The last years aren't so painful for Carlton Willey any more because the New York Mets are giving him all he ever asked for—a chance to pitch.

That chance has resulted in the 31-year old Cherryfield, Maine, right-hander's return to the form that made him one of the most promising pitchers in the National League as a member of the Milwaukee Braves in 1959.

It also has contributed to the emergence of the Mets, a team that lost a record 120 games in 1962, as a major surprise of 1963. The Mets set a club record of five consecutive victories Friday night when they shaded the Cincinnati Reds 3-2 on the strength of Willey's five-hit pitching and

an eight-inning homer by Jim Hickman.

Willey won eight games during a two-month stretch to help the Braves to the 1958 NL pennant but then fell victim to the rigid pitching rotation system that also cost the Milwaukee club Joey Jay and Juan Pizarro. He languished on the bench for four long years until finally this spring the Mets acquired him from the Braves.

Two Runs Unearned
Willey, who yielded two unearned runs Friday night when Johnny Edwards homered after an error by Ron Hunt, now has a 1.50 earned run average for the season.

The Los Angeles Dodgers defeated the San Francisco Giants 2-1, the St. Louis Cardinals edged the Pittsburgh Pirates 1-0, the Houston Colts downed the Chicago Cubs 4-1, and the Braves topped the Philadelphia Phillies 4-1, in other NL games.

Don Drysdale, a 25-game winner in 1962, squared his 1963 record at 3-3 with a six-hit, 11-strikeout performance against the Giants, who had won nine of their previous 10 games. Tummy Davis

doubled home the decisive run for the Dodgers as San Francisco's Jack Sanford suffered his second loss against five victories.

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George Altman homered with two out in the ninth inning to give Curt Simmons and the Cardinals the verdict over Bob Friend and the Pirates. Simmons yielded nine hits but no walks in scoring his fifth straight win and second shutout of the season.

Home runs by Denis Menke and Roy McMillan and Denny Lemaster's three-hit pitching enabled the Braves to beat the Phillies in a game ended after 6½ innings by rain. Chris Short suffered his fourth straight loss for the Phillies.

Two young California-born southpaws have proved that the Pacific Coast League is far from being a hitter's paradise.

At the same time, Tacoma's young bonus pitcher Bob Garibaldi, signed by the San Francisco Giants for an estimated \$150,000, discovered he was only human after three wins in a row without a loss.

Stinging bats of the Spokane Indians downed Tacoma 5-4. Garibaldi, who gave up all of the Indians' runs before being relieved in the eighth, absorbed his first PCL defeat of the season.

Spokane scored three runs off Garibaldi, a right-hander, in the third on a triple, double and two-run single by Charlie Peterson. Al Ferrara also touched the 21-year-old bonus pitcher for a 345-foot home run in the fifth.

But the big noise in the PCL Friday was made by young lefthanders Marv Mecklenburg of Dallas-Fort Worth and San Diego's John Flavin. Mecklenburg was born in Stockton 22 years ago and Flavin, who turned 21 Tuesday, grew up in Albany, Calif.

Flavin, signed by the Cincinnati Reds for a reported \$40,000 bonus, pitched a three-hitter to give San Diego a 3-1 win over Portland. Mecklenburg, who once pitched and won a doubleheader while at Stanford, spaced seven hits in going the route for Dallas-Fort Worth in the Rangers' 6-1 win over the Denver Bears.

In other games, Southern Division's Seattle won 4-1 from Tacoma.

Dodger Don Drysdale Tops Giants In Tense 2-1 Duel

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Friend and foe alike agreed today that Don Drysdale pitched one of his best games Friday night when he buried the Los Angeles Dodgers to a tense 2-1 victory over the San Francisco Giants.

The contest was concluded under protest by San Francisco manager Alvin Dark who charged manager Walt Alston violated league regulations by coming to the field twice in the final inning without lifting his pitcher.

SF Mentor Denies Shift
SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Bob Feerick said Saturday he expects to retain his job as coach of the San Francisco Warriors pro basketball team despite reports that he might be "kicked upstairs" into a front office job.

"As far as I know, there are no changes being contemplated," Feerick said. "A good deal of speculation has developed as the result of a column written in New York. But everything is harmonious between Eddie Gottlieb and myself. We are happy with our draft choices and I expect to be coaching again this coming season."

Feerick was signed to a three-year pact at about \$20,000 last summer after Coach Frank McGuire refused to make the shift with the team from Philadelphia to San Francisco.

The Warriors failed to gain the National Basketball Association playoffs during the past season, winding up fourth in the Western Division with a record of 31 wins and 49 defeats.

Oldtimers Day Slated
NEW YORK (UPI)—The New York Mets announced Saturday that this year Oldtimers' Day will be held June 22 at the Polo Grounds, honoring New York natives who went on to play in the major leagues.

The Oldtimers' Day game will precede the regularly-scheduled game between the Mets and Philadelphia Phillies. The Oldtimers will be divided into American and National League teams.

Frankie Frisch and Hank Greenberg, members of the Hall of Fame, are among those invited. Johnny Murphy, administrative assistant of the Mets and former New York Yankee pitching star, has become the first Oldtimer to accept.

SENATORS OPTION BOULDER
WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Washington Senators reduced their roster to 24 players Friday by optioning pitcher Carl Boudin to Toronto of the International League subject to 24-hour recall.

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But Dark's protest was disallowed because Alston's first trip was to talk to his catcher, John Roseboro, with instructions on how to handle any possible double steal. The second trip was made to the mound with the permission of plate umpire Chris Pelekoudas.

At the time of the brief incident, the Giants had two runners on the bases with none out. Willie Mays had reached base on shortstop Dick Tracewski's error and Willie McCovey singled him to third.

Tough
"These Giants are plenty tough again this year," Alston commented. "They appear to be as strong or stronger than last year."

The Giants received an excellent mound performance from Jack Sanford, who went seven innings during which he gave up seven hits and fanned seven.

But the Dodgers capitalized on a pair of doubles to put over their runs in the first and third innings. In the first, Jim Gilliam doubled, went to third on Sanford's wild pitch and scored on Wally Moon's single.

After Haller tied the score with his second inning homer into the right field stands, Tommy Davis scored Ron Fairly with a double that got past McCovey in left field as it caromed off the railing and he had to chase it toward centerfield.

Although Tracewski committed the game's only error, he performed brilliantly in place of the benched Maury Wills who is suffering from a bruised ankle. The rookie shortstop came up with several fielding gems that drew the applause of the huge crowd of 30,467.

"Haller hit a high changeup for his home run," Drysdale said, "and I didn't throw another in the game."

The lanky Drysdale retired 13 men in order before Mays was safe on the ninth inning error and he gave up but six hits. In addition to the ninth, the only other time he was in trouble was in the third inning when singles by Jim Davenport and Felipe Alou and an intentional walk to McCovey loaded the bases. But he struck out Cepeda to retire the side.

Tigers to a 14-0 runaway over the Cleveland Indians.

Pizarro did practically all the work for the White Sox, driving in both their runs with a single in addition to his third inning homer off loser Ken McBride. He struck out six in gaining his second victory without a loss.

Pascual also fanned six in out-pitching Orlando Pena, who yielded the only runs of the contest in the second inning when Minnesota rookie Jay Ward belted a two-run double for his first major league hit.
