

KU Pelicans Ease Past Yreka Nine In Doubleheader

Bob Stone Takes Golf Meet Lead

OKLAHOMA CITY (UPI)—Handsome Bob Stone, overcoming a shaky start, carried a one-stroke margin into today's second round of the \$35,000 Oklahoma City Open.

Stone, a part-time touring professional from Junction City, Kan., shot a four-under-par 68 on the tough, windswept Quail Creek course to grab the lead.

Right on his heels came defending champion Doug Sanders, host pro Ernie Vossler, Ken Still and George Bayer, all with 69s.

Two strokes back were nine golfers, including Julius Boros, who won the Colonial Invitational last Sunday, and Rex Baxter, who was four under par and tied with Stone until he double-bogeyed the troublesome 17th hole.

Stone opened on the wrong note. He bogeyed the first hole when he missed the green and muffed a three-foot putt. After that however the demanding par 72 course was no mystery to the Kansan.

He birdied the sixth hole from eight feet away and repeated the feat on No. 9. He sank a birdie putt on the 10th hole from six feet away, hit a 15-foot birdie on the 15th hole and sank a two-foot putt for another birdie on the 18th.

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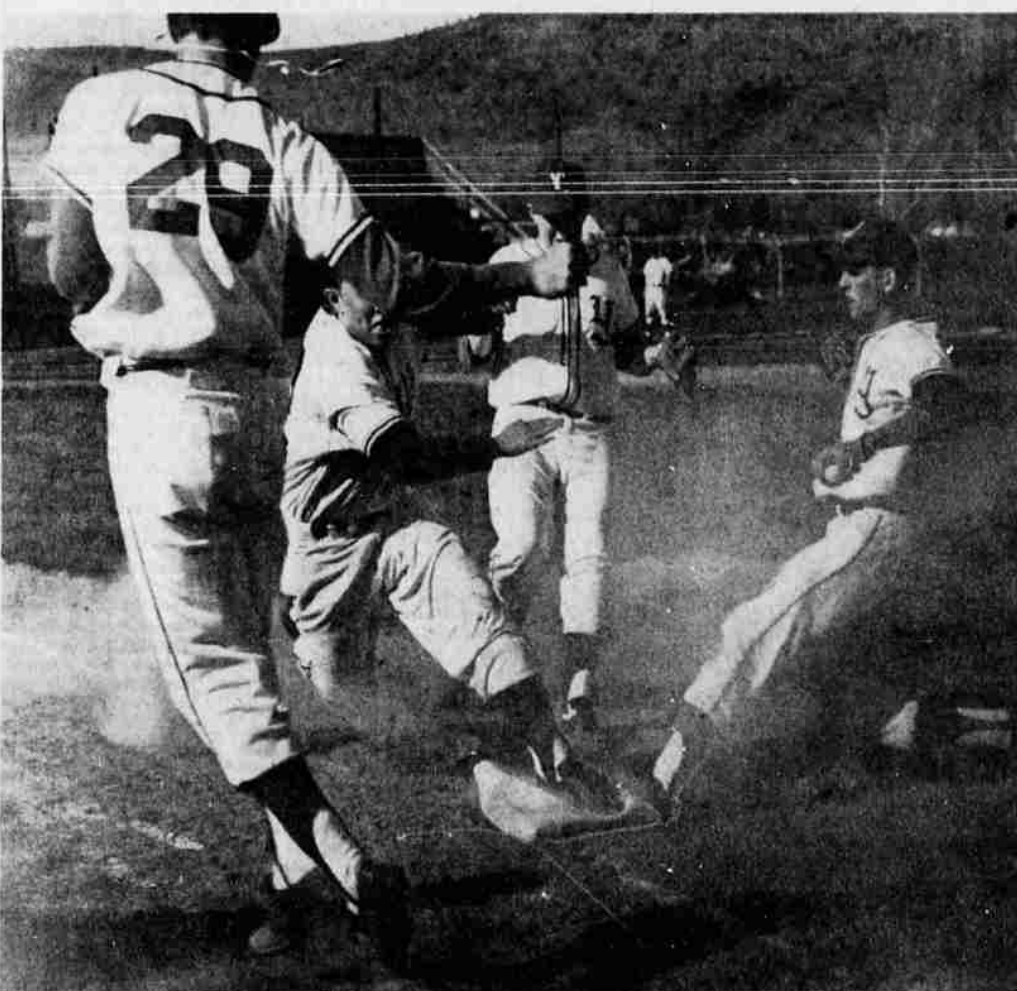

Oregon Tech's 'Sturdy Six' In OCC Track Meet At Ashland

The Oregon Tech track team, six strong, will enter the Oregon Collegiate Conference meet Friday and Saturday at Southern Oregon's cinder track in Ashland.

The Ows' "Sturdy Six" will be heavy underdogs to the powerful Red Raiders of Southern Oregon and the rapidly improving team of Vikings from Portland State. These two teams will be able to out-man the Ows on strength of numbers alone. The other teams entered are Eastern Oregon College and Oregon College of Education. The Ows should capture third place.

The six members representing Oregon Tech will be Ed Cecil, John Maricich, Bob Chard, Bob Bryant, Norm Johns and Wayne Dennis.

Johns will have the best chance of winning. He will enter the discus, his specialty. He will be an underdog in this event to Portland State's freshman Ken Patena. Patena has hurled the discus 159-3. Johns' best throw this season has been 147-5, a new school record.

Maricich and Cecil will be among the leaders in the sprints. Cecil also should place in the 40-yard dash. He will compete in the shot put, too. Maricich will run both dashes and broad jump. Cecil also will throw the javelin. Bob Chard will throw the javelin, discus and shot while Bryant

will high jump, broad jump and run the distances. Dennis will high jump and might run the low hurdles.

Southern Oregon's defending champion Red Raiders face a serious challenge from a fast-improving Portland State Viking team.

Coach Dan Bulkley's SOC cinder team snapped a string of three consecutive championships last spring on the strength of victory in the final mile relay event. The strong Red Raiders dropped the Vikings 76-55 in their dual meeting this spring, but Coach Ralph Davis' Green and White team has shown spectacular improvement in the late season, edging perennial Northwest Conference title holder Lewis and Clark two weeks ago by a 68-63 margin.

The Viks are geared by freshman sensation Ken Patena in the shot and discus, NAIA defending champion Steve Cortice in the javelin, middle distance star Don McMillan in the mile and half mile, and high jumper Phil White.

Southern Oregon's bid will hinge on Bulkley's over-all team depth to back up sprinter Doyle Branson, pole vaulter Spike Gordon and Mike Hanby, both 14-footers, and hurdler Bill White in addition to versatile Fred Thomas.

Pels Host Bend Lava Bears Today After Rally Wins

The Klamath Union Pelicans, scrapping back in both contests, beat the rugged Yreka Miners in a non-conference doubleheader makeup set Thursday at Modoc Field, 3-2 and 5-1.

Coach Bill Mansfield, without leading hitter Mike Kitching and using substitute pitchers and savers, aces Gary Benson and Rich Jackson for Modoc Saturday, got the most from his players. The Pelicans will take on the Bend Lava Bears in another non-conference game today at Gem, starting at 3:30. Rich Grow and Kim Koon probably will be among the staff of pitchers used by Mansfield.

The Pelicans saw one of the best pitchers in the first game that they've seen all season. Dave Bennett, who started for Yreka, had the Pelicans hitless for four innings when he retired in place of Rod Wolf who came in from first base. Bennett pitched a no-hit game against Ashland only Wednesday, the day before.

With Bennett off the mound, the Pelicans went to work on Wolf and pulled the game out of the fire with freshman pitcher Bob Moore settling down after a shaky first frame to win the game, 3-2. The Pels pounded out a 5-1 second game win in five innings.

Bennett, whose brother Dennis now pitches for the Phillies, was flawless, although perhaps a bit tired after the Wednesday game. He didn't allow a hit to the Pelicans in the four frames he worked. Only two balls were out of the infield.

Meanwhile, the Miners had gained two runs off Moore. Rich Morton led off the second with a double. He tried to score on Bennett's single to center but a sensational peg by Curt Coleman sliced him down at the plate with 10 feet to spare.

That, however, wasn't enough. Moore hit Ken Keyes and allowed Mark Root to single. Mike Nevens popped out for the second out but catcher and ninth batter Jerry Campbell angled to left center to plate Bennett and Keyes. Moore was flawless after that inning.
