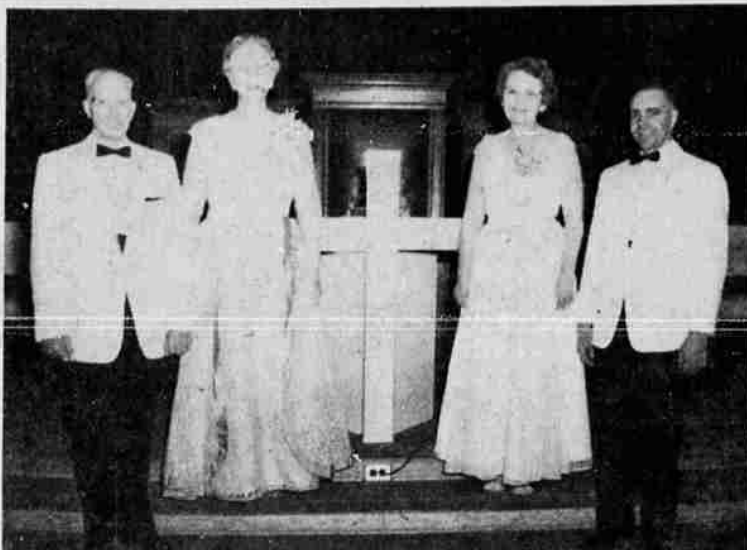
As part of the installation ceremonies, Sandra Ruconich sang "Oh, Lord Most Holy" and "Prayer," accompanied by Barbara Poulshock.
