Business Elite Confer On Politics, Economics

HOT SPRINGS, Va. (UPI)—The elite of the business community gathered today to talk politics and economics in the conference rooms and on the golf courses of this Allegheny Mountain resort.

The occasion was the spring session of the Business Council, composed of business, industrial and financial leaders who advise the government on domestic and international issues.

The direction and emphasis of the discussions were expected to be affected by the atmosphere on cautious cordiality that seems to be growing between business and the Kennedy administration.

The list of speakers for the three-day meeting included Chairman Walter H. Heller of the Council of Economic Advisers, Presidential assistant Ralph A. Dungan, and Christian A. Herter, special presidential trade adviser.

Theme Of Optimism

Sen. Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash., and Pennsylvania Gov. William W. Scranton, a Republican, were scheduled to deliver the main addresses at the evening sessions.

Unlike some previous council meetings, all signs indicated a theme of economic optimism and confidence.

The council membership includes the presidents of the biggest and most powerful corporations in the United States. About 100 businessmen were here for the work-and-play session.

The council's loyalty in the past has been with the Republican Party which hasn't prevented President Kennedy from energetically trying to win its confidence.

Economy Perking Up

The meeting this year is being held at a time when the economy is showing signs of a spring burst of energy which everyone hopes will end nearly a year of sluggish business growth.

The record so far is much better than either business economists and administration experts predicted when the group met here last autumn.

The gross national product (GNP) for the first three months of 1963 was estimated at an annual rate of \$572 billion—up about \$8.5 billion from the previous quarter.

The GNP is the total value of goods and services and is the traditional yardstick for measuring economic growth.

Normal Pair Said 'Dull'

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (UPI)—A team of psychiatrists said today that if you think you are a normal married couple, chances are you're "dull."

The team reported to the 119th annual convention of the American Psychiatric Association on a survey of 50 ninth grade boys who proved to be perfectly normal.

Twelve years later, the psychiatrists said, they surveyed these same men and their wives. The couples were well-adjusted and satisfied with their position in life.

"Such a population would promote stability or a firm backbone of the country," said Dr. Jules S. Golden, associate professor at Albany, N. Y., Medical College and one of the team members.

But he added he had "mixed feelings" about the situation.

Golden said he felt the couples' lives were "essentially mundane and dull." They had little imagination and few interests.

Dr. Reuben Silver, a psychologist at the college, and Dr. Nathan Mandel, of the Minnesota Department of Corrections, joined Golden in the survey they made in Minneapolis, Minn.

One of the tests the authors used in their survey was to ask the couples what they would do with \$5 million. In general, the couples said they would buy a house or invest the money. This, the psychiatrists, said showed a lack of imagination.

State Okays Poll Tax Ban

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Missouri Thursday became the 34th state to approve the anti-poll tax amendment, but there was only a slim chance that four more states would ratify the measure and make it part of the U.S. Constitution this year.

But the outlook for obtaining final approval of the 24th Amendment to the Constitution in January was considered excellent.

Sen. Spessard L. Holland, D-Fla., chief sponsor of the amendment to ban the poll tax in federal elections, said he was confident the remaining states needed to reach the required 38—or three-fourths—would ratify before their legislatures adjourn this year.

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Needy Hunger As Legislature Debates

CHICAGO (UPI)—Thousands of needy families faced at least a week of hunger today in a deepening of Illinois' relief crisis.

The state legislature, deadlocked in a fight over ceilings on aid payments, recessed Thursday for another four-day weekend without reaching agreement.

The Illinois Public Aid Commission (IPAC) has run out of funds for its aid to dependent children and general assistance relief programs. The legislature battle has blocked an emergency appropriation.

A Republican state senator, in a parting blast at Democratic opposition to the GOP aid limits, said the state was being "too soft" on welfare recipients.

The Woodlawn organization, headquartered on Chicago's South Side, planned to picket Republican party offices in the Loop today.

Hundreds of families turned to settlement houses and private welfare agencies for food, but authorities said supplies were running low and appealed for more donations.

Before the legislature quit, the executive director of the Chicago Federation of Settlements said "If the legislature doesn't act today, we've had it."

"The pressure really hasn't come yet," said Clarence Boebel. "We're looking for the real pressures to build up over the weekend."

He said settlement houses usually feed three or four families a week. With public aid checks held up, he said, some houses fed as many as 20 families Thursday.

The Salvation Army and Catholic Charities also doled out free food and eight federal government agencies in Chicago started "Operation Canned Goods," a drive to collect staples for emergency assistance.

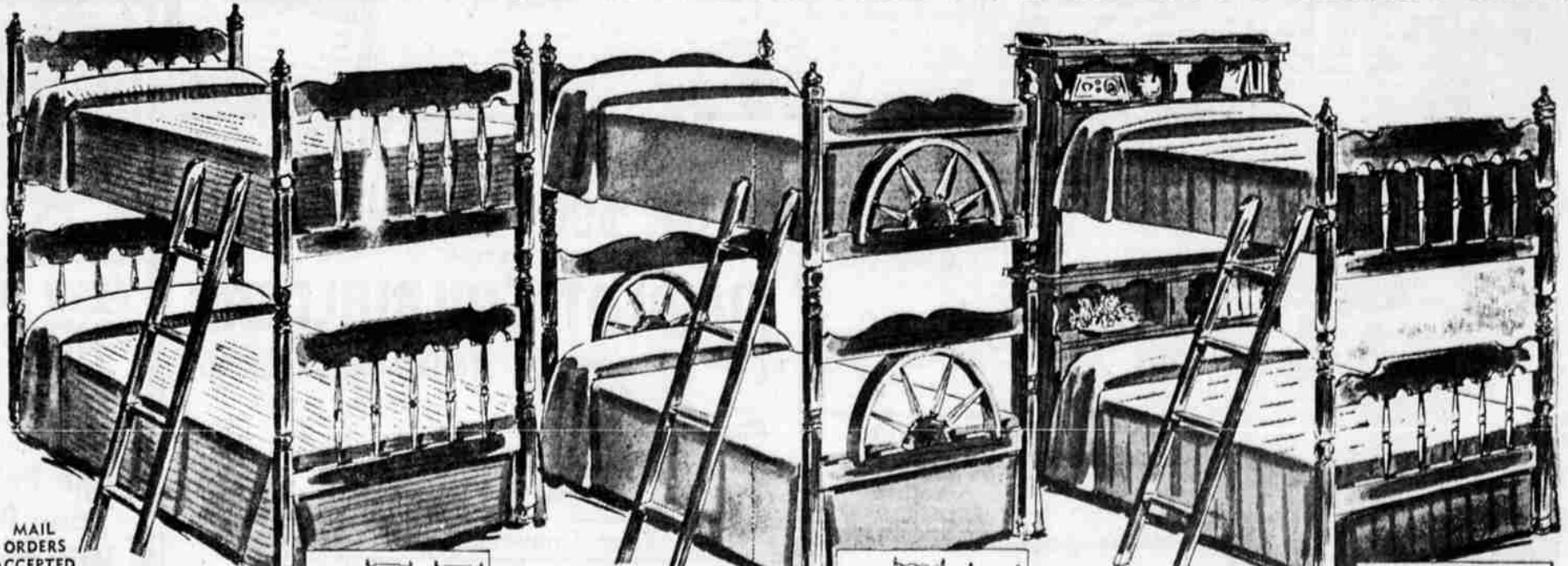
