

Annual Session Plans Tabled By Committee

SALEM (UPI) — Three resolutions calling for annual legislative sessions were tabled Tuesday by the House Constitutional Revision Committee.

The proposed new constitution approved Monday by the House gives the legislature authority to go to annual sessions.

The House committee then approved three proposed constitutional amendments which could become a part of the new constitution if it is adopted.

One would permit motor vehicle fuel taxes and motor vehicle taxes to be used to purchase mass transportation rights of way.

The second would permit the legislature to set minimum standards of municipal employment.

The third would authorize a city of 100,000 or over to consolidate with the county.

The proposed constitutional changes require two-thirds approval in both the House and Senate before they can be submitted to the voters.

The committee continued hearings on changes which would outlaw the death penalty and require persons sentenced to life in prison for first degree murder to serve at least 15 years before release on parole.

Chairman John Dellenback, R-Medford, delayed a vote on the proposals at Tuesday's meeting because one member was absent.

Warden Clarence Gladden told the committee that the death penalty should be retained for police and prison guard killers.

Dellenback said he wanted to take action on the proposals at Thursday's meeting. Both already have been approved by the Senate.

Relay Sends Weak Signal

NEW YORK (UPI) — Despite weak signals received at a French tracking station, Telstar II, the newest communications satellite is very much on course, a spokesman for American Telephone & Telegraph Co. said today.

Once it is in orbit, "a satellite doesn't get off course," the spokesman said. "It just continues to go around and around." He traced weak signals received Tuesday night at Pleumeur Bodou, France, to an "insignificant slant range and attitude" of the satellite.

The "slant range" of Telstar II, or its distance in space from tracking stations, was especially great Tuesday night he said. This, he added, will improve as the satellite's orbit changes in relation to tracking stations on earth.

The "attitude" of the "bird," he said, had put its antenna for receiving signals on the far side of the satellite. Thus scheduled transmissions tests for a pass of the Telstar were cancelled early today.

The gleaming space vehicle, launched Tuesday at Cape Canaveral, Fla., had a trajectory "as close to normal as any we have had to date," according to Robert H. Gray, a spokesman for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

Flying Wife Takes Rest

SUVA, Fiji (UPI)—Betty Miller, 36, the flying Santa Monica, Calif., housewife, took a brief rest today before leaving Suva on the final lap of her 7,100-mile solo flight from California to Australia.

She landed her twin-engine plane at Nandi International Airport here after a flight of 8 hours and 27 minutes from tiny Canton Island, 1,250 miles away.

Mrs. Miller indicated she would rest at Suva for about 12 hours before continuing her bid to become the first woman to fly the long transpacific route alone.

Her final flight to Brisbane, Australia, by way of Noumea will be 1,475 miles over water.

Mrs. Miller is following approximately a reverse course of that plotted by famed aviatrix Amelia Earhart on her ill-fated 1937 flight. Miss Earhart and copilot Fred Noonan disappeared in the Central Pacific.

Honolulu was Mrs. Miller's first stop on her flight from Oakland, Calif., which started April 30, and Canton Island the second.

N. H. Bogue Rites May 9

Nathan Herschel Bogue, 60, well-known Merrill rancher, died Monday, May 6, in Klamath Falls. He had been a resident of Klamath County for 46 years.

Funeral services will be held Thursday, May 9, at 10 a.m. from O'Hair's Memorial Chapel, with Rev. Ralph Richardson of the First Methodist Church officiating. Interment will follow in Klamath Memorial Park.

Born June 10, 1882, in Northfield, Minn., Mr. Bogue was graduated from the University of Minnesota, School of Engineering, in 1905. He was married in 1907 and came to Klamath County in 1917 with Robert C. Strawn and the OCE Railroad.

Mr. Bogue purchased a ranch, two miles south of Merrill, in 1919, where he lived until about 10 years ago when he and Mrs. Bogue moved to 545 Pacific Terrace in Klamath Falls. He continued to operate the ranch until the time of his death, making the trip to Merrill daily.

Survivors include his wife, Isabelle, this city; daughter, Mrs. George (Mary Ellen) Clark, this city; son, Richard G. Bogue, Tucson, Ariz.; five grandchildren, and one great-grandchild.

Free Cuba Group States Principles

A Citizens Committee for a Free Cuba (CCFC) has been set up in Washington, D. C. Impressively, it is sponsored by a score of notable Americans.

CCFC is nonpartisan. The committee is likely to develop considerable political muscle, however. Its sponsors are such as to win the confidence of the American people if CCFC can make itself heard.

Vol. 1, No. 1 of CCFC's Free Cuba News (FCN) was distributed under date of May 4, a modest, eight page, mimeographed pamphlet edited by Daniel James from 617 Albee Building, 1416 G Street, N. W., Washington 5, D.C.

Emphasis appears to be on Cuba. But the committee's interest embraces the whole of Latin America.

Urgent Matter
CCFC is sparked by several ideas and convictions of much urgency:

That there is urgent need for an effective U. S. Cuban policy embracing a method of freeing the island from communism.

That the enslavement of 6 million Cubans may now lead to the enslavement of 200 million persons in the remaining 19 Latin American republics.

That the Communist achievement in Cuba and plans for the other 19 republics are wholly part

of an offensive designed to enslave the United States.

That communism is making such progress in Latin America that there may be other Cubas there before long.

Implicit in the CCFC program is the conviction that the Kennedy administration does not now have an effective U. S. Cuban policy. If CCFC gets the attention of the U. S. public, the Kennedy administration will find itself under a punishing non-partisan attack.

The political consequences could be very great. It already is evident that the 1964 Republican presidential and congressional campaigns will make Cuba a major issue.

Situation Termed Grave
The first issue of FCN asserted that the overall situation in Latin America is much worse than the American people realize.

"The Communist drive there," said FCN, "is already on the way to producing these series of consequences:

"Demoralization of Latin America's democratic forces.

"Resurgence of dictatorial military elements intent on taking power in reaction to the Communist threat.

"Infiltration and subversion of other Latin American governments.

"Frustration of inter-American efforts to achieve social and economic progress."

Issues Summarized
FCN summed up things thus:

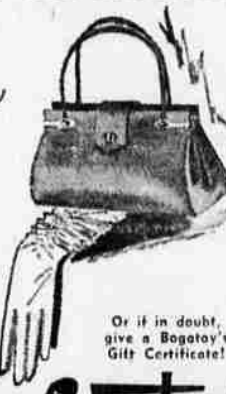
"If not halted before much more time has passed, the Communist drive south of the Rio Grande could result in the gradual isolation of the U. S. from its friends and allies in Latin America—the reverse of the effort to isolate Communist Cuba.

"The object of Free Cuba News is to publish news about Cuba, and about the growing Castro-Communist infiltration of Latin America, which is not now finding its way into existing news media. The American people when given the facts, will make up their own minds what to do about them."
