## WALL STREET CHATTER

NEW YORK (UPI) — Arthur Wiesenberger & Co. asks "Now that everybody's bullish, should one turn cautious?"

Wiesenberger thinks not: The investment advisory service says that "the long-term trend of stock prices still appears upward, and any near-by reaction against this trend seems likely to be held to minor proportions."

Bache & Co. warns that at this stage the market shows some signs of becoming more selective, and in this light it suggests commitments in selected rails, steels, aluminum and oils.

Martin Gilbert of Van Alstyne, Noel & Co. points out that the stock list had to overcome a lot of resistance when it reached new 1963 highs. Gilbert presumes that these same favorable forces will continue to dominate the market trend for quite some time ahead.

PORTLAND (UPI) — A workman escaped serious injury when he was trapped in a cave-in in North Portland Friday.

Brahrem Hazem, 36, Portland, was buried in earth up to his waist for nearly an hour when a sewer tunnel he was working in gave way. Two other workmen were in the tunnel but were not trapped.

Hazem was treated and released at a Portland hospital. He suffered a fractured foot.

# Small Tax Increase Noted In City Budget

cated that Fairview Park is involved in the current Worden Street improvement and will cost the city about \$5,000 as its share of the paving. He indicated that there are also city owned lots in the Laguna Street project and there will be city owned properties in others.

Another item of \$15,000 has been placed in the street department budget to start accumulation of funds to replace and construct storm sewers as they are needed in the city. Kyle termed the city's storm sewer system as "deplorable," particularly in the downtown area.

Actual increases in the street budget were \$1,000 for salary adjustments, another \$600 for added payroll, expense and an increase of \$1,500 in reserve for building and grounds. In addition, the reserve for equipment was decreased by \$3,000 and the reserve for snow removal dropped by \$1,300.

The decline of about \$18,000 in the general administrative budget comes about with the following decreases: salaries down \$700, surety bond insurance down \$2,000, reserve for office equipment down \$2,500, reserve for city hall down \$1,700, reserve for land acquisition down \$3,000, reserve for economic development down \$2,000, and expected refunds from municipal court fines down \$2,000. Also, the item of prisoner meals for \$7,000 was dropped from this budget and added to the police department budget. Increases in the budget included \$1,000 for other fees and services, \$1,400 for janitorial services, \$250 for mileage, \$300 for city hall heat and \$2,000 for general fund emergency.

The \$80,000 expected increase in city revenues has been itemized as follows: A \$38,000 increase in expected cash on hand to begin the fiscal year, a \$5,000 increase in the amount of delinquent taxes from other years expected to be collected, a \$9,000 increase in franchise taxes, \$500 from amusement licenses and another \$10,000 to be collected in municipal court fines over what was collected last year.

In addition, the expected net increase in the tax levy, after deducting expected delinquent payments amounts to \$17,500.

Kyle indicated that the budget would meet the needs of the city without any levy over and above the six per cent.

He labelled it "an excellent budget," and indicated that it would do some things that needed doing. Among these he listed the start on funds to replace storm sewers, the additional funds available for off-street parking purposes which, he said, would enable the city to assist in the downtown area in solving its parking needs. Currently, the city receives about \$44,500 in this fund. Of this total, about \$35,500 is being carried in the upcoming budget.

When queried about the purpose of the off-street parking funds, Kyle said he doubted there would be much expenditure from this fund this year, but he foresaw a long range need for such funds to aid in "downtown rehabilitation," and indicated that such future use might include city purchase of parking property to aid other parking projects downtown.

Mayor Robert Veatch also termed it an "excellent budget," and indicated that the city "was living within its means." He pointed out, also, that the county had received about \$2,700 from the State Marine Board as its portion of fees collected from boats, and that this amount would in turn be added to the budget to be used in the construction of docks and other facilities for boats at the marina on Upper Klamath Lake.

The budget committee was expected to conclude its deliberation of the budget with one more meeting. It would then be published in the Herald and News, and would be set up for a public hearing at some date in June.

The budget committee is composed of the mayor and five councilmen, plus a group of six others. The other six are Adolph Zamsky, who acted as chairman of the budget committee, Ed Bell, Oscar Shive, Lester O'Field, Robert Thompson and Kasper Moty.

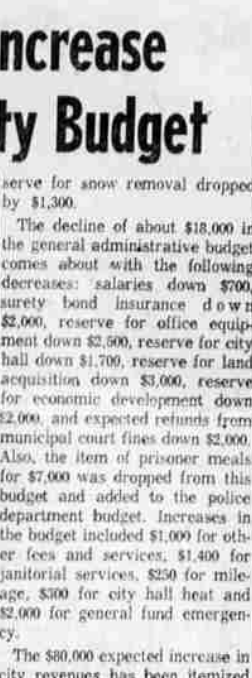

## Easter Granted Venue Change To Bend Court

William J. Easter, 72, charged on two counts of contributing to the delinquency of a minor and also for obtaining money by false pretense, will stand trial on the charges in Bend and not in Klamath Falls, it developed Wednesday afternoon in Circuit Court No. 1.

The change of venue was granted by Judge Lyle Wolff, serving on the bench for Judge David R. Vandenberg who has been away since Monday, following a two-hour hearing in court yesterday during which the attorney for the defendant produced four witnesses, some of whom expressed the belief that Easter would not receive a fair trial in Klamath Falls.

In arguing the case against the change in venue, deputy district attorney, Bob Thomas, produced representatives from three local media who testified that the facts of the charges against Easter had been treated as any other similar news story.

Easter is accused of contributing to the delinquency of a minor girl Feb. 16 and another on March 23. He is further accused of receiving \$125 from a fire insurance company after filing with the firm an alleged fraudulent claim in that amount.

Under a recent county ordinance, all dogs in the county must be vaccinated after they are 4 months old.

of Klamath Falls.

Meanwhile, other dignitaries included in the program will be proceeding via motorcade from the Klamath Auditorium to the site of the ceremony. At the conclusion of the program the senator and his party will return by car to Kingsley Field, where he will deliver the principal address at a dinner to commence at 6:30 p.m.

Following the banquet, Senator Goldwater and his aide, Colonel Pitts, will fly to Washington, D.C., in a twin-engine jet (T-39).

The windup of the parade at noon, Saturday, will mark the beginning of an open house at Kingsley Field, where the public will be treated to close-up inspection of jet and prop type aircraft and other equipment, flybys, parachute jumps, and a "turnaround" demonstration, among others.

Two of the numerous aircraft to be displayed before the public at Kingsley Field include an F-102 Dart and an F-106 Dagger.

The F-102, a single seater General Dynamics airplane, has a ceiling of more than 50,000 feet and carries up to six GAR Falcon missiles and 24 folding fin rockets, if the mission calls for such armament.

The F-106, fastest of the Air Defense Command's fighters with a speed in excess of 1,400 m.p.h., may be loaded with conventional or nuclear warhead missiles. The craft is an improved version of the F-102, having the same silhouette as its prototype. It carries a maximum gross takeoff weight of more than 35,000 pounds, somewhat less than the F-101.

At 12:50 p.m., Colonel Witzensburger will deliver a brief welcoming address to the public and 10 minutes later a flight of F-101s will pass over the field, followed by Marine Corps parachutists who will jump from a Kingsley based C-47 cargo plane.

After dropping the parachutists, the C-47 will make a short "marginal airfield" landing after which troops will be deployed in the manner currently used in the South Viet Nam campaign.

After deployment of the troops, the C-47 will make a maximum power takeoff, as it would be piloted under actual fighting conditions.

At 2 p.m., a turnaround exercise, involving the refueling and rearming of a F-101 jet fighter preparatory to takeoff for another mission, will be demonstrated.

Next on the program will be an honor flight followed by a dinosaur demonstration. The Dinosaur is a massive mobile crane capable of lifting a disabled fighter from a runway in emergencies (an F-101 weighs 20 tons). In last year's demonstration, the Dinosaur was used to crack a single eggshell to show how delicately it can be operated.

Next in order is to be a flyover and landing of a flight of F-89s, a takeoff by an F-101, and the use of a H-43 helicopter in combating fire.

At 3:30 p.m., an F-101 fighter will intercept an "enemy" T-33 aircraft above a runway. The attack will be fully narrated so guests may understand the various phases of the mock battle.

Other flyovers and landings will occur intermittently after 3:30 p.m. and 30 minutes later pilots will begin returning the

display aircraft to their home bases.

On Sunday, the windup of the weekend events will feature a formal program of the hospital site dedication.

Included on the program, in chronological order, are band music by the KUHS Pep Band, under direction of LaMar Jensen; invocation by Msgr. Casey, pastor of Sacred Heart Church; introduction of Rev. ## Girl Held Here Linked With Minister's Arrest

A 17-year-old girl who was a member of a Stockton, Calif., congregation that was required to have intimate relations with its minister is in the Klamath County Juvenile Home.

The story of the minister who satisfied the spiritual as well as the physical needs of his flock was reported in a San Francisco newspaper and stated that the 17-year-old was one of three minor girls assaulted by the Stockton clergyman.

Arrested in Redding with two women companions and transferred to Stockton police was Rev. Claude Bert Carter, charged with rape and lewd and lascivious conduct. Bail for each of the three was set at \$25,000.

In their all-points bulletins for Carter, Stockton authorities charged that the minister criminally assaulted three young girls, ages 8, 11 and 16. Appended to the notation was: "He demands and does have intimate relations with every female member of his congregation regardless of age."

The story in the Bay Area newspaper states that the teenager is pregnant, but Francis Mathews, director of the juvenile home, says this is not so.

Mathews said that information of the Stockton "love-congregation" was reported several months ago to city juvenile officer Ray
