

Belinsky Gets Headlines, Chance Gets Wins For LA Angels

Tim Pool Surprises Match Game Bowl Field

Twenty-two junior bowlers squared off in the first annual Junior Match Game Singles at Lucky Lanes last Saturday with Tim Pool coming out on top as a surprise winner.

The tournament, a singles elimination, was requested by the junior boys and most of the tourney work was handled by Dennis Graham with an assist from Lucky Lanes promotional manager Larry Jones.

A number of early favorites fell by the wayside as early as the first round. The first round consisted of three games with a maximum handicap of 20 pins a game. In this early going John Tinker, one of the favorites, eliminated Lee Ross, 336-513. Bantam bowler Dennis York, who turned in a 210 scratch, eliminated another contender in Gene Rosterola, 587-533. Gary Shearer, the odds on favorite, downed Carl Sheehy 371-443.

Dwayne Singleton edged Don Kowalski 511-459 and another favorite fell before Mike Rainwater's 294. He was Mike Crawley and he lost with a 574. Junior Fred Eck scorched the lanes with a brilliant 660 (600 scratch) to down Dennis Graham who had a 551. Scott Smelter's 573 bested Jim Ruffs' 490. Wayne Begg, another bantam, gained the second round with a narrow 488-442 win over Larry Walker. Pool's 559 topped Bill Richmond's 479. Charlie Eden lost to Mike Alford, 478-407 and Dick Quinn (490) eliminated Steve Bailey (419).

Shearer drew a second round bye. Tinker was then upset by York, 211 - 190. Rainwater remained in contention with a 186. Eck won over Dwayne Singleton, 146 downed Scott Smelter 170-151. Pool over Wayne Begg, 178-138 and Alford, favored now because of the draw, knocked out his foe, 168-149.

York almost pulled another big upset. He lost to favorite Gary Shearer by only four pins, 196-192. Rainwater remained alive by edging Fred Eck, 171 - 168. Darkhorse Pool downed Alford, 199-182.

The final round of the three bowlers competing for the title met on the same lanes with the low score eliminating Shearer. In this round Pool fired a 196. Rainwater a 193 and Shearer a 169. It was the same in the title match with Pool capturing the singles trophy with a 177-172 victory.

Pro Players' Use Of Narcotics Nil

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The chief counsel for the Senate investigations subcommittee said today that a preliminary study, linked to the death of pro football star Gene (Big Daddy) Lipscomb, indicates that there is no extensive use of narcotics by pro grid players.

Jerome Adlerman also said that Senate staff investigators are quietly checking to determine whether there were links between Lipscomb's death and the gambling and narcotics rackets.

Lipscomb, a 290-pound star tackle for the Pittsburgh Steelers, died early last Friday from what authorities presume to have been an overdose of narcotics. Results of tests of Lipscomb's organs are due later this week.

Grelle Predicts Record

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Jim Grelle has predicted he will run the mile in 3 minutes, 54 seconds — a second better than the world record — Friday night against New Zealand's Peter Snell in the Coliseum Relays.

Grelle said Monday he would "not be surprised if the world record falls Friday. Speaking for myself, I feel I can run 3:54.0."

Snell holds the accepted record of 3:54.4. However, Grelle is the only man to beat both Snell and Jim Beatty of America in their specialties.

Beatty faces Murray Halberg in the 5,000-meter run, the co-feature on the Coliseum program. Southern California track writers favor Beatty over Halberg 19-14.

Snell, however, was rated a substantial favorite over Grelle 16-6. Snell and Grelle will compete on the same track where Snell last year set an American record by beating Dwyer Burleson.

In another poll, the writers favored Ron Morris of the Southern California Striders in the pole vault despite the presence of world record holder John Pennel of Northeast Louisiana State at 16 feet 6 3/4 inches. C. K. Yang of UCLA and Formosa was ranked third by the scribes.

"I feel I'm ready to go for the top mark," said Morris, injured since he won the National Amateur Athletic Union (NAAU) crown last year as the nation's top vaulter.

At Fresno, Calif., last week, Morris cleared the bar at 16 feet, 1 inch.

In another individual duel, Bob Hayes and Henry Carr meet in the 220-yard dash. Hayes is sitting out a year of ineligibility at Florida A & M. Carr, of Arizona State University, has a pending world mark of 20.3 seconds on a curve. He also runs the second leg on Arizona State's mile relay team, which will be trying to better its own world mark of 3:04.5.

HONOLULU (UPI)—New Zealand's Peter Snell took time out from his honeymoon Monday to run the 800-yard race in 1:49.5 in an exhibition meet against two University of Hawaii trackmen.

The time was well over Snell's world record of 1:45.1 and his Hawaii guest mark of 1:47.8.

Snell arrived in Hawaii Sunday morning with his bride of two days. They plan to leave Wednesday afternoon for the West Coast, where Snell will participate in several major track meets.

Spokane's Willhite Fires 4-Hit Game

It appears that Spokane's John (Nick) Willhite, the top winner in the American Association last year, has found his stuff in the Pacific Coast League.

After winning 18 games at Omaha in 1962, the 190-pound left-hander started four games in the PCL this season, completed only one and had a 1-2 record with a 5.09 earned-run average.

But he was masterful Monday in shutting out the Tacoma Giants 1-0 on four hits. Tacoma, a farm club of the San Francisco Giants, is the second best hitting club in the league.

In other games, Oklahoma City got six-hit pitching from former Houston Colt pitcher George Brunet to beat Salt Lake City 5-1. Dallas-Fort Worth downed Denver 6-1 behind Ray Jablonski's homer and run-producing single, and Hawaii scored five times in the first two innings and hung on for a 7-5 win over Portland.

Spokane's Rod Graber singled to drive in Bart Shirley with the game's only run in the bottom of the ninth. Willhite, signed by the Los Angeles Dodgers for an estimated \$30,000 bonus, went the route in notching his team's second shutout of the season.

The loss, protested by Tacoma manager Andy Gilbert, dropped the Giants a full game behind pace-setting Seattle in the Northern Division.

The controversy developed when Tacoma's Felix Maldonado ticked foul a third strike into the mitt of Spokane catcher Lib Julian. Gilbert claimed Julian dropped the ball. Plate umpire Frank Deslin, who said his view was blocked by the catcher, ruled that Julian had held onto the ball after consulting with base umpire Russ Goetz.

Tacoma starter Jim Constable pitched four-hit ball through eight innings before being lifted in favor of John Goetz (10-2) who was tagged with the loss.

George Bamberger (2-3) and Jim Rantz combined to pitch Dallas-Fort Worth to its win over the Denver Bears who absorbed their 20th defeat to become the losingest team in the PCL. Bamberger allowed only four hits over the first five innings but was relieved by Rantz in the sixth after being touched for three singles and a run. Rantz allowed only one hit the rest of the way.

In another solid pitching performance, Oklahoma City's Brunet won his first PCL game when the Beers scored three runs in the sixth on three singles, a double and a walk. 20er shortstop Jim Mahoney drove in three runs with a homer and two singles. Salt Lake's Gordon Seyfried (1-3) was the loser.

At Honolulu, the Islanders went to work on starter and loser Paul Seitz of Portland, but then hung on for dear life as Portland kept nibbling away at Islander hurler Dick Sovde. Reliever Bob Duliba finally shut the door on the Beavers.

Charlie Dees led the Islanders with three hits.

White Sox Victim Of LA's Pitching

It's Bo Belinsky who gets the headlines but it's Dean Chance, the junior partner in the Los Angeles Angels' traveling night club, who gets the wins.

And, at the rate they're going, it won't be long before the handsome, 21-year-old Chance becomes the big league celebrity and audacious, fun-loving Bo is just a guy engaged to Mamie Van Doren.

Belinsky is finding things mighty tough in his second year in the big leagues with a 1-5 record to show for 1963 while Chance continues to demonstrate that he's always as ready to answer Manager Bill Rigney's call for pitching help as he is to paint the town—any town—red.

Chance was routed in a mere 1 1/3 innings by the Chicago White Sox Sunday but bounced right back Monday night with a powerful middle-inning relief job that earned him his third victory of the season and enabled the Angels to beat the White Sox, 7-3. The win squared Chance's 1963 record at 3-3—and cut the White Sox' American League lead to one game.

Boston Beats Senators

The Boston Red Sox fired a salvo of seven extra base hits to down the Washington Senators, 6-5, while the Houston Colts got excellent pitching again to beat the New York Mets, 4-2, in the only other major league games played on Monday.

Chance, 14-10 in his rookie season, allowed only one hit and one run in three innings before Julio Navarro inherited a 6-3 lead and closed out the victory for the Angels.

Leon Wagner had a homer and two singles, Jim Fregosi hit a triple and a double and Ed Sadowski had a homer and a single to lead the Angels' 10-hit attack against Eddie Fisher and three Chicago relief pitchers. Jim Landis, Pete Ward and Charlie Maxwell had two hits each for the White Sox, who lost their second straight game after their seven-game winning streak was broken.

Conley Shaping Up

Frank Malzone, Dick Stuart and Bob Tillman homered for the Red Sox, who have won 10 of 13 games at Boston's Fenway Park. Gene Conley, rounding into form after a slow start following his season's work in the National Basketball Association, went 6 2/3 innings to pick up his second victory with the powerful relief aid of Smokey the Bear Radatz.

Radatz, 6-6, 245-pound fireballer rapidly becoming recognized as the No. 1 relief pitcher in the majors, allowed the Senators one hit and no runs over the last 2 1/3 innings.

The Colts rolled to their fifth straight victory when Don McMahon bailed out Bob Bruce in the ninth inning by striking out Cliff Cook with the tying runs on base. Bruce ran out of gas in the ninth after striking out 11 Mets and allowing only three hits in 8 2/3 innings. Johnny Temple had two hits and Rusty Staub a triple for the Colts who tied the idle Milwaukee Braves for ninth place in the NL as a result of the victory.
