Death Takes M. Sheridan

Mrs. Margaret Sheridan, 48, Klamath Falls matron long prominent in civic and school affairs, died unexpectedly Wednesday at approximately 7:45 p.m.

She apparently collapsed while talking on the telephone in her home on Miller Avenue. The Peace Ambulance Service was called at 7:30 p.m. and reported her dead on arrival at Hillside Hospital.

Born Margaret Hawkins in Minneapolis, Kan., on March 6, 1915, Mrs. Sheridan came to Klamath Falls around 30 years ago. She and her husband, Earl Sheridan, married in 1935, celebrated their 28th wedding anniversary in March.

Mrs. Sheridan was well-known for her participation in the Parent Teacher Association on both the local and state levels. She was president of the Shasta PTA, Alameda PTA and County Council PTA, and served as regional vice president and state recording secretary of the Oregon Congress PTA.

A member of numerous school legislative committees, she had been a member of the Klamath Union High School Board of Directors for eight years. Her current term was to expire in 1965.

At one time, Mrs. Sheridan was a member of the TB Board and the Child Guidance Board and was active as a United Fund worker. She was also instrumental in promoting the Intercommunity Hospital project. For her outstanding contributions to the community, she was named Woman of the Year by the Soroptimist Club.

Sheriff Enters Not Guilty Plea

Sheriff Murray "Red" Britton, appeared with his attorney before Judge Donald A. W. Piper in Circuit Court No. 1 at 10 a.m. today, and pleaded not guilty to causing a prisoner to escape from official detention. Judge Piper set 10 a.m., Monday, July 22, as the time for the trial.

The entry of plea was witnessed by some 60 people who gathered in the courtroom to observe the brief proceedings. Sheriff Britton was indicted by the grand jury April 30 in connection with the case of Oregon vs. a local man charged with the embezzlement of an animal.

The defendant was apprehended by the state livestock inspector and released to the custody of Sheriff Britton for confinement in the county jail last March 16. Although the prisoner did not post bail, he was released from custody by Sheriff Britton, the indictment charges.

KU Board Composition Uncertain

The composition of the Klamath Union High School Board of Directors is uncertain due to the untimely death Wednesday of board member Mrs. Margaret Sheridan and a ruling from school attorney George Proctor that C. O. Borsting won't be a member of the board until July 1.

Oregon State law for a union high school district reads that a school board director who moves out of the district he was serving in shall serve only until the next annual election.

This is interpreted by Proctor to mean that Borsting legally served only until May 6.

Unless Borsting cares to contest the opinion, the board is now until Lou Kellison is sworn in, comprised of Chairman John D. Voth, Charles Houston and Steve Walker.

The board apparently can function with three members, making a quorum. If one member, however, could not attend a meeting, no official action could be taken by the remaining two directors.

A special meeting of the board was called for 4 p.m. today, Thursday, to discuss the appointment of a board member to fill the late board member's chair. The school board is authorized to make such an appointment.

It is not known, however, whether a quorum will be present at the meeting.

2,200 Negroes Arrested During Alabama Crisis

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (UPI)—A slinky truce threatened to break down today before all factions could reach agreement on a plan to end the racial crisis which has resulted in violence and the arrest of 2,200 Negroes in this Deep South steel city.

A 250-man force of highway patrolmen, augmented by approximately 400 plainclothesmen carrying sidearms, apparently was in control and able to enforce law and order.

Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and the Rev. Fred Shuttlesworth, two top Negro leaders in the desegregation campaign here, said they were hopeful a solution to five weeks of demonstrations could be found by 1 p.m. EDT.

A bi-racial committee met again Wednesday night but made no announcement of results. The big problem in a settlement appeared to be among the Negro leadership, sharply divided as to whether full scale demonstrations should be resumed today.

The racial truce, after which all major demonstrations were called off Wednesday while last minute details of a permanent agreement were discussed, almost fell apart in the late afternoon when King was lodged in jail for the second time in less than a month.

The Atlanta integration leader and the Rev. Ralph Abernathy, another top officer in King's organization, were sentenced to 180 days in jail and fined \$100—the maximum punishment—for violation of an ordinance requiring a permit to parade.

Businessman Raises Bond
Bond for King, Abernathy and R. V. Fulton, a white professor, was set at \$2,500. For most of their 24 associates who got the same penalty bond was only \$500.

Negro businessman A. G. Gaston put up bond for King and Abernathy who returned to their motel and went immediately into long telephone conferences with associates on their next move.

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The action sent the sex offender bill, one of a package of six, to the House floor for action.

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Russian Missiles On Cuba Concern Senate Committee

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A Senate subcommittee expressed "grave concern" today that Russian missiles may be hidden away in the myriads of caves in Cuba.

The group also said in a report on an investigation of Soviet military activities on the island that 17,500 was "perhaps a minimum figure" for the number of Russians still there.

President Kennedy has estimated the number at about 13,000. The preparedness subcommittee included in its censured 34-page report a strong attack on the Central Intelligence Agency for "failing" to evaluate information received before and since the October missile crisis.

For one thing, the subcommittee said, the CIA seemed to take too optimistic a view of the situation. The report said intelligence officials apparently refused to accept reports that Russian missiles had been sent to Cuba until reconnaissance planes took pictures of them in mid-October.

Want On-site Inspection
Although intelligence officials now say they are convinced the offensive weapons have been taken out, the report added, there is no "absolute assurance" of this.

The subcommittee said that only through a "thorough, penetrating on-site inspection by reliable observers" can it be ascertained for certain that strategic missiles are not stashed away in Cuban caves and elsewhere.

The subcommittee frowned on "a disinclination on the part of the intelligence community to accept and believe the ominous portent" of information gathered since last October's missile crisis, particularly data provided by Cuban refugees.

Some refugees have repeatedly insisted that missiles and possibly long-range Russian bombers are hidden away in Cuban caves.

Stress Russian Danger
The Senate group said the Cuba situation still rates the "highest possible priority" by government officials. It said a Russian takeover in other parts of Latin America "will be achieved... unless positive steps are taken to prevent it."

The subcommittee said "The paramount danger at this time is that the nations of the hemisphere may be subverted one by one and be exploited, in turn, for subversive revolutionary activities."

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Soviets Bar Trial News

MOSCOW (UPI)—The Soviet Supreme Court today barred press and public during testimony by expert witnesses on the importance of secrets allegedly slipped to the West by an English businessman and a Soviet scientific official.

Tass news agency said the court heard two witnesses, identified as A.P. Dolgikh and V.V. Etrochenko, and "experts' conclusions with the regard to the degree of secrecy of the information collected and transmitted by the accused to foreign intelligence services."

Tass said the trial will resume open sessions Friday.

It was the third day of the trial of Greville Wynne, 42, and Oleg Penkovsky, 43. Both face a possible death penalty on charges of funneling Soviet economic, political and military secrets to American and British agents during 1961 and 1962.

Wynne has testified he merely acted as a courier and did not know the contents of the information he got from Penkovsky. In open court Wednesday he claimed he had been duped and coerced into working as a British spy.

Penkovsky insisted that Wynne knew exactly what he was doing and what was in the information.

The substance of the secrets they allegedly handled was not made public on the ground of security.

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Actor Who Duped Nazis In World War II Dies

LONDON (UPI)—An actor whose greatest role may have helped win World War II died here Wednesday.

Mayrigh Edward Clifton James stood in for Field Marshal Bernard (now Viscount) Montgomery and in a masterpiece of wartime impersonation is believed to have hoodwinked the Germans into thinking the D-Day invasion had been postponed.

Coincidentally, James' death, at 65, came on the 18th anniversary of V-E Day.

"He performed a very useful purpose at a very dark time of the war," Montgomery said Wednesday. "What he did completely fooled the Germans."

"He did a very good job, and fooled the Germans at a very critical time of the war," the field marshal said. "I am very sorry to hear of his death."

At the time of his great impersonation, the Australian-born James was a pay corps lieutenant in the British army and Montgomery was commander of the 21st Army. An intelligence major

spotted the likeness between the two men.

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But none of his theatrical roles ever matched his real life wartime impersonation.
