Millions Of Tiny Fibers Orbiting Around The Earth

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Millions of tiny copper fibers were beginning to disperse in a polar orbit around the earth today as part of a controversial Air Force communications experiment.

The Air Force announced Sunday that a canister containing the 200 million needles called dipole fibers dumped from a satellite launched Thursday from Point Arguello, Calif.

Radar sightings show the fibers, each about one-third the diameter of a human hair, are beginning to spread. They are expected to fan out into a narrow ring around the earth taking several months to complete the circle 40,000 miles in circumference and about 2,000 miles high.

The belt will be used to bounce radio signals back to earth over great distances. The Air Force said the dipole belt is practically invulnerable to physical damage and is especially useful in long-distance microwave communications.

Some scientists have opposed the experiment saying it would clutter space with trash and impair observations of the stars and planets with telescopes.

Astronomers also fear the fibers might reflect back to earth a confusing jumble of radio signals that ordinarily might pass into space.

Dubbed the west Ford Project, the experiment is being conducted

Hunt In Oregon Wilds Ends On Evans' Suicide

FLORA (UPI)—A hunt of nearly a week in the wilds of northeast Oregon ended Sunday when suspect Billy Evans, 44, shot and killed himself at his cabin after wounding his cousin, state police reported.

Evans had been sought since last Monday night for the fatal shootings in Clarkston, Wash., of Mrs. May Griner, 40, Clarkston, and William Gerry, 40, La Grande.

The cousin, Amos Evans, 60, Enterprise, was wounded in the left side of his face and his condition was listed as critical at an Enterprise hospital today.

Billy Evans had been spotted last week in the heavily timbered area near here but searchers lost his trail and many of those on the manhunt were called off.

State police said the suspect was located at his cabin Sunday by Amos Evans and three others.

Police said as the cousin and Gene Beard began climbing stairs to the second floor a bullet grazed Amos Evans' head and Beard pulled him to safety.

Reds Order Expulsion Of Espionage Figures

MOSCOW (UPI)—The Soviet Union today ordered the expulsion of one American and one British diplomat for alleged complicity in the espionage case that resulted in a death sentence for a Soviet official and imprisonment for a British businessman.

In a note delivered to the U.S. Embassy, the Soviet Union also declared three former embassy members allegedly implicated in the case persona non grata (unwelcome).

Similar action was taken in respect to four former members of the British Embassy here.

The American ordered expelled is embassy Security Officer Hugh Montgomery, 39, Springfield, Mass. He is the only American named in the Soviet note still assigned to Moscow. The others had been expelled or transferred earlier.

A U. S. Embassy spokesman said that "while the embassy in no way accepts any allegations that any officers have behaved in a manner incompatible with their official standards, it can only accede to the U.S.S.R. government decision not to permit Montgomery to resume his position here."

Chambers Plan Meet At Shasta

MOUNT SHASTA — President David E. Otis of the Mount Shasta Chamber of Commerce, at a regular meeting May 9, informed the members that the Ashland Chamber of Commerce on a good will tour, will join the local chamber at its next meeting May 23. Weed and Dunsmuir chambers have also been invited to attend.

Otis advised the members that the Ski Bowl Corporation had withdrawn its support from the information booth, which puts an additional financial burden on the chamber and the Hotel-Motel Association. The three groups have jointly sponsored and financed the booth. Mrs. Jeannette Dahlquist, chamber secretary, was instructed to write letters to Robert Vaughn, Ski Bowl manager, and the president of the board of directors of the Ski Bowl protesting the action taken. The booth has been a going business activity and may have to be closed unless financial support is forthcoming.

In other business, the special events committee reported that over 200 people will be in Mount Shasta June 19-21 for the convention of airport commissioners and executives, and plans for lunches, dinners, and entertainment were discussed. Ray China gave a report on the July 4th committees' work, stating the Lions Club will buy the fireworks to be sold from a booth to the public. Frank Melo announced the ambulance project was at standstill for the present, but he would have further details for discussion at a later date. Bob Rogers said a sign advertising Siskiyou County was to be erected at Winters soon.

Rogers and Otis reported on the last meeting of the Associated Chambers of Commerce held in Dunsmuir. They told the group there should be closer cooperation of cities within the county and that things must be done in a democratic way to produce an effective organization to take advantage of the state's economic growth.

Man Delays President

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Dr. Armand Hammer today belonged to the exclusive club of those who have kept the President waiting for several minutes on a telephone.

Hammer, president of the Occidental Petroleum Co., and his wife were breakfasting Saturday morning when the telephone rang. It was President Kennedy.

"I just want to make sure that you are offering to donate the Roosevelt home and grounds at Campobello to the governments of the United States and Canada as a memorial to the late president and Mrs. Roosevelt," Kennedy said.

"It's a very generous gift," Kennedy told Hammer, "I think it will further strengthen the bond of friendship between the two countries."

Hammer then asked Kennedy if he would like to hear the telegram he had sent to Rep. James Roosevelt, D-Calif., son of the late president, confirming the gift.

The President said he would. But Hammer couldn't find it for several minutes. When he finally returned his wife scolded him: "Do you realize you've kept the President of the United States waiting while you went for the telegram?"

But Hammer said the President didn't seem to mind.

Teams Note Progress On Everest

KATMANDU, Nepal (UPI)—Two teams of American mountaineers were reported making steady progress today in their unprecedented attempt to climb Mt. Everest from two different directions and meet on the summit.

Radio reports from the base camp of the U.S. Everest expedition said Dr. William Unsold, 36, Corvallis, Ore., and Dr. Thomas F. Hornbein, 32, San Diego, had reached Camp Three on the unexplored west ridge of the 29,028-foot peak, tallest in the world.

Barry C. Bishop, 30, Washington, D.C., and Luther G. Gerstad, 26, Eugene, Ore., were reported to have reached Camp One on the traditional route through the South Col (pass).

The two teams hoped to rendezvous at the top May 21, according to the radioed reports.

If both teams meet at the summit, they plan to return together down the south col route. If they fail to make contact, however, each will return the way it came.

One expedition member, James W. Whittaker, 32, Redmond, Wash., became the first American to scale Mt. Everest May 1, when he reached the top with Nepalese Sherpa guide Nowang Gombu.

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
