

Dunsmuir Pool Opens On June 8

DUNSMUIR — The Dunsmuir Community Swimming Pool will open June 8, according to Glen Minuth, pool director, and family season memberships will again be open to those living within the Dunsmuir recreation district.

At the May meeting of the Dunsmuir recreation district, commissioners heard a report by James Bujol, youth activities director, on the dances and social events for high school and junior high school groups at the Community Youth Center.

Bujol termed the seventh and eighth grade response as excellent. He said a high school group has been formed that is self-governing, with adult boys only on smoking, drinking, and leaving and returning while a party is in progress.

Teen-age guests living outside the district are welcome at the dances, Bujol said, but may not be members of the teen clubs. Dances for each group are held bi-monthly at the youth center, and plans are underway for summer activities.

The recreation board approved a sign prohibiting dogs not on leashes from the city park as a measure to preserve the landscaping.

Dear Flag Waver: Thank you for your point of view. Here is another letter on the same subject:

Dear Ann Landers: I was deeply interested in your splendid reply to "Proud American" who complained because foreigners were coming over here taking jobs which should be reserved for "true Americans."

Over the past 10 years more than 100,000 immigrants entered this country, bringing with them skills declared to be in critically short supply in the United States. One of our most serious shortages, according to the U.S. Department of Labor, is in the field of engineering. Of the 100,000 especially skilled immigrants who entered this country in the past decade 31,000 were engineers. This represents 80 per cent of the number of engineers graduated from United States schools during 1961.

Immigrants are making essential and laudible contributions to our country. They are not displacing "true Americans" they are creating jobs for Americans by contributing to this country's economy.—R.N.W. OF THE U.S. COMMITTEE FOR REFUGEES

Udall's Integrated Power System Draws Support From Interior Chief

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A powerful congressional voice backed up Interior Secretary Stewart L. Udall today in his call for a nationwide integrated electric power system.

Rep. Wayne Aspinall, D-Colo., chairman of the House Interior committee, testified during a hearing on a Bonneville power bill. "I am in favor of a complete intertie of all generating facilities in the United States, provided all equities of private, federal and

public generating agencies are protected," he said.

The congressman made the statement while Udall and Charles F. Luce, administrator of the Bonneville Power Administration, shared the witness table.

The witnesses were called to testify on a bill that would give both preference and private electricity users in the Pacific Northwest first call on all hydroelectric power generated at government

plants in the Columbia River Basin.

Reps. John P. Saylor, R-Pa., and Craig Hosmer, R-Calif., are vehemently opposed to the bill. Saylor contends it would crack federal policy on the books since 1902 that municipal and public bodies have first call on federally generated electricity. Hosmer objects to possible restrictions he fears might result on Southern California's right to federally produced power.

Winnemucca Signs Voted

LAKEVIEW—In order to facilitate information on travel points and terminal of the Winnemucca-to-the-Sea Highway, the board of directors of the Lake County Chamber of Commerce voted on May 13 to spend \$1,200 for the erection of signs at four points on the highway.

The signs will be erected east of Winnemucca on Highway 40, at the junction of Nevada 8A and 95; one at Denio; and the fourth on the Sheldon Refuge at the junction of 8A and the road to Cedarville. The signs indicate that the road is the New Oregon Trail.

Spot informational messages will also be broadcast from radio stations in Crescent City, Klamath Falls, Grants Pass, Medford, and Lakeview.
