

First Annual Friendship Day For Area Women Originated By Klamath Stake Relief Society

The Klamath Stake Relief Society of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints will sponsor its first annual Friendship Day on May 14.

The purpose of the event is to foster friendship between Relief Society members and other church women in the community, and to inform the public of the society's activities.

Invitations have been issued by members to their friends, but all interested women in the area are invited to attend. Child care will be provided, and mothers are asked to bring sack lunches for children.

Relief Society members participating in the Friendship Day will represent churches in Lakeview, Tulelake, Chiloquin, Dorris, and Klamath Falls, all areas included in the Klamath Stake.

Mrs. Collina Hassell of Ashland, Stake Relief Society president, will preside over the day's activities, which will begin at 10 a.m. in the LDS Church, Home and Martin. Lunch will be served at 12 noon.

Each society will be responsible for a section of the program. The Klamath Falls First Ward Relief Society will present the theology lesson, and the Second Ward will be represented with several selections by its vocal group, The Singing Mothers. The Singing Mothers, open to all members who express an interest in music, is directed by John Argente and accompanied by Mrs. Otto Ludwig.

Highlights from this year's various fields of study will also be dramatized as part of the program. All Relief Societies meet each week of the month and follow a planned schedule of projects. Construction Of Lutheran Church Building Okayed

LAKEVIEW — Architectural bids for labor will be called as soon as working plans are received from the architect, W. H. Yahn of Portland. R. H. Kerr is the building chairman.

Dimensions of the building will be 74 feet in length by 44 feet in width, with a full basement. The chapel will seat 120 persons and the choir loft, 40. The ground level will also provide a study for the minister and a classroom. Located in the basement will be a large social hall, kitchen, classrooms, a meeting room, and storage space.

The exterior of the building will be finished in cedar, with the roof reaching a peak in an inverted curve symbolic of praying hands.

Pastor And Missionary Slate Talks

Local Minister Receives Degree

At the 36th annual commencement exercises of the Western Conservative Baptist Theological Seminary on May 5, the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity was conferred on Rev. Freeman L. Schmitt by Dr. Arthur Whiting, dean of the seminary.

In addition to this honorary degree, Dr. Schmitt, pastor of the Bible Baptist Church, holds three other degrees. He received his R.A. from Coe College of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and his Th.B. and B.D. degrees from Northern Baptist Seminary in Chicago, Ill.

The citation read at the commencement exercises, held in the Hinson Memorial Baptist Church in Portland, noted that Dr. Schmitt has held two pastorates, with both churches experiencing

a phenomenal rate of growth and development. He was minister of a church in Muscatine, Iowa, for ten years and has held the position at the Bible Baptist Church here for eight and a half years.

The citation also recognized Dr. Schmitt's achievements in the field of summer Bible Camps. Under his direction two such camps have been erected; one in Iowa, and in this area the Mountain Lakes Bible Camp near Lake of the Woods.

Dr. Schmitt has given leadership to the Conservative Baptist

movement on both the state and national levels. He has served as moderator of the Conservative Baptist Association of Oregon; as a board member of the Home Mission Society; and as a trustee of the Western Conservative Baptist Seminary.
