Goldwater For President Movement Can Cost Rockefeller More Votes Than Murphy Wedding

More important to Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller's political future than his divorce and remarriage could be the fireball developments that are beginning to spark the Goldwater for president movement.

The G-for-p movement is showing political muscle. There is a powerhouse of enthusiasm under the hood of the G-for-p bandwagon. Goldwater is a crowd pleaser. He has been and may still be somewhat of an underdog, com-

ing as he does from politically insignificant Arizona. But, however that may be, the senator arouses among his followers a boisterous affection.

Consider some recent political developments:

—State and regional Goldwater-for-president headquarters are popping up at a great rate.

—These are accompanied by enthusiastic draft-Goldwater efforts.

—A Congressional Quarterly poll of delegates to the 1960 Republican national convention found a

majority personally favored Goldwater even though a majority also regarded Rockefeller as most likely to be nominated.

—Goldwater was the personal preference of every section of the country in this poll except the East and by a good margin.

The Atlanta (Ga.) Constitution polled Republican Party officials in Southern states and reported: "Sen. Barry Goldwater is almost the solid choice across the South for the Republican presidential nomination—and some 250 delegate votes were his more than

a year ahead of convention time.

"These votes are almost half enough to give Goldwater the nomination. And the people who hold those (delegate) votes say they could carry every Southern state for Goldwater if he were nominated."

The Constitution poll found some Rockefeller strength in Arkansas, Tennessee and Virginia and a bit in Georgia and Kentucky for Sen. Thurston H. Morton, R-Ky. The evidence of convention strength in the Constitution's pole is a reassurance much needed by Gold-

water's friends.

Republican nominating conventions long have been loaded against conservatives. The Republican Party has not nominated a conservative for president since Calvin Coolidge in 1924.

It has seemed to some observers that the convention would be the greatest obstacle between Goldwater and the White House; that it should be less difficult to elect than to nominate him. That is because Republican conventions have been dominated by Eastern Republicans whose political strategy increasingly has been to out-promise the democrats instead of out-slugging them.

In publisher John S. Knight's "Editor's Notebook," published May 5 in the Detroit Free Press and other Knight newspapers, this point is made: "Until someone such as Goldwater heads the Republican ticket, the conservative strength in this country never will be tested."

Knight doubts that Goldwater could lick President Kennedy. But he asks a question that Republicans long since should have been asking themselves: Why should the Republicans, basically the conservative party, fear to try it a test of conservative strength?

The answer to that seems to be that when the chips are down, the kingmakers of the Republican Party are more interested in victory than in principles. Conservatives have not much representation in either major party. Goldwater could change that although the odds are long against him.

House Eyes Public Land Purchases
WASHINGTON (UPI)—Congress was urged today to turn over public lands more speedily to western communities that seek expansion. Legislation designed to ease local governments buying of such lands was considered by the House public lands subcommittee, but no action was taken.

Rep. Morris K. Udall, D-Ariz., urged passage of his administration-supported bill or of a similar bill introduced by Interior Committee Chairman Wayne M. Aspinall, D-Colo.

Rep. John Rhodes, R-Ariz., testified in support of his bill, which would provide for turning land over to the states for "orderly disposition" within 10 years. Rhodes said the states were in the best position to determine how the land should be used.

"There is a lot to be said for local control," Rhodes said.

George W. Abbott, representing the National Public Lands Coordinating Committee and the Nevada Central Committee of Grazing Boards, urged that sales under current laws be deferred until public lands have been classified as to their best use. However, he said legislation should be passed to provide for sale of public bodies.

George Monahan, county engineer for Clark County, Nev., recommended that counties be allowed to buy up to 5,000 acres at the assessed value, provided that profits from resale of the land be used for public improvements. Udall told him he did not believe the committee would like such a provision.

Monahan also asked that local governments be given two years in which to raise funds for the purchase of public lands and that sales to individuals be in accordance with zoning requirements of the local governments.

Near Record Graduation Set At OSU
—More than 1900 degrees — including a record number of advanced degrees — will be conferred June 2 at the 94th annual commencement program of Oregon State University.

About 100 more degrees will be conferred by President James H. Jensen this year than last and the total of approximately 1940 degrees will be the second largest in OSU's history.

Only the veteran-filled class of 1949-50 had more graduates. That year, 1960 degrees were conferred — 1765 of them bachelor's degrees.

Since then the degree pattern has changed, OSU officials point out, with the number of advanced degrees showing rapid increases. This year, about 1400 bachelor's degrees will be conferred along with about 445 master's degrees, 78 doctor's degrees, and four professional engineering degrees.

The commencement program will be at 2 p.m. in the OSU Coliseum.

CHAMBER COMMENTS

Because the irksome practice of sending unordered merchandise through the mails continues to flourish, it might be worth while to pass along the word of the National Better Business Bureau, with which the chamber is affiliated, that the public is generally under no obligation to pay for or return unsolicited goods.

Housewives and business and professional people report the receipt of a wide variety of goods they didn't order and don't want, including books, aprons, ties, handkerchiefs, fountain pens, wallets, stationery and other items.

Many of them are uncertain whether they are obliged to comply with the shipper's request to pay for the merchandise or return it. They are not aware of their rights and liabilities and are confused as to what their attitude should be toward the unsolicited package delivered to them.

Those who ship unordered merchandise through the mails do so at their own risk. They cannot collect from the post office if the goods are allegedly lost or damaged because goods sent through the mails without an order are not insurable.

The BBB also says unordered goods are sometimes sent through the mails in connection with a charity appeal but notes that the merchandise is often of a shoddy character and that the percentage of the dollar remitted which serves a genuine philanthropic purpose is likely to be very minor.

Donors to charity would do well to contribute through organized channels which make public accounting of the funds they receive and how they spend them.
