Revenue Raising Plan Opposed

SALEM (UPI)—The House Taxation Committee expressed unanimous opposition Tuesday to a revenue-raising plan approved Monday by the Senate Taxation Committee.

The expression indicated a deadlock between the two houses that is almost sure to send the state's tax program to a conference committee for final decision.

The House earlier this session passed a revenue-raising package based on an income tax bill, a cigarette tax, and a one-shot measure to speed turnover of withholding payments to the state.

The Senate committee completely rewrote the income tax bill to raise \$32 million instead of \$35 million. It junked the cigarette tax and amended the one-shot bill to apply near the end of the 1963-65 biennium only if needed.

Oregon Welcome Chairmen Announced

Gov. Mark Hatfield announced the appointment of community chairmen to coordinate local participation in the Oregon Welcome program.

Serving as chairman for Klamath Falls is R. H. Tisdale, vice president of First National Bank of Oregon. Frank W. Ohlund, manager of the Chilcoquin branch of the United States National Bank, will serve as chairman for Chilcoquin, and Donald A. Pyle, manager of the Merrill office of First National Bank of Oregon, will serve as Merrill's chairman.

Many states have beautiful mountains, picturesque lakes, the fishing streams, sandy beaches, a temperate climate and other natural attractions, as well as excellent facilities which are inviting to the vacationist. Few states come close to having as

much as Oregon has to offer. "Our Oregon Green Welcome Mat program seeks to give that added something to our tourist promotion, recognizing that the tourist will go where he is invited and will remain where he feels truly welcome.

The governor invited all citizens, business firms, organizations and community groups to join in the welcome program and endeavor to make some use of the welcome symbol. He particularly urged that all citizens familiarize themselves with their own local tourist attractions and to be alert with suggestions on interesting places to see and things for the tourist to do.

Governor Hatfield pointed out

that the statewide program has received considerable impetus under the direction of the state Oregon Welcome Committee with Richard J. Turner, Portland advertising executive, serving as chairman. State headquarters for the program are at 322 Pittcock Block in Portland with P.H.I. Hunt, Portland public relations counselor, serving as state coordinator.

The governor urged local citizens interested in participating in the program to contact the local chairman or write to the committee's office in Portland for a brochure outlining the full program.

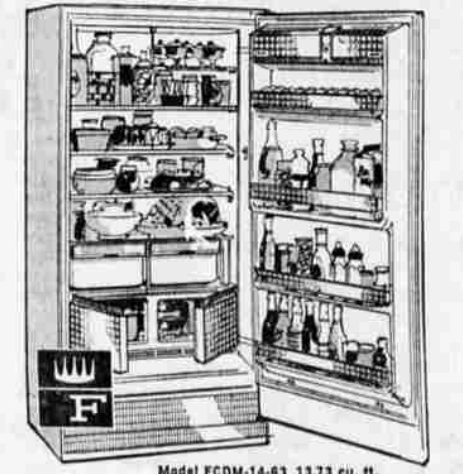

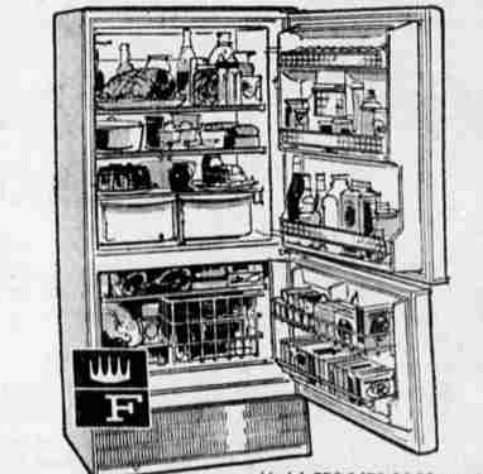

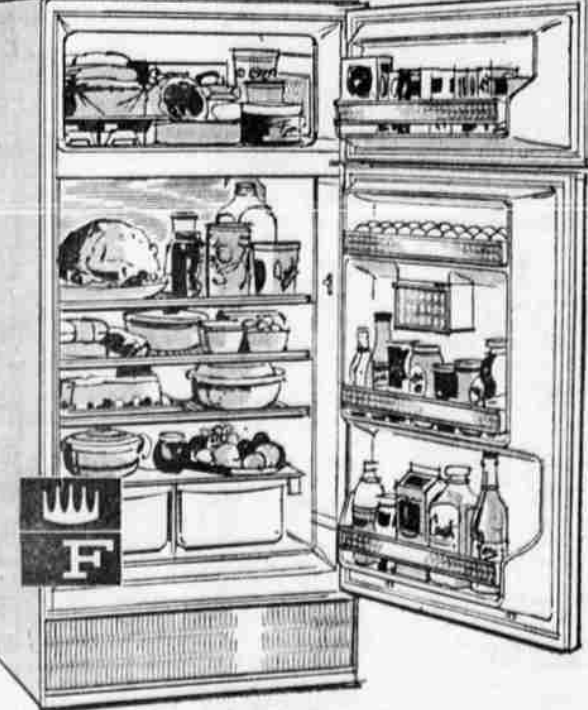
