Re-entry Temperatures Tested By X-15 Flight

EDWARDS AFB, Calif. (UPI)—On the X-15's black metal skin. Shooting to the edge of space, the X-15 Tuesday paved the way for coming assaults on its world aircraft record of nearly 60 miles. The flight, by Air Force Maj. Bob Rushworth, was designed to see how fast the X-15 heats up from air friction—a crucial factor when the rocket ship re-enters the earth's atmosphere from high in space.

Rushworth roared to almost 100,000 feet—or 20 miles up—to capture temperature increase rates with more than 600 sensors on the X-15's black metal skin.

In future soaring flights to as high as 75 miles in space, the rocket ship must descend along a precise path, or it can be mangled by re-entry heating.

During his flight at five times the speed of sound, Rushworth rolled the X-15 into a 90-degree bank—one of its steepest yet—to obtain the necessary data for space scientists. He was not seeking highest temperatures.

The X-15's exterior, made of a special nickel-steel alloy, reached rates with more than 600 sensors temperatures of 900 degrees

Dues Use Solution Proposed

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Supreme Court Monday took the unusual step of recommending a British law as a possible solution to a 10-year dispute over use of a U.S. worker's union dues for political purposes.

Justice William J. Brennan Jr., who wrote the majority opinion, suggested that provisions of the British trade union act be applied to a dispute involving southern railway workers who have been objecting to payments under a union shop contract.

Thirty-seven members of the Brotherhood of Railway Clerks and the Brotherhood of Signalmen protested that a part of their dues was used for political purposes. Brennan returned the case to the Mecklenburg County Superior Court in North Carolina, and ordered the 37 to continue paying their dues until the case is settled.

He urged the unions to try to find a voluntary solution outside the courts along the lines of the British law. The history of American industrial relations, he said, shows "that resort to litigation to settle the rights of labor organizations and employers very often proves unsatisfactory."

Brennan attached a copy of the 1946 British Trade Union Act to his decision.

The act provides that unions belonging to the Trade Union Congress, a body similar to the AFL-CIO, may establish political funds by a membership vote. Most English unions have done so and most of the funds go to the Labor party.

Service Station Burglaries Investigated By City Police

City police are investigating burglaries at three service stations, an attempted break-in at Dick Reeder's Store, the theft of \$29 from a cash box at Hillside Hospital and the theft of a soap dispenser at a fourth service station.

A break-in at Dick Reeder's, South Fifth and Main streets, was reported Monday morning. Nothing was discovered missing.

Entry was gained by breaking out a basement door window and fingerprints were found at the scene. A can of oil was used to throw through the window, police said. City police indicated there is a suspect in the case.

An attendant at a service station at 333 Main Street identified Charles Dye, 21, and Walter Rounsull, 19, both of Box 3733, Kingsley Field, as the alleged responsible in the theft of a soap dispenser at the station at about 8:30 p.m. Saturday.

Rabies Clinic Set At Shasta

MOUNT SHASTA — A recently passed Siskiyou County ordinance requires that all dogs in the county over 4-months-old must be vaccinated against rabies. The rabies vaccination clinic will be held in Mount Shasta on June 15 at Dr. Jack Tucker's office from 2 to 4 p.m.

There will be a charge of \$2.50 for each dog, and they must be on leashes or wearing collars when taken to the clinic.

Three feet of snow at Castle Lake may shrink a few inches by Sunday, or it might be deeper by then. They ask everyone to play it safe and enjoy the dock and lake later in the summer.

This is one of several projects carried out by guardsmen, with clubs supplying the material. The men are Army engineers, skilled in field works of various kinds.
