

Seashore Park Feared Injurious To Industry

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Spokesmen for industry expressed concern Thursday that establishment of an Oregon Dunes National Seashore would hurt industry in the area.

The fears were voiced before the Senate Interior Committee by J. H. Klingberg, an attorney representing the International Paper Co., and E. C. Anders, manager of the pulp and paper division of the Menasha Corp.

The industry spokesmen and J. H. Klingberg, of the Coos Bay Chamber of Commerce, testified on legislation introduced by Sen. Maurice B. Neuberger, D-Ore., to authorize creation of the park.

Klingberg said the International Paper Company had not and "still does not wish to take a position for or against the creation of a national seashore on the Oregon coast."

However, he said, because of the company's investment in a sawmill and plywood plant at Gardiner it was "understandably concerned with legislation which could adversely affect the future of its expanded Gardiner operations."

He said the company had been assured by Oregon that the state would amend its laws and make other concessions in order to get it to establish its plants at Gardiner. He asked assurance that the proposed park would not endanger the commitments.

Anders said the park would block proposed expansion at an indefinite date of Menasha's \$7 million paperboard plant in the dunes of Coos Bay and urged elimination of land south of Ten-mile creek from the park.

JFK Pledges To Review Dam Project

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy promised Thursday to take another look at a proposal for federal construction of Mountain Sheep dam on the Snake River between Idaho and Oregon.

Kennedy made the promise during a question and answer period with members of the Committee for Economic Development, a private group of about 200 corporate executives, educators and businessmen.

The President's remarks were made in answer to a question in which it was suggested that construction of the project by a private power company was being blocked by federal opposition.

Kennedy said he favored private development of power sites such as the Mountain Sheep site unless the federal government could do the job better. However, he said, the "burden of proof" should be on the government.

"If a private company can develop a site and provide a service more satisfactorily than the federal government, then the private company should go ahead," Kennedy said.

"Indeed, as I said," he continued, "I would put the burden of proof upon the federal government to prove either that the site will not be adequately developed, that the service would not be satisfactory, and that only the federal government can do it before I would support the project."

Tongue Point Sale Halted, Morse Says

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Tongue Point Naval Station site at Astoria will not be sold to the highest bidder June 24, Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., said he was assured Thursday.

Morse said Democratic members of the Oregon Congressional delegation met with two Kennedy Administration officials Thursday to discuss disposal of the abandoned base.

Morse previously had protested to the White House that the General Services Administration planned to receive bids on the site in June. He said he understood the base was not to be sold until next fall and then only if the administration failed to find a use for it.

Ralph Duncan, special assistant to the President, told Morse that publication of the advertisement for bids was unfortunate because it did not make clear that the property won't be disposed of until later this year, or perhaps not at all.

Duncan and GSA Administrator Bernard Boutin said receiving bids in June would be helpful to the government because it would indicate the value private purchasers put on the site, Morse explained.

ALTURAS—Modoc County farm adviser, Norman Nichols, appeared before the Modoc County supervisors Monday to present a certificate declaring the county to be a "Swine Validated Brucellosis Free Area."

The certificate was issued by the State Department of Agriculture as a result of recent testing of all swine herds in the county. This testing program is one part of the overall effort by the state to eradicate brucellosis in California.

Grim Fishing Forecasted

A somewhat grim weekend faces anglers on the Winema National Forest according to District Rangers. Trout fishing has been slow on the Chilquin District this past week. The one exception has been the Sycan River below Torrent Springs, where some good catches have been reported. The Sprague River above Chilquin is high and roily and few fish are expected to be taken.

The recent storms have made many of the roads impassable on the forest, and the saturated ground is hazardous for vehicle travel anywhere off the surfaced roads.

It is suggested that fishermen stay on the paved or cindered roads to avoid costly expenses involved in rescue work, and serious erosion damage to forest roads.
