Job Openings Increase In Klamath Falls Area

The number of job openings received by the Klamath Falls office of the Oregon State Employment Service increased during April, Leonard T. Sytma, local office manager, reported Thursday.

The number of applicants placed also increased and the rate of insured unemployment took a slight jump at the end of the month.

There were 422 claims for unemployment insurance initiated or reopened during April as compared to 269 during the month of March. However, only 3,100 weeks of benefits were claimed in April as compared to 3,257 during March.

Unemployment is somewhat above the level of one year ago, Sytma said.

There were 225 job openings this April compared to 274 a year ago in March, 1962, there were 202.

The rate of insured unemployment was 8.8 per cent compared to 8.2 per cent four weeks ago and 6.6 per cent one year ago.

Sytma said this is the period of the year when the seasonal change from relatively high unemployment to high employment normally occurs. This has been delayed somewhat by bad weather this year.

As the weather improves, the rate of unemployment is expected to drop with a corresponding increase in employment. It is expected that the month of May will produce a rather dramatic change in the local labor market.

Mail Box Use Limits Noted

The Klamath Falls Post Office recently received complaints regarding the placing of advertisements and literature of political or semi-political nature in mail boxes.

All available matter must bear postage at the applicable rate, a proper address, and must be deposited in mail boxes by authorized postal personnel or the owner of the box.

The citizens of the community are cautioned against individual placing material in any mail box other than their own since this is in violation of United States statutes, Harold Hicks, acting postmaster, indicated.

Jury Finds Pair Guilty Of Larceny

A circuit court jury deliberated three hours and 25 minutes before returning a verdict of guilty against Perry Chocktoot, 20, and Wilbur Hixon, 42, charged with the larceny of a mare, it developed Thursday afternoon in the court of Judge David R. Vandenberg.

The vote was 10-2 for the guilty verdict with two of the nine women serving on the panel opposing the majority decision.

The verdict was returned to Judge Vandenberg at 3:38 p.m. Thursday, during the seventh day of the trial. The jurist will set the time for sentencing at a later date.

Chocktoot and Hixon were indicted by the grand jury March 13 for complicity in the theft of two colts belonging to a rancher in Beatty. Theft of the livestock was reported last year to sheriff's deputies who solved the case early this spring.

Astronaut Gets Ready

CAPE CANAVERAL, FL (UPI)—L. Gordon Cooper Jr., 36, whisked through a rehearsal Wednesday of the voyage that, if all goes well, will send him 22 times around the world starting next Tuesday morning.

Cooper, in the midst of last-minute preparations for what shaped up as the most ambitious manned flight into space ever undertaken by the United States, was due for more rehearsals today and Friday.

Then, if the schedule holds firm, Cooper and his back-up pilot, Mercury teammate Alan B. Shepard Jr., will enter the seclusion of Hangar 8 on Cape Canaveral sometime this weekend for the last medical checks and final hours of waiting.

Cooper is scheduled to blast off into space aboard a silver Atlas rocket on a 34-hour journey that will take him 575,000 miles around earth — further than all previous U.S. manned space flights combined.

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Red Space Try Speed Predicted

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy, defending his new space program, predicted today that Russia will stage "spectacular efforts" in space during the next few months.

The President said his budget was the minimum needed to keep America in the rocket race with Russia.

Kennedy made the forecast in an exchange with a former Eisenhower administration official who asked why the President was proposing a \$4.5 billion over-all budget increase above the current fiscal year's level.

The questioner was Dr. Gabriel Hauge, former President Dwight D. Eisenhower's special assistant for economic affairs.

Hauge raised the issue when the President threw himself open to questions after speaking on behalf of his tax cut program to the Committee for Economic Development.

In his speech to the committee, composed of some 200 corporate executives and educators, the President said his proposed \$10 billion tax cut—plus federal expenditures which will mean a budget deficit of about the same amount—are "of the correct magnitude to help bring the economy close to full employment within the next two years."

The President praised the CED for generally agreeing on the need for cuts in corporate and personal taxes and for recognizing the role that federal expenditures could play in bolstering the economy.

Hauge countered that the CED had called for keeping expenditures at the fiscal 1963 budget level of \$94.3 billion.

Strike Ruled As Illegal

PORTLAND (UPI) — Circuit Judge Alan Davis Wednesday declared a strike by Local 90 of the Masters, Mates and Pilots Union against a Delaware shipping firm was illegal.

The judge also issued a temporary injunction against picketing the S.S. St. Christopher, which is berthed here. The vessel is owned by Olga Konow, Inc.

The company is seeking a permanent injunction and more than one-half million dollars in damages from the local and three of its members.

Judge Davis upheld the firm's contention that the Association Maritime Officers are bargaining agents for the ship's deck officers. He said the dispute was between the two unions and should not involve the company.

Taxes Pay For School Breakages

NEW YORK (UPI)—There's a subject high on the schedule of many school executives but not part of the curriculum: How to let light in and keep rocks out.

A survey published in Overview, a trade magazine for school executives, covering 516 school districts in 46 states, led to an estimate that the American school district taxpayer will shell out about \$40 million this year to replace school windows broken by young vandals.

The survey was conducted by the magazine for Owens-Corning Fiberglas Corporation, maker of shatterproof windows. Some of the material turned up on breakage indicated that it was not merely a big city problem, although the figures run up to \$1 million for New York City, biggest of them all.

The survey showed that cities in the 10,000-50,000 population range spend an average of about \$6,000 a year to replace shattered windows.

About half the schools replying to the survey—45 per cent—leave lights on at night. About 25 per cent use additional screenings; 21 per cent replace conventional glass with nonbreakable material.

Large school districts find most window breakage is intentional. A few reported that in areas around school buildings, they take care to keep rocks picked up.

Psychologist License Bill Passed By House

SALEM (UPI) — Oregon would join 23 other states where a person must be certified to call himself a psychologist under a bill passed 52-8 Thursday by the Oregon House.

Rep. C. R. Hoyt, R-Corvallis, told the house, "We cannot delay or Oregon will become a haven for those not allowed in other states."

The measure is designed to protect qualified psychologists while preventing quacks from fooling the public by using a psychologist's title.

The measure would require a psychologist to have a degree plus two years of practice before he could be certified by a board appointed by the governor.

The bill must return to the Senate for concurrence in House amendments.

Debate in the House centered on the relationship between a psychologist, who is not a medical doctor, and a physician of psychiatry, in the field of psychotherapy.

Rep. Morris Crothers, R-Salem, a doctor, told the House, "This bill does not authorize a psychologist to practice medicine."

Rep. Fritz Chaimard, R-Portland, wife of an orthopedic surgeon, objected to part of the bill.

"There is no justification for giving an ancillary group the privilege of getting into the practice of medicine through the back door," she said.

The attorney general of Idaho recently said such plans were illegal in his state.
