Fidel Tours Stalingrad

VOLGOGRAD, U.S.S.R. (UPI)—Cuban Premier Fidel Castro toured this war-torn city formerly named Stalingrad today on the first stage of a provincial tour that will take him from the Ukraine to Siberia.

Castro is expected to visit Leningrad in the north, the Ukrainian capital of Kiev, the central Asian city of Tashkent and several Siberian cities before he returns to Moscow May 23.

The bearded Cuban spent the weekend talking politics with Premier Nikita Khrushchev at a hunting lodge outside Moscow. Details of their talks were not revealed, but the topics discussed presumably included the question of increased Soviet military and economic aid for the Castro regime.

Khrushchev did not go to the airport in Moscow to see Castro off for Volgograd, but Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko, Defense Minister Rodion Malinovsky and Mikhail Suslov of the Presidium (politburo) were on hand.

Local Revenue Increase Seen

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy's tax program would increase state and local tax revenues in Oregon by about \$34 million, the Treasury Department estimated today.

Of the total increase, the treasury said, about \$21 million would be in state tax revenues—a 10 per cent increase and \$13 million in local revenues—a 7 per cent boost.

The treasury said the tax program would increase consumption and investment and result in the addition of \$9 million to state income tax revenues, \$3 million to sales taxes, \$3 million to license taxes and \$2 million to other revenues.

The increase in local taxes would result from higher property tax receipts, which provide 98 per cent of local tax revenues in Oregon.

Attitudes, Future Theme At Home Ec Council

"Attitudes and Your Future" was the theme of the 31st annual meeting of the Oregon Home Economics Extension Council held on the Oregon State University Campus in Corvallis, April 30 and May 1-2. A group of 783 homemakers from Oregon attended the conference, with 11 from Klamath County, reports Mrs. Ruth G. Dyer, county extension agent.

The conference opened with an international dinner on Tuesday, when foreign students attending OSU gave their impressions of family living in the U.S. Mrs. Riddell Lage, president of the Oregon Home Economics Extension Council, gave a report on the triennial meeting in Australia which she attended as a delegate from Oregon.

The banquet Wednesday evening featured Dr. Gerald Wallace, superintendent of Schools in Corvallis, who spoke on "The Key To The Future." He said the key to the future is to teach our children the value of responsibility.

He emphasized that as adult leaders we must plant roses in place of thistles. The conference concluded with a business meeting on Thursday morning. Closing remarks were made by Dr. Lillian Van Loan, professor of psychology, southwestern Oregon College, who spoke on "The Hub of the Wheel."

She said the hub is the homemaker and the spokes of the wheel the attitudes she displays. She related that women must lead three lives, learning to be a woman, living as a mother, wife, homemaker, and invest, enrich, satisfying experiences.
