"Many men over 40 have an ostrich complex," says Dr. Seth M. Kerron, adviser of the Klamath County Tuberculosis and Health Association. "When it comes to a question of their own health, they frequently act just like ostriches and run to bury their heads in the sand. Or, more likely, the sandtrap," Dr. Kerron said.

The doctor has reached this conclusion because so many people take for granted two common danger signals: chronic cough and shortness of breath. These symptoms may be signs of serious but hidden respiratory diseases—sicknesses of breathing.

"Men over 40 must learn to take chronic cough and shortness of breath as seriously as their business problems," warns Dr. Kerron.

Officials Reorganizing Treatment Of Juveniles

ALTURAS—The effort to limit juvenile delinquency in Modoc County is being given a boost with reorganization of treatment of juvenile lawbreakers by the city and county officers.

Modoc County undersheriff, John Haggeman, and Alturas city police officer, John Layton, have been appointed as county and city juvenile officers. They will supplement the juvenile investigations formerly handled by the probation officer, Uel Marr.

Superior Judge Charles Lederer said, "We are striving to eliminate many of the potential troublemakers before they get to the courts. With our new method, we are in hopes that with the cooperation of parents and the juvenile officers, we can stop the tendency of a young person toward mischief at the first signs."

Probation Officer Marr lauded the new setup saying, "It will certainly allow me to devote more time to helping with our correction and guidance. Believe me, it is next to impossible to convince a youngster that I want to help him when I am the one who cited and hauled him in, in the first place."

The newly adopted procedure, which is aimed at parents also accepting the responsibility of the troublemakers, will function in an entirely new way.

Juvenile officers will henceforth issue citations to all juvenile offenders, and a non-criminal record on juvenile offenders will be maintained at the sheriff's office. It will be available to officers only and will readily determine whether a youngster is a casual or habitual offender. It will provide a basis for determining whether or not there is an area of

parental neglect. From these records it can be determined whether or not the youth and-or their parents should be cited in court. This citation method, officers hope, will avoid a continuing duplication of leniency.

Officer John Haggeman pointed out, "It's not an unusual situation to have an officer stop and release a youngster for a minor violation on Monday, another officer stop him on Tuesday, and still another officer stop him on Saturday. And the youth can go merrily on his way committing minor violations of the law just as long as he does not consistently run up against the same officer. The new procedure will change all of that."

This new system will go into effect immediately.

Boys from grades eight to 12 are eligible for two trail camps to be conducted by the Klamath County YMCA, July 25 to 28, and Aug. 8 to 11.

Ten boys and two adult leaders will go into the mountain wilderness area for three days, carrying all their gear in packbags. The campers will explore, fish, camp out and cook their own meals.

The destinations and equipment will be planned at a meeting of all interested boys on Wednesday, May 8, at 7 p.m. in the YMCA.

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Solons Okay Philippine Damage Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Senate negotiators gave in today and accepted a House plan for paying Philippine war damage claims to individual claimants but barring fees to lobbyists who pushed the bill.

They agreed to a compromise retaining the basic form of the 1962 claims law and scraps a Senate-approved rider to pay the \$73 million maximum involved directly to the Philippine government.

The measure, however, bars any payment in a claims case to any "corporation, association, firm or other individual or party whatsoever."

No claimant could receive his money until he certified that he was not paying anything to any agent.

The provision was written into a \$1.5 billion catch-all supplemental money bill. The Senate-House conferees also agreed on all other differences. Rep. Albert Thomas, D-Tex., chief House conferee, said he hoped to bring the bill before the House later today.

The Senate had voted overwhelmingly to pay the claims money directly to the Philippine government after disclosures that Washington lobbyists, including attorney John A. O'Donnell, stood to reap huge fees from the present law.

The Senate Foreign Relations Committee also disclosed that O'Donnell made campaign contributions to more than 20 members of Congress in 1960 while lobbying for the present act.

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Surface Oiling Studied For Winnemucca Highway

ALTURAS—The possibility of surface oiling the last 100 miles of dirt highway on the Winnemucca to the Sea Highway, between Denio and Alturas, is in sight, according to the Modoc County Chamber of Commerce manager, A. F. Van Horn.

Van Horn reported Thursday that application has been made to the Federal Bureau of Public Roads for a \$250,000 appropriation to complete 48 miles of road in Humboldt County and 52 miles in Washoe County.

"In recent meetings with the highway commission in Sacramento, Senator Kuchel and Congressmen Engle and Johnson have shown every cooperation in getting the road paved," Van Horn said.

"Final approval of the funds lies now with the federal appropriations. In order to hurry along the completion of this highway, that should bring a great increase in the travel through our county, everyone should help. What we need is the personal

touch, and that means individual letters to our congressmen to give the final push."

Completion of the Winnemucca to the Sea Highway has long been the aim of Modoc County men who see this shortcut as one means to boost the sagging economy of the county. The new highway would divert a great portion of travelers from the east to the north through Alturas. Tourist travel is one of the mainstays of summer income in Alturas.

Van Horn said if approval for the oiling of the now graded and gravelled highway comes through soon, it is possible to complete the work this summer.
