Union Asks Cut In Tax

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (UPI) — The AFL-CIO Executive Council has asked Congress to pass an immediate \$10 billion tax reduction for lower and middle income families and at the same time to increase federal spending.

The Economic Policy Committee of the council in annual session said Wednesday such a tax cut would result in higher incomes by families which would immediately be put back into the economy and result in further spending.

Further, the statement said, "any tax reduction policy that fails to concentrate its benefits among low-and-middle income taxpayers — that fails to focus on creating jobs and reducing unemployment — will be opposed by organized labor."

The council, in its resolution, also said any tax reduction should not be accompanied by reduced federal spending.

"Since the top priority objective is to get Americans back to work, the AFL-CIO is unalterably opposed to any effort to accompany tax reduction with cuts in the general level of federal expenditures."

Psychologist Bill Endorsed At Klamath Chamber Meet

A bill requiring the state to certify psychologists received the support of the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce following one of two committee reports made to the chamber during its regular meeting at the Pelican Cafe Wednesday.

The chamber endorsed the legislation on the suggestion of Lloyd Wynne, director of the Local and State Affairs Committee, who made the recommendation on behalf of his committee.

Wynne stated that there is no law requiring practicing psychologists to register in the state.

consequently, people unqualified in the field have been representing themselves as psychologists in some parts of Oregon.

One such incident was made known to the committee by a Klamath County social worker, who reported an instance in which an unqualified person was practicing as a psychologist and marriage counselor in Klamath Falls with "some damaging effects to the community."

The bill, as outlined to the chamber, would authorize the state to certify psychologists with a doctor's degree in their field, but those with a master's degree would be required to serve eight years' apprenticeship under a doctor practicing in psychology before they could be certified.

Wynne said the bill would not affect such people as clergymen who occasionally perform marriage counseling for members of their parishes.

Another bill the chamber endorsed some time ago has been vetoed by the governor, Wynne reported further.

The legislation, House Bill 1551, would have restored to the committee the power of veto over the acquisition of lands by the Department of the Interior. Its passage had been opposed by the Oregon State Game Commission and the Isaac Walton League, among others.

On another matter of state legislation, George Callison, manager of the chamber, announced that Wayne Blair, member of the Local and State Affairs Committee, would depart for Salem today, Thursday, to check on bills of interest to the chamber and which are currently under study by the legislature. Callison said Blair's findings would be reported to the chamber next week.

In the other report, Brooks Dickerman, co-director of the Industrial Development Committee, reported that his committee was preparing to publish a folder and a catalog of statistics dealing with the area.

The folder, containing a map on one side and printed material on the other, would be sent to people inquiring about the vicinity of Klamath Falls. The catalog would go to industries which indicate an interest in relocating here.

Dickerman added that the committee was studying a proposal that it acquire property upon which to construct a building to be made available for lease to industry.

Callison concluded the meeting with an announcement that Oregon Welcome Week, June 1 through 7, would be observed by chambers of commerce throughout the state.

During the special week, representatives of those chambers will inform various groups and organizations within their respective areas of the state's tourist information program.
