

## Water Supply Outlook Bettered By Wet Month

LAKEVIEW — The grim 1963 water supply outlook for Lake County presuited one month ago has been improved by a cool, wet April, according to a recent report of the Soil Conservation Service. Snow has continued to accumulate at higher elevations during April, where normally the spring melt would have brought a reduction in snow water content.

Streamflow was much better than expected during April and produced much-needed increases in reservoir storage. Low elevation waterbeds are still expected to produce poor late season water supplies, unless above normal precipitation continues throughout the irrigation season.

Water content of the snowpack at higher elevations of the area received generous increases during April. A series of cool, wet storms deposited late snow on higher areas while delaying the usual snowmelt that occurs during April in this area.

Soil moisture has continued to increase at lower elevations due to above normal precipitation, while higher elevations remained about the same since much of the moisture fell as snow.

Camas Creek soil moisture station indicates 86 per cent of total capacity. Quartz Mountain shows an increase in soil moisture, but this station is still not showing reliable readings and therefore has not been used for comparison purposes.

Drews Reservoir received good inflow during April and now holds 63,400 acre feet. Last year it held only 37,500 acre feet on May 1 and its average is 37,100. Cottonwood has 8,900 acre feet while last year it held 4,400.

Streamflow forecasts have been raised as a result of good April flows. The Chewaucan is expected to flow 38,000 acre feet or 46 per cent of the April-June period. Deep Creek is forecasted at 49 per cent or 35,000 acre feet for this same period. Honey and Twenty-mile creeks are expected to flow 12,000 and 13,000 acre feet or 74 and 65 per cent respectively.

Drews Reservoir inflow is expected to be 26,000 acre feet or 76 per cent during the April-July period.

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## Russian Trawlers Seen Off Florida

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A congressman reported that two Russian fishing trawlers, loaded with antennae and radar, were located Tuesday in U.S. territorial waters off south Florida. His presumption was they were there to observe the aborted space shot.

Rep. Paul Rogers, D-Fla., told the House he was tipped to the presence of the two ships and that he had confirmed with the Coast Guard their presence inside the three-mile limit just south of West Palm Beach.

Rogers said the Coast Guard, after identifying the ships, was awaiting advice from the Defense Department as to what action to take.

"I urge that the U.S. government take all steps necessary to prevent any further instance of such violations of our territorial waters, and protect our space-testing operations from any possible Soviet espionage," Rogers said.

Rogers said the first of the two trawlers was spotted at 9:15 a.m. and the second at 12:15 p.m. They were described as more than 100 feet in length and "loaded" with electronic equipment.

Rogers' office, amplifying the congressman's remarks, said the word Rogers had was that the Coast Guard took no action other than to locate and identify the vessels. No challenge was issued, according to Rogers' understanding.

The vessels were reported located off Boynton Beach and about two miles south of West Palm Beach. This would have put them considerably to the south of Cape Canaveral but presumably in a good spot to track the launch, had it not been cancelled.

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## House Welcomes Churchill

LONDON (UPI) — Sir Winston Churchill, 81, returned in triumph to his beloved House of Commons for the first time in 11 months.

The elder statesman was greeted with cheers from Conservatives, Laborites and Liberals alike when he made his entrance.

He stayed only 36 minutes, but obviously enjoyed every minute. He appeared frail and showed his age. But he was in good spirits. At one point, when a Conservative speaker made a witty parody of a Labor MP's thrust, the old statesman waved his parliamentary papers in the air.

Prime Minister Harold Macmillan rose to welcome back "our most distinguished member."

Labor party leader Harold Wilson and Liberal party leader Jo Grimond quickly associated themselves with Macmillan's remarks.

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## Haiti Recognition Discussed By U.S.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The State Department said today it is discussing with Latin American governments the possibility of withdrawing diplomatic recognition from Haiti.

U.S. officials claimed the six-year term of Haitian President Francois Duvalier expires Wednesday, although he has declared himself re-elected.

State Department spokesman Joseph W. Reap said the United States therefore is discussing the question of continued recognition of the Duvalier regime "with other American republics."

A number of other Latin American governments have been considering withdrawing recognition.

Reap indicated, however, there was no deadline on the recognition issue. He said the U.S. ambassador to Haiti, Raymond L. Thurston, is remaining in the Haitian capital "in view of the situation in Haiti."

Thurston was to have returned to Washington for "consultations" so as not to be under any official pressure Wednesday.

Reap said Haiti remains "outwardly not as tense" as in recent weeks but said it "still contains elements of potential danger."

He said all 220 U.S. government dependents have been evacuated from Haiti. About 300 to 400 private U.S. citizens out of an American community of 1,300 have left on State Department advice, he added.

Duvalier was elected to office Sept. 27, 1957, and inaugurated Oct. 22, 1957. U.S. officials and Duvalier's opponents in Haiti contend that under the Haitian constitution the president may not serve longer than six years and that his elected term expires Wednesday.

Trees Planted At Mt. Shasta

MOUNT SHASTA — Jim Shiro, Sacramento district ranger at the Mount Shasta Forest Service office, announced this week that over 350,000 young trees were planted on Forest Service plantations in the area this spring, including 2,500 experimental plants.

The largest number, 312,000 two-year-old ponderosa pines, were planted on 735 acres in the Big Canyon plantation south of Mount Shasta, with 37,000 ponderosa pines planted near Spring Hill on 86 acres. The experimental trees, Jeffrey Coulter hybrid and Monterey knob cone hybrid, were planted in the Bolam region.

Shiro said the hybrids were planted to test disease resistance, rapidity of growth, and hardiness of the young trees.

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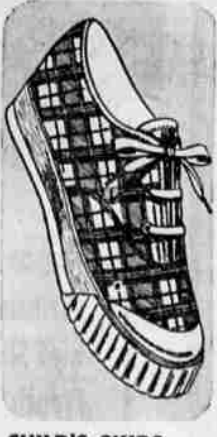
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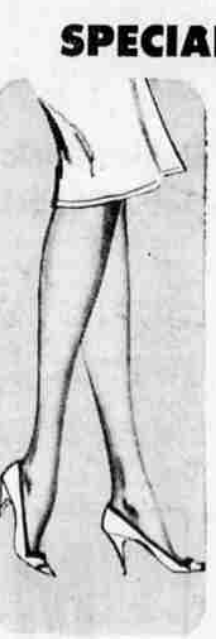
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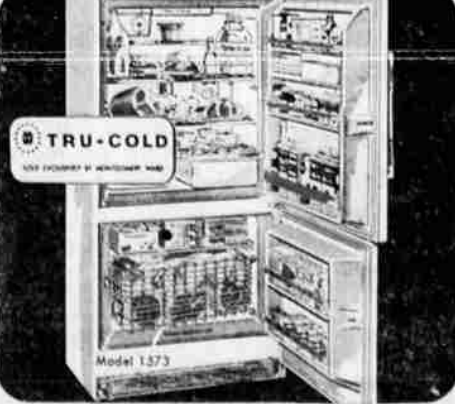
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
