Boros Hits Fifth Spot With Colonial Victory

FORT WORTH, Tex. (UPI) — Julius Boros climbed into fifth place among the touring golf money winners today with a \$12,000 Colonial National Invitation title—won with the first sub-par total, 279, in eight years.

Par is 280 for four rounds.

Boros finished four strokes ahead of the select field to pad his season earnings to \$27,325.

Boros started the final round three strokes ahead of the field and played safe golf all day, posting one 15-foot birdie and a pair of bogeys for a 36-35-71 to wind up four strokes to the good over Gary Player, whose final round 22-35-67 put him at 283, worth \$6,000.

That \$6,000 jumped Player into second place among the money winners with \$36,765—still nearly \$29,000 behind pace-setting Jack Nicklaus, who won third place money of \$3,500 here with a closing 34-36-70 for a 284 that boosted his tour earnings to \$56,215.

Tony Lama, who had been in second place behind Nicklaus without picking up a single tour title, managed to pad his own bank account by \$2,800 with a 286 that tied him with Doug Sanders for fourth place here. Lama now has won \$33,296.36 and Sanders has earned \$18,300 in sixth place behind Boros.

Young Hurlers Spark AL; Chicago Holds Lead Spot

The old guard of the American League is being forced to sit up and take notice of a couple of young hurlers not even old enough to vote.

They're Sam McDowell of the Cleveland Indians and Dave Morehead of the Boston Red Sox—and they're looking good and cocky enough to match sneers with the likes of Bobo Ruth—well, all right, with Roger Maris.

Both turned in powerful performances Sunday. McDowell pitching a six-hitter to give the Indians a 9-3 victory over the Detroit Tigers and Morehead hurling a one-hitter as the Red Sox scored a 4-1 victory after losing the first game of their double-header to the Washington Senators, 3-2, in 14 innings.

It was the second victory of the season for the 20-year-old McDowell and the third straight win of the campaign for the 19-year-old Morehead. The Indians have won 7 of their last 19 games while the Red Sox are in second place, only two games behind the front-running Chicago White Sox.

McDowell, a 6-5, 200-pound lefty, struck out eight and pitched out of numerous jams caused by six walks to square his record at 2-2. Woodie Held led the Indians' 11-hit attack with a double and a triple that drove in three runs. Don Mossi was routed in 1-2-3 innings and suffered the defeat.

Morehead, a 6-1, 185-pounder from San Diego, Calif., yielded a homer to Chuck Hinton in the first inning and then blanked the Senators the rest of the way to make his record 3-0. He has yielded only four earned runs in 22 1-3 innings.

Don Lock's homer gave the Senators their victory in the 14-inning opener with Jim Coates gaining his first win and Dick Radatz suffering the loss.

Paul Jones at the garden club? Not likely!

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The scars of the pennant-costing 1962 collapse were uppermost in the minds of NL observers 72 hours ago when the Dodgers, reeling and groggy and with Manager Walt Alston's future still a big question mark, squared off in a three-game series with the Giants—their first meeting with the team that beat them out for the flag in last year's post-season playoff.

Three-Game Sweep
The obvious question was how the Dodgers would react in their first meeting with the defending champions—and the Dodgers answered it with a dramatic three-game sweep in which (1) Don Drysdale flashed his 25-game winning form of 1962, (2) Sandy Koufax made the Giants the victims of the second no-hitter of his career and (3) they rallied for three

eight-inning runs and a 6-5 Sunday triumph.

A Sunday crowd of 43,964 saw the Dodgers complete the sweep Sunday with MVP shortstop Maury Wills, playing his first game at third base, contributing a key double to the decisive rally. The Dodgers went into the eighth inning trailing, 5-2, and without a hit since the second inning when they started their flash rally. Singles by Jim Gilliam, Ron Fairly and Wally Moon preceded the decisive sacrifice fly by Johnny Roseboro.

The Philadelphia Phillies downed the Milwaukee Braves, 4-3 and 6-5; the New York Mets edged out the Cincinnati Reds, 13-12, after losing the opener, 3-0; the Pittsburgh Pirates topped the St. Louis Cardinals, 4-3, after a 2-1 defeat, and the Houston Colts

nipped the Chicago Cubs, 2-1, in other NL games.

Frank Torre's 11th-inning single drove home the winning run for the Phillies in the first game and successive errors by Roy McMillan and pitcher Lew Burdette enabled Philadelphia to score the winning run of the nightcap in the 12th inning. Burdette's loss was his fourth against three wins.

Chico Cardenas' three-run homer and seven-hit pitching by Bob Purkey and Bill Henry gave the Reds their first-game victory. The Mets gained a split in the wild second game—which the umpires twice threatened to forfeit to Cincinnati because Polo Grounds fans littered the field with debris—when Choo Choo Coleman singled home the odd run in the eighth.

Koufax Eyes Jinx After No-Hitter

NEW YORK (UPI) — Baseball men regard the no-hitter as they would a Mona Lisa painted on Swiss cheese so you can't blame Sandy Koufax today for keeping his fingers tightly crossed.

Particularly Koufax. The no-hitter, such as the one he threw Saturday night against the San Francisco Giants, is a masterpiece. But too often the man who hurls it falls rapidly on hard times and of such things are baseball superstition built.

Koufax, the darkly handsome young southpaw of the Los Angeles Dodgers, had a previous sample.

Just last June 30 he pitched his first no-hitter and even the fact that it was against the New York Mets removed none of the acclaim accorded to such a performance.

Struck On Finger
In his next start he was struck on the index finger of his pitching hand and within a month he was out of action for the balance of the season.

It could have ended his career. The blow caused a circulatory failure, a blood clot developed and for a time it was feared that the finger might have to be amputated.

"It's been a long winter," Koufax admitted when he reported for spring training this season. "The doctors tell me that the finger will be all right and my hand and arm feel fine. But you never know until you give it a stiff test."

Koufax is a serious young man yet an easy humor bubbles underneath. But he had no trouble

frowning when he pondered on what spring training might produce.

"It's all a question of whether I'll have the feel in the finger and be able to regain my control," he said. "I won't know for a while."

Cost Dodgers Pennant
Losing him undoubtedly had cost the Dodgers the National League pennant. Thus in the spring they watched Koufax with all the attention of a hawk hovering over a rabbit.

Then came the day when he pitched a perfect five innings against the Yankees in an exhibition game and Sandy was jubilant.

"I'm sure now," he grinned, "that it's going to be all right." As the season opened, the fireballing 27-year-old beat the Cubs with a five-hitter. He lost to Houston but then came back to beat them with a sparkling two-hitter.

But Lady Luck has a whimsical way of treating him, until at times, he must feel like a runaway yo-yo. Because on April 23 he had given Milwaukee only two hits over six and two-thirds innings when he suffered a shoulder spasm and was sidelined for two weeks.

Can Luck Hold?
Returning to action, he allowed five hits over eight innings in beating St. Louis. And now comes that second masterpiece, a breezing no-hitter against the Giants in which he retired the first 22 batters, allowed only two bases on balls, struck out four and ran his record to four wins against one defeat.

Oregon Collegiate Conference baseball teams established some sort of a record by not having any of their weekend games rained out but none could come any closer to catching first place Portland State.

The Vikings and Eastern Oregon drove from Portland to Wy'east High School at Odell Saturday before they could find a dry field. The results were indecisive, 9-5 for EOC in the opener and 4-3 for Portland State in the nightcap.

Southern Oregon and Oregon College of Education split a doubleheader at Monmouth. OCE won the opener 4-3 and the Red Raiders the second game 8-0. The weekend results left Portland State in first place with a 7-2 record, followed by Eastern at 7-4, OCE at 5-4, SOC at 6-6 and Oregon Tech at 2-10.

Linfield made a valiant bid to clinch the Northwest Conference crown but couldn't shake off determined Willamette. The Wildcats beat Pacific twice, 7-2 and 1-0 at McMinnville.

Willamette kept pace with 6-0 and 5-0 shutouts of Lewis and Clark at Salem. A loss by Willamette either game would have given Linfield the title. Linfield has an 11-1 conference mark and has won nine straight in league play. Willamette is second at 8-3.
