; the San Francisco Giants split a doubleheader with the New York Mets, winning the opener, 6-3, and losing the nightcap, 4-2; Philadelphia beat Houston, 6-5, in the first game but dropped the second one, 6-2, and Cincinnati took the opener from St. Louis, 5-4, then lost the 10-inning nightcap, 7-4.

In the American League, the Minnesota Twins thumped the New York Yankees, 4-1; the Chicago White Sox blanked the Washington Senators, 8-0, but lost the nightcap, 8-7; the Boston Red Sox edged the Kansas City A's, 3-2; the Cleveland Indians defeated the Los Angeles Angels, 4-3, and the Detroit Tigers crushed the Baltimore Orioles, 12-4.

Homer Scuttles Pirates

Pinch-hitter Lee Walls' three-run homer in the ninth powered

the Dodgers to victory over the Pirates. Walls connected off reliever Harvey Haddix, who took over for loser Vern Law, making his first start of the season after being recalled from the minors. Reliever Ron Ferranowski was credited with his fourth victory.

Willie Mays' three-run homer in the first inning and Felipe Alou's two-run poke in the fourth helped the Giants stretch their winning streak to six games in the opener before Carl Willey of the Mets ended the string with a seven-hit effort in the nightcap.

A Polo Grounds' crowd of 53,830—the majors' largest of the season—saw Jack Sanford strike out 10 for his fifth victory in the first game. Cliff Cook hit a two-run homer in the nightcap. The Colts blew a 5-0 lead to the Phillies in the opener but won 18 to them last year.

Something's bugging Camilo Pascual.

It isn't anything that is keeping him up nights, but it's something that has been in the back of his mind since he entered the American League 10 years ago.

The 29-year-old Minnesota curve-baller is determined to compile a winning lifetime record against the New York Yankees.

Call it pride, self-satisfaction or what you will, the classy Cuban right-hander says he won't be satisfied until he achieves his goal.

"Not many people realize it,

but my record against the Yankees once was 0-10," Pascual points out.

Today his lifetime record against them is a much more respectable 11-18.

He beat the Yankees, 4-1, with a slick six-hitter Sunday to register his third straight route-going victory of the season following three straight losses.

Strikes Out Eight

Turning in his finest performance of the campaign, Pascual struck out eight, walked only one and gave up the Yanks' only run when Roger Maris banged his third homer in the seventh inning.

By that time, however, the Twins already had scored two of their runs off Ralph Terry, who suffered his third straight loss after winning his first three. Lenzy Green tagged him for a homer in the first inning and Vic Power doubled home another run in the third. The Twins tagged Luis Arroyo for their last two runs in the eighth.

The Chicago White Sox blanked the Washington Senators, 8-0, in the opener of a doubleheader but dropped the nightcap, 6-7; the Boston Red Sox nipped the Philadelphia Phillies, 7-3; the Cleveland Indians shaded the Los Angeles Angels, 4-3, and the Detroit Tigers bombed the Baltimore Orioles, 12-4.

Dodgers Beat Pirates

In the National League, the Los Angeles Dodgers beat the Pittsburgh Pirates, 7-3; the Chicago Cubs defeated the Milwaukee Braves, 5-2; the San Francisco Giants beat the New York Mets, but lost the second game of a doubleheader, 4-2; Philadel-

phia downed Houston, 6-5, in the opener but dropped the nightcap, 6-2, and the Cincinnati Reds defeated the St. Louis Cardinals, 5-4, in the first of two, then suffered a 7-4 setback in the 10-inning nightcap.

Tom Cheney of the Senators lost his first game of the season after four straight victories when the White Sox rapped him for six of their eight runs during the four innings he worked in the opener. Dave Nicholson tagged him for a two-run homer as Ray Herbert (3-1) stopped Washington on three hits.

Chuck Hinton's three-run homer with two out in the ninth inning of the nightcap earned the Senators a split. Hinton's homer was his fifth of the season and capped a five-run rally off Mike Joyce and loser Hoyt Wilhelm. Reliever Jim Hannan was the winning pitcher.

Home Runs Pace Boston

Home runs by Frank Malzone and Chuck Schilling carried the Boston Red Sox to their victory over the A's. Malzone connected

off loser Orlando Pena (4-1) and Schilling off reliever John Wyatt. Rookie Dave Morehead won his second game without a defeat although he needed help from Dick Radatz in the eighth.

Dick Donovan scored his second victory for the Indians but Barry Latman had to bail him out when the Angels rallied for two runs in the ninth. Joe Adcock homered for the Tribe off loser Bo Belinsky (1-4) in the second and rookie Max Alvis drove in what proved to be the winning run with a double in the seventh.

Bill Freehan, the Tigers' \$100,000 bonus catcher, enjoyed a perfect day against the Orioles by driving in five runs with his first two major league homers and a double. The Tigers routed Dick Hall during a six-run burst in the fifth. Tom Sturdivant, obtained from Pittsburgh only 24 hours earlier, relieved Detroit starter Phil Regan in the fifth and held the Orioles scoreless on three hits the rest of the way to gain the victory.

Scowling Jack Nicklaus Tops Tourney Of Champs

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI)—Scowling Jack Nicklaus, with three of Arnold Palmer's 1962 titles already tucked away in his golf bag, goes after a fourth this week when the Colonial Invitational opens at Fort Worth.

Using power and putting for birdie ammunition, Nicklaus torped the field by five strokes in winning the \$60,000 Tournament of Champions Sunday to strip Palmer of one of his most coveted titles.

Earlier this year Jack took away Palmer's all-important Masters title, and before that he captured Arnie's Palm Springs Classic crown.

Nicklaus, who loves nothing better than to beat his stablemate, had rounds of 64-68-72-69 for a 273 total to finish the five shots in front of Palmer and Tony Leima, who tied for second with 278.

Wins \$13,000

For the victory, Nicklaus collected \$13,000 in silver dollars and boosted his earnings for a little more than four months of play to \$52,713.

Leima, who ground out a beautiful six-under-par 66 on the final round, is second in the money-winning list with \$32,496 to his credit, followed by Palmer with \$31,375. They each got \$5,300 Sunday.

Nicklaus was 13 under par for the tournament played on the Desert Inn Country Club course. "I probably won the tournament on the par fives," said Nicklaus. "Of the 16 par fives holes, I had three pars, one eagle and 12 birdies. That's 14 under right there."

Nicklaus was outdriving everyone in the tournament by an average of better than 10 yards per hole. Palmer shook his head in puzzled fashion.

"He's getting just too strong off the tees," said Arnie. "He

Chateaugay's Derby Victory Labelled 'One Of Easiest'

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (UPI)—Chateaugay's Kentucky Derby victory was called one of his easiest races today by trainer Jim Consigny, who added, "All he needs is rest and a little exercise to get ready for the Preakness."

Never Bend, who went to the front at the start, finished second, a length and one-quarter back of Chateaugay, with Candy Spots only a neck behind him.

Their trainers offered no excuses and plan to "go on to Baltimore."

"I thought Never Bend ran a fine race. If we had it to run over again I don't see how it could be run any different," said

Woody Stephens, who trains the Cain Roy Stable colt.

Owner Harry F. Guggenheim agreed, adding, "I was surprised but delighted for I can't think of a finer man to get a Derby winner than John Galbreath."

Some Blame Shoemaker

Mesh Tenney, who trains Candy Spots, the Derby favorite, for Rex Ellsworth, had no complaints. Some observers thought jockey Willie Shoemaker did a poor job aboard Candy Spots.

"Candy Spots ran at those horses but didn't get to them," was the way Tenney summed up his colt's performance.

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
