

KU Varsity Cindermen Whip Crater 66-56; Freshmen Score Big Victory

A clean sweep in the high jump aided by excellent second and third place efforts helped the KUHS Pelicans in taking a 66-56 verdict from the Crater Comets in a dual meet at Central Point Saturday.

Crater chalked up seven firsts while the Pelicans had six first places plus a winning effort by the 800 relay squad. The victory margin came in the second and third place finishes. KUHS scored seven seconds and a tie for an eighth plus eight third places.

The Comets could gain only five seconds plus a tie for a sixth and three third place points.

Bill Mills was the only double winner for the Pels, capturing the discus with a toss of 136 feet 11 1/2 inches and the shot put with a heave of 48 feet 2 inches. Paul Branson and Gary Wald both turned in double victories for the Comets. Branson took the low hurdles in 21 seconds flat and added a first in the broad jump with a leap of 20 feet seven and one-half inches. Wald topped the sprinters with a 10.5 second time in the 100 yard dash, and then took the 220 with 23 seconds flat.

In first places, Don Graham won the high hurdles in 16.3 seconds; Don Piper ran the 880 in two minutes 7.1 seconds; Walt Smith tossed the javelin 198 feet 1 1/2 inches and Dick Scott jumped six feet even in the high jump.

The Pel relay squad of Dahn Howard, English and DeGroot covered the 880 in 1:35 for top honors.

Second places were scored by Arie DeGroot in the 100, Steve Lawrence in the mile, Ernie Badger the 440, Arie DeGroot in the 220, Terry Eccles in the high vault and Bob Holman in the shot. John English tied Frank Armstrong of Crater for second in the low hurdles.

Third place points for the Pels were chalked up by Fred Kelley in the high hurdles, Bob Scholl in the mile, Grover Dahn the 220, Steve Lawrence the 880, Dahn in the broad jump, Steve Baker the high jump and Brent Hicks in the pole vault. Randy Howard and Gerrit DeGroot, both Klamath Falls tied for third in the 440.

First place winners for the Central Pointers in addition to Wald and Branson included Jim Ask-

with over the mile in four minutes 50.4 seconds, Vern Swanson the 440 and Phil Brown in the pole vault as he topped the bar at 11 feet.

A 10-3 victory in the second game of a doubleheader enabled the KUHS Pelicans to even their day's action on the diamond against the Comets of Central Point Saturday.

After dropping an 8-5 first game on Wright Field to the visitors, the Pels came rolling back in the second fracas behind the five hit pitching of Rich Johnson to pound two Crater hurlers for 12 hits including a triple by Curt Coleman and doubles by Lanny Guyer and Parisotto who came in the fifth inning.

The Pels jumped off with three runs on two hits in the first inning as Dave Johnson, Mike Kitching and Larry Binney scored.

A four-run outburst in the second frame put the game beyond reach of the Comets with Jackson in control all the way.

The Pelicans virtually threw the first game away on some mental errors and some physical ones. The Comets jumped off to a quick 2-0 lead on the Pels' starting hurler Gary Benson.

Glines walked and took second on Lou Alvarez' bunt single. Glines went all the way from second to score to the amazement of the Pels on an infield out on Pat Pepper's hit ball. Willie Jones tripled to deep right center to score Alvarez.

The Whitebirds bounced right back with two runs to tie the game. Lanny Guyer singled and stole second. After one was Mike Kitching hit an infield single and Dave Johnson tripled off the fence in right center after John Gray had ground out to score both Guyer and Kitching.

The Comets, with Glines again applying the stinger, scored in the third. He doubled and took third on an infield out sacrifice by Pepper. He scored on an infield out.

The Crater crew took charge again in the fourth for two runs. Neil Rivenburg led off with a single and stole second. He took third on a single by Don Kilbourn. Then the confusion set in. A line shot down third base brought it all about. Mary Yunch made a fine stop and tagged the runner who was trying to get back to third. But the umpire missed the call. Yunch threw wild to first and both Rivenburg and Kilbourn scored. Don Tweedell, who hit the ball, also scored but was thrown out when he missed third.

White Sox Boost Lead To Two Games; Nicholson's Home Paces 4-2 Victory

CHICAGO (UPI) — Dave Nicholson's three-run homer Saturday carried the Chicago White Sox to their sixth consecutive victory, 4-2, over the Los Angeles Angels, and increased their American League lead to two games.

Nicholson's shot into the lower left center field stands came off Don Belinsky after two outs in the fourth inning. It followed a walk to Mike Hershberger and Nellie Fox's single.

It was the seventh home run of the season for the 23-year-old ex-Oriole and gave him 22 runs batted in, tops for the White Sox.

Belinsky, suffering his fifth loss in six decisions, was removed for Julio Navarro after he hit the next batter with a pitch.

White Sox starter Jerry Peters, a young lefthander, gained the victory but he also needed help. The Angels rapped Peters for two runs on four hits, including Ed Sadowski's double in the fifth inning.

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Sandy Koufax No-Hits SF Giants As Dodgers Pound Out 8-0 Win

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Left-hander Sandy Koufax pitched the second no-hitter of his career Saturday night in a tension-packed 8-0 victory over the San Francisco Giants.

The handsome lefthander retired the first 22 men he faced before giving up a walk to Giants' catcher Ed Bailey. He still faced the minimum number of batters, however, because Bailey was erased on a double play.

But in the ninth inning, Koufax walked Willie McCovey with two outs before Harvey Kuenn grounded out to bring him his no-hitter.

Koufax thus faced 28 batters in the first no-hitter of the 1963 season.

Last year, Koufax buried his first no-hitter June 20 against the New York Mets. In that game, he walked five men and struck out 13. In Saturday night's contest, Koufax relied less on his fast ball and struck out four.

The pitching performance came before the largest baseball crowd of the 1963 season as 55,530 fans jammed Dodger Stadium. The paid attendance was 49,897 fans, who from the sixth inning on became aware that Koufax appeared headed toward a possible no-hitter and applauded every man he retired.

Koufax was given an ovation in the eighth inning when he came to bat, drew a walk and scored a run.

Although there were five no-hit games last year, Koufax was the only National League pitcher to hurl a hitless game and the last previous National League no-hitter was by Warren Spahn of the Milwaukee Braves against the San Francisco Giants April 28, 1961.

The unlikely loser of Saturday night's contest was Juan Marichal, who lasted 5 1/3 innings during which he gave up nine hits and four runs. John Pregener took over and yielded four more runs on three hits and four walks.

Wally Moon, with his second inning lead-off homer, got Koufax enough margin for victory, but the Dodgers came to life in the sixth inning, when they scored three runs on five singles with catcher John Roseboro driving in two of the tallies with a bases loaded single. After Marichal gave up another single, he was replaced by Pregener.

PHIL 8-5 MILW. PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — Don Demeter hatted in five runs and the Philadelphia Phillies came up with a five-run rally in the seventh inning Saturday to break a five-game losing streak with an 8-5 victory over the Milwaukee Braves.

Highlighting the winning rally was a bases-loaded double by Demeter off reliever Hank Fischer which tied the score and a bases-loaded single by Bobby Wine off Fischer to put the Phils ahead. Tony Cline's walk to Don Hoak with three on gave the Phils their fifth run.

CINN. 4-3 N.Y. NEW YORK (UPI) — Joey Jay, with late-inning help from Bill Henry, scored his first victory of the season and ended the New York Mets' five-game winning streak by pitching Cincinnati to a 4-2 victory Saturday.

Jay, who had lost his first six decisions, lasted until the eighth inning when the Mets threatened. Henry, a veteran lefthander reliever, came on to end the threat by striking out Duke Snider and getting Frank Thomas to hit into a force play.

The Reds, who climbed back into sixth place as a result of the victory, scored all their runs off Met starter and loser Al Jackson.

HOUST. 5-3 CH 1-0 HOUSTON (UPI) — Superb pitching by Hal Woodeshick and Dick Drott carried the Houston Colts to 5-3 and 1-0 victories over the Chicago Cubs Saturday night in a twin-city doubleheader.

Drott, making his first start for the Colts since being recalled from San Antonio, won a pitcher's duel in the second game as Chicago's Larry Jackson although he needed help in the ninth inning from Ken Johnson.

The victory extended Houston's longest winning streak of the season to three games.

Houston's Rick Jackson for only two hits, but they both came in the third inning when the Colts pushed over their only run. Drott singled with one away, was doubled to third by Bob Lillis. After Carl Warwick walked to load the bases, Pete Ronsella scored Drott on a sacrifice fly.

Joe DeNucci Earns Nod BOSTON (UPI) — New York middleweight Jose Gonzalez spoiled Joe De Nucci's attempt to make a national name for himself Saturday night with a relentless and powerful body attack that gained him a split 10-round decision in a nationally televised fight at Boston Arena.

Gonzalez, a 23-year-old part-time bartender, started last in the early rounds and wore down De Nucci with flurries of rights and lefts to the body before turning his attack to the head in the late rounds.

De Nucci, of suburban Newton, who was passing out cigars earlier in the day after his wife, Barbara Ann, had presented him with a 6-pound, 12-munce girl, couldn't cope with the strong offense of Gonzalez.

Judges Joe Blumack and Joe Amaral scored the fight in Gonzalez' favor, 96-95 and 97-96, respectively, while referee Joe Zapatas called the match a 96-96 draw. There were no knockdowns. The crowd of 511 booed the referee's scoring.

The pattern for each of the first five rounds was the same. Gonzalez, who scaled 163 1/2 to De Nucci's 162 1/2, came out at the bell as the aggressor, firing both barrels at De Nucci's mid-section and scoring well.

De Nucci, apparently sensing that he was trailing on the officials' cards, tried to take to the offensive in the sixth round and fired two wild rights at Gonzalez' head before the New Yorker landed a right cross to the chin which slowed him down.

Gonzalez then decided to concentrate on the body and once more scored consistently, forcing De Nucci against the ropes time and again.

Hall Of Fame Banquet Set SALEM (UPI) — Five former athletes and one ex-coach will be inducted into the NAIA District 2 Hall of Fame May 25 at the annual district awards banquet here.

Scheduled to join former area small college graduates in the Hall of Fame are Ernie Stranz, Linfield; Bud White, Lewis and Clark; Chuck DeAustreant, Southern Oregon; Dwight Adams, Willamette; and Ross Hart, Oregon College of Education.

Also to be honored will be Eldon Jenne, Pacific University coach of the middle 30's who since has been director of physical education in Portland elementary schools.

INK JET PACTS NEW YORK (UPI) — Center Mike Hudock, linebacker Ed Cooke and guard John McMullen have signed their 1963 contracts to play with the New York Jets of the American Football League.

Hudock and Cooke both have been with the club since its inception three years ago and McMullen is returning after sitting out a year.

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
