Hearing Set May 24th On Hunting

Big game hunters are advised that a public hearing to consider proposals for the 1963 big game hunting regulations is scheduled by the game commission Friday, May 24, in Room 36 of the State Office Building in Portland. The hearing will begin at 10 a.m.

At this meeting the game commission will hear proposals for regulations on the fall hunt for deer, elk and antelope. Following the hearing tentative regulations for the 1963 season will be established. These tentative rules will be published and sent to all news media in the state.

Following an interval of two weeks, a second public hearing will be held on June 7, at which time the commission will adopt the final regulations for the fall hunt. Any changes to the tentative rules as previously proposed will be made at the June 7 meeting and will become final for the 1963 season.

Hunters are reminded of the place of the scheduled meetings. Because of the added interest shown by big game hunters during the past year, the commission scheduled a large meeting room at the State Office Building located at 1400 S.W. Fifth Avenue in Portland. Previously, the commission has held the hearings at its Portland headquarters.

All interested persons are invited to attend.

Trainer Jimmy Conway, who had to leave for New York Wednesday, filed the entry before he left "just so there will be no slip-up."

And when the box closes, the names of Candy Spots, Never Bend, Sky Wonder, On My Honor,

Lemon Twist and Country Squire are expected to join that of Chateaugay, completing the field of seven.

Although he won the Kentucky Derby by a length and one-half, Chateaugay once again finds himself cast in the role of underdog. For Candy Spots, third in the Kentucky Derby, is pre-race favorite at 7-5 with Never Bend, second at Churchill Downs, second choice at 2-1. Chateaugay ranks third at 5-2.

Candy Spots, winner of the Santa Anita derby and the Florida Derby this year, suffered his only defeat in the Kentucky Derby, many observers blaming jockey Willie Shoemaker for his third place finish.

Shoemaker again rides the son of Nigromante, who now boasts six wins in seven races.

Never Bend, winner of the Flamingo Stakes and the champion juvenile of 1962, will be ridden by Manny Ycaza. The colt is ranked better than Chateaugay because several of his races prior to the Kentucky Derby were easy victories and he is expected to improve with a tough race now behind him.

But Conway warns that Chateaugay will be better too. The trainer no longer is concerned about a fast workout by the Darby Dan farm colt on Tuesday morning when Chateaugay equalled the track record for the mile.

"The track is faster than I had believed it to be and Chateaugay hasn't missed an out since the work, either. He'll be all right for the race, I'm sure of that now," the trainer said before leaving for New York.

Braulio Baeza again rides Chateaugay just as he did in the Kentucky Derby with the son of Swaps out to prove his Kentucky Derby was not a fluke.

Civitan Open Set Today

MUSKOGEE, Okla. (UPI) — The \$9000 Muskogee Civitan Open golf tournament today with most of the leading women pro golfers except defending champion Patty Berg in the field of 33.

Miss Berg, who won the Civitan last year with a 290, notified tournament officials that an injured hand will keep her out this year.

The private little battle between top money - winner Mickey Wright and up-and-coming Marilyn Smith was expected to continue through the 72-hole tournament.

Miss Smith has won two of the six tournaments this year and lost another in a playoff with Miss Wright. Miss Smith has won \$5432 so far this year, her best start since joining the tour in 1957.

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Oklahoma City Open Starting

OKLAHOMA CITY (UPI) — A crowded cast of 148 professionals and 10 amateurs began their assault on the Quail Creek Country Club course today in the first round of the \$35,000 Oklahoma City Open golf tournament.

Defending champion Doug Sanders, Colonial National Invitational winner Julius Boros and New Zealand southpaw Bob Charles, who took the Houston Classic two weeks ago, headline the field.

While it is one of the best groups ever to play in this five-year-old tournament, pro golf's "Big Three" — Jack Nicklaus, Arnold Palmer and Gary Player — are passing it up for a rest.

Par on the 7,050-yard layout is 35-72, and tight fairways with out-of-bounds markers face golfers on most holes.

Sanders engineered a truly remarkable comeback to win the \$5,300 first prize money last year. As the final round began, the jaunty Californian was six strokes behind the leader, Tessa Don Massengale.

But Sanders staged a furious rally and shot a 3-under-par 67 while Massengale stumbled. Sanders capped his onslaught with a 22-foot eagle putt to win by two strokes over Johnny Pott. Massengale wound up four strokes off the pace.

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Policeman Credited By Tony Lema As Getting Him Into Pro Golfing

RYE, N.Y. (UPI) — If he hadn't been stopped by a motorcycle cop for speeding, Tony Lema recalled today, he never would have become a professional and the newest of the big fairway stars.

He had been a caddy, shipyard worker and cannery machine operator before going into the Marines. Shipped home from Korea for discharge, he had played in the Parris Island Marine tournament.

"But I didn't know what I was going to do," he remembered. "Maybe I'd have gone back to the cannery and been a mechanic by now."

It all changed for him when he was speeding home to Oakland. There was the wail of a siren and Tony knew he had been "had."

Cop Recognizes Lema

His first break came when the policeman recognized him and pitched a salute at his Marine uniform. The planned ticket was forgotten as they chatted and the policeman asked him what he planned to do.

"I just don't know," Lema said.

"Well, you always were a pretty good golfer," said the officer. "They're looking for an assistant pro at the San Francisco Country Club. Why don't you give it a try?"

Tony did, and landed the job that same day in 1955. He was there two years and then took a post at Elko, Nev., but still wasn't content with being a teaching professional.

"I wasn't too sure I could

make the grade as a tournament golfer," he reflected as he tuned up at Westchester Country Club where he will be one of the stars of the Thunderbird Classic June 13-16.

Enters Last Event

There was only one way to find out, so Lema went to the Sanford, Fla., Open, the last event of 1957, hoping to finish high enough to qualify for the Los Angeles Open, first event of 1958. He far exceeded his expectations, winding up seventh and earning \$725.

His wasn't one of those immediate success stories, however.

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"I still didn't think I was very good," he added. "For five years my theory was that I'd probably never be back to any of those places on the tour again so I'd better have a good time."

Tony had a good time.

But he didn't win any tournaments.

About a year ago he met an airline stewardess named Betty Cline. It changed Tony's whole outlook.

"When we got serious, I got serious," said the bridegroom of two weeks.

Victories Come Hard

But his first two victories came the hard way. He finally won his first official tournament, the Orange County, after a playoff with Bob Rosburg, and his second, the El Centro, after a playoff with Paul Harney.

Lema's aim now is to smash through in one of the big ones. He came close, finishing one shot back of Jack Nicklaus in the Masters after a final round 70. The next day he played the Augusta course with some of the "wheels" and fired a 67 that came one day late.

In the balloting, DeJordy was given 31 out of a possible 45 points.

Hank Ciesla of the Cleveland Barons, who led the league in goals scored, and teammate Fred Glover followed in the balloting with eight points each. Dave Creighton of Baltimore was next with seven, followed by Ed Chadwick of Hershey, Providence's Fernie Flaman, John McKenzie of Buffalo and Bill Sweeney of Springfield with five points each.

DeJordy compiled a league-leading 2.79 goaltending average last season.

DeJordy Selected MVP In American Hockey Loop

NEW YORK (UPI) — Denis DeJordy, the Buffalo Bisons' steady netminder, walked away with another award today and the money that goes with it.

The 24-year-old native of St. Hyacinthe, Que., was a decisive choice for the American Hockey League's most valuable award. He is only the second goalie in the circuit's history to win the honor.

Johnny Bower is the only other goaltender to win the MVP award. Bower took it three successive seasons, 1953-54, 1954-55, and 1955-56.

DeJordy thus gained all of the possible honors for a player in his position. The young Bison previously had been chosen for the all-star team as well as being given the Harry (Hap) Holmes Memorial Trophy for having the
