

Farm Bureau Prexy Urges Wheat Program Opposition

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Charles B. Shuman, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, said today a "no" vote in the May 21 wheat referendum is the only way farmers can get a better farm program.

Farmers will decide in a nationwide referendum next week whether to accept or reject the administration's 1964 wheat program which calls for tight production and marketing controls. Two-thirds of those voting in the referendum must approve the program before it can be put into effect. Shuman hopes to block the program which was authorized by Congress in 1962.

"On the other hand, a 'yes' vote will give impetus to the drive by Washington planners to extend government supply management controls to livestock, dairy, poultry, fruit and vegetable products, and all others not now covered by support and control plans."

"The dollar expenditure being made by the tax-supported propaganda machine built by the USDA to obtain a 'yes' vote is staggering to contemplate. The department is spending a lot of money on ASC (Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation) committee travel expenses, the printing of pamphlets, the making and mailing of radio tapes and TV films and scores of other propaganda activities. This country never has seen such power and might marshaled by the government in an election campaign."

Shuman said he and the Farm Bureau are confident the wheat plan will be defeated. They are also confident that Congress will adopt new wheat legislation in the event the proposed program is defeated in the referendum. Administration leaders including President Kennedy and Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman have said there will be no new wheat legislation.

Summary

The Farm Bureau has summarized its position on the wheat situation in this capsule:

"American Farm Bureau Federation wants to reduce the role of government in agriculture, but believes additional legislation will be needed after the referendum to ease the transition to free markets. Farm Bureau transitional program calls for the termination of government efforts to control wheat production; price supports at the higher of the world price of wheat during the preceding three years or 50 per cent of parity; a range of \$1.25 to \$1.35, with premiums for quality; protection against the use of government stocks to break the market; and a voluntary program to retire cropland for periods of not less than three years for government payments at rates to be established by competitive bidding. The cost of retiring cropland would be more than offset by eliminating the need for costly export subsidies. Land retirement costs in turn would drop support prices and shifted marginal wheat lands to other uses."

Shuman said the Farm Bureau "won't stop working against the administration's wheat program until the votes are counted."

Peronista Pact Sought By Generals

BUENOS AIRES (UPI) — The generals directing President Jose M. Guido's government appeared today to be seeking a political agreement with supporters of ousted ex-President Juan D. Peron.

Maj. Gen. Osiris Villegas, the new interior minister, conferred Tuesday with leaders of the Peronist Popular Union party — the first politicians he has talked with since taking office.

Guido announced Tuesday night that he has appointed Bernardo Bas, a union leader with reported Peronist links, to the post of labor minister in the new cabinet he is seeking to form.

The appointment of Bas, who is regarded as a Villegas ally, apparently was made under army guidance.

Former Interior Minister Enrique Rauch's demand for government reform, led to last week's mass resignation of the cabinet.

So far, Guido has filled four cabinet vacancies and appointed acting heads of three other departments. Eleven posts remain open.

Fire Control Talks Slated For Conference Here Friday

Forest fire control men from Northern California and Southern Oregon will discuss mutual fire control problems at their annual meeting, Friday, May 17, at the Willard Hotel, according to Dan Abraham of the Winema National Forest.

The Klamath Forest Protective Association and the Winema Forest will host the meeting which features panel sessions up to 2:30 p.m., followed by a demonstration of Liston Aircraft's water-scoop. PBV air tanker at a site near Cove Point.

Operating from Upper Klamath Lake, the aircraft will pick up water from the lake and make water drops before the group. Following the demonstration, the party will inspect ground equipment at KFFA headquarters.

Approximately 80 people, representing 20 fire control agencies in the two states are expected to attend the meeting.
