Khrushchev Answers Joint Note Urging Test Ban Pact

LONDON (UPI) — Premier Nikita Khrushchev has sent a reply to the joint appeal from President Kennedy and Prime Minister Harold Macmillan urging an early nuclear test ban, the Foreign Office said today.

The Foreign Office spokesman said the Soviet reply is "under study" by Macmillan.

In Washington, the White House confirmed that President Kennedy had received a note from Khrushchev and is "studying it." The White House declined immediate comment on the letter except to say that the note arrived after Kennedy's pessimistic news conference comments last week on disarmament prospects.

Kennedy and Macmillan urged Khrushchev last month to stop stalling and help to pave the way for nuclear test ban with adequate international verification.

The U.S. and British envoys in Moscow presented the Kennedy-Macmillan appeal at a special interview with Khrushchev at the Kremlin April 24.

Details of the Anglo-American approach have not been disclosed, but according to authoritative diplomatic sources the Western move was designed to try and break the deadlock at the marathon Geneva nuclear talks.

Khrushchev's immediate reaction to the Allied initiative was reported at the time to have been cool. The Soviet leader, however, said he would study the Western ideas and send a reply in due course.

Supreme Court Rejects Refuge For Venezuelan

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Supreme Court Monday turned down an appeal by former Venezuelan Dictator Marcos Perez Jimenez, opening the way for Secretary of State Dean Rusk to act on a move to extradite him to the country he once ruled.

Perez Jimenez had claimed that the crimes for which Venezuela wants to try him were "political offenses" committed while he was in power and therefore the United States had no authority to extradite him.

The court rejected the argument in a brief order. His extradition is not automatic, however. Rusk will make his own findings in the case.

The one-time Latin American strongman, who was overthrown in a 1958 revolution, now is being held in a Miami Jail. Chief Justice Earl Warren denied him bail April 10.

In other actions Monday, the Supreme Court:

- Struck down the convictions of three Negroes who were found guilty of contempt for sitting in the "white section" of the 19th Judicial District Court in East Baton Rouge, La.
- Refused to reconsider lower court decisions in Kansas City and New York that have an important bearing on damage suits brought against electric companies as an outgrowth of the 1961 antitrust conviction. There are approximately 1,800 triple-damage suits waiting settlement.
- Turned down a plea for a life detector test from Samuel Shepard, the Ohio doctor convicted of killing his wife in a headline-making 1954 trial. Monday's action makes final a ruling against Shepard by the Ohio Supreme Court.

Senate Chief Given Gifts

SALEM (UPI) — Senators and staff members Monday presented the traditional gifts to Senate President Ben Musa and Mrs. Musa.

Mrs. Musa, who is a representative, was recalled to the lower chamber by a "call of the House" shortly after the formal presentation had been completed.

Sen. Walter Pearson, D - Portland, lauded Musa for being fair, and injecting a bit of humor into tense moments.

Musa said "I feel it is an honor to serve as Senate president," and thanked Senators and staff members for their loyalty and devotion. Mrs. Musa said "I will always remember the wonderful things you have done for Ben and me."

Gifts included flowers, silver service, and jewelry.

Truck Tax Bill Okayed

SALEM (UPI) — A bill to give \$500,000 in tax relief to heavy trucks, and raise the optional flat fee used by log truckers by 10 per cent, passed the House 32-8 Monday and went to the Senate.

It is an outgrowth of the findings of the Illinois Road Tests. A broader bill passed both houses in 1961 but was vetoed because the tests were not completed.

The bill involves the tax paid by trucks on the basis of weight and mileage, a tax that netted Oregon \$16.7 million last year and is increasing by about 2.5 per cent a year.

Police Study Triple Crash

DUNSMUIR — Dunsuir police are investigating the causes of an accident Thursday night in which three automobiles suffered extensive damage.

An automobile northbound on Park Avenue, driven by P. J. Dean of Dunsuir, struck a parked car opposite the Dunsuir swimming pool. The parked car, owned by Don Bottega of Dunsuir, was bounced into a pickup truck also owned by Bottega. The fire department was called to wash spilled gasoline from the street.

Dean was not arrested following the accident but was given a blood test at the Mount Shasta Hospital. According to Dunsuir police, he was not injured and there was no one in either parked vehicle. Dean was alone in his car.

Trump Lead Ruins South

One of the greatest if not the greatest partnerships of the early '30s was that of the late P. Hal Sims and the late Willard S. Karn. Here is a hand from the finals of the Eastern Championships of 1932 that shows them at their best.

After South opened with a preemptive bid of four spades Hal chose to double. Of course, his double was primarily for penalties but Karn had other ideas. With two five card suits and no spades Karn decided game or slam was likely and took out to five clubs. He bid his lower suit so as to leave both other suits for Sims in case he did not have clubs.

South passed and Sims decided that he could make six clubs but that if he bid it directly the opponents would defend so Sims passed.

North could not tell that he was up against dynamite and went to five spades. Karn passed, but Sims went to the club slam and after North passed South saved at six spades. If North could not double six clubs South saw no way to beat it.

Sims passed this bid. Karn could be depended on to act and Karn went to seven clubs. South passed this around to North who realized that he had to save at seven.

Karn doubled and Sims made the killing opening lead of a trump. This made it impossible for South to make anything, but his eight trumps and he was down five.

Titan Test Shot Fired

VANDENBERG AFB, Calif. (UPI) — A Titan 2, the nation's most powerful military missile, was launched Monday in a research test from this Air Force base to a "preselected target" in the South Pacific.

The Air Force said the 80-foot two-stage rocket was launched successfully from this Pacific Coast base from a deep underground silo. The slender shaft roared from its pit with a thrust of 530,000 pounds.

It was the third research and development test of the Titan 2, which can be used either to carry a deadly warhead capable of destroying a city or dropping astronauts into delicate earth orbit.

Later this year the Titan 2 will be placed in operational service at Davis - Monthan Air Force Base, Ariz.; Little Rock AFB, Ark.; and McConnell AFB, Kan.

In past tests the Titan 2 has carried a dummy warhead into a target area more than 6,700 miles away.

SALEM (UPI) — The first two of six sex offender bills were sent to the governor's desk Monday.

The measures cleared the legislature when the House concurred in Senate amendments to bills providing enhanced penalties for sex offenders and stiffening laws against "peeping toms."

A third bill, involving jurisdiction over sex offense cases where the parties include children under 16, went to a conference committee to iron out House-Senate differences.

Two more bills — on juvenile jurisdiction and civil commitment of sexually dangerous persons — have cleared the House and are in Senate committees.

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Committee Holds Action On Sale Of Public Land

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House public lands subcommittee took another look today at legislation designed to ease the sale of public lands. But once again it took no action.

The principal witness appearing before the committee was Thomas L. Kimball, executive director of the National Wildlife Federation, who urged "caution" in the disposal of government-owned lands.

"As much public land as possible should be retained in federal ownership," Kimball said. "In short, I believe that only those lands adjacent to urban developments should be disposed of, and those for residential or industrial purposes."

Kimball also urged that any lands sold for educational, library, park or recreation use be subject to recovery by the federal government if used for other purposes.

"Such a procedure would stop, in some measure, speculation in land prices and would prohibit the disposal of public lands solely as a means of providing additional revenue to finance local and state governments," he said.

Kimball's views drew the support of Rep. John P. Saylor, R-Pa., the ranking minority member of the Interior Committee. Saylor, noting the pressure for increased sale of public lands in the West, said "too many people in the West have come to look upon the public lands as their own private domain."
