Break-In, Car Theft Busy Police

City police Friday reported a break-in and attempted break-in, and the theft of \$50 worth of automobile equipment from a car.

Richard Henry, Rickfalls Apartments, said a magneto pack, injectors and valve covers valued at about \$50 were stolen from his car while it was parked at 2126 Ohio Street, probably early Thursday morning.

Police have not yet recovered the stolen goods, but indicated there is a suspect in the case.

A service station at the Chiloquin junction was broken into early Friday morning and a 22 caliber rifle, 50 boxes of ammunition, a stereo set, nine tires, gas, oil and cigars were taken. The total value of the lost articles was not determined. The burglary was investigated by Oregon State Police.

City police, in a supplementary report on the theft, indicated there were suspects in the case.

An attempted break-in that was just discovered at the Western Beverage Company, 231 Riverside Street, could have occurred anytime during the last two months, the company manager said.

The would-be thief knocked out a panel in a back door, but entry was foiled by a pallet of empty bottles piled against the door. There are no suspects in the case.

14 Students Complete CD Aid Course

Fourteen students have completed 16 hours of training in a civil defense medical self-help training course conducted recently at the Klamath Falls Fire Department under the instruction of Richard E. Suber, County Civil Defense Director Joe Searles has reported.

The course covered the subjects of radiological fallout, water and food, hygiene, sanitation, vermin control, shock, bleeding and bandaging, artificial respiration, burns, nursing care of sick and injured, and infant and child care.

At the start of the survival training, the class was given a pre-course test and received an average mark of 76.5 per cent. The class boosted its average test score to 90.4 in an examination at the conclusion of the course.

Siskiyou Board Talks County Fair

YREKA — The Siskiyou County Fair Board met May 8 to discuss the program for the Siskiyou County Fair. It will be held Friday through Sunday, Aug. 16-18, at the Yreka fairgrounds.

One of the highlights of the fair will be a logging competition known as the First Annual Paul Bunyan Invitational. Such events as high-climbing, saw bucking, hand bucking, chopping, axe throwing, tree falling, and bull of the woods will be offered.

More than \$500 in cash and merchandise will be awarded to winners in the logging meet, which is open to all Siskiyou County loggers. Danny Sailor, world champion high-climber and 1962 champion logger, has been signed to appear but will not compete.

A western-style barbecue, prepared by George Solas, will open the three-day fair, with a western approved rodeo following. Dick Hemsted, rodeo contractor, will furnish the stock. A western dance in the armory will be staged that evening.

This year the flowerhouse will feature a longer building and a new subterranean look. Al Grebbin, president of the board, announced there will be no entry fee for floral exhibits.

This year the flower house will suggest improvements to be made at the fairgrounds, was discussed and a new indoor area was proposed to be used for rodeos, horse shows, 4-H events, and traveling shows. The building, costing approximately \$150,000, would serve as the entertainment center for Siskiyou County. The money is set aside for use at fairs from taxes on pari-mutuel betting.

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Hatfield Warns Against Last-Minute Tax Program

SALEM (UPI) — The legislature is not much further along with a tax program than it was at the start of the 1963 session 119 days ago, Gov. Mark Hatfield said today.

Speaking at his weekly news conference, Hatfield repeated his suggestion that members of the House and Senate Tax Committees get together to draft a program both houses can accept.

The Senate committee is considering the House-passed tax program. Senators have expressed dislike of the House package. Hatfield again warned against letting a tax impasse go to a conference committee for compromise in the session's final days.
