

Giants Keep Lead, Bums Second In NL; Red Sox Take First Place In American

Dissension Absent On Dodger Club

Whatever happened to all that dissension among the Los Angeles Dodgers?

Manager Walt Alton says everytime he picks up a newspaper he reads about dissension on his ball club.

He probably isn't doing much reading lately or he would have noticed a conspicuous absence of such stories.

Eight victories in 11 games will do it all the time and that's been the Dodgers' pace since May 3 when they began climbing from seventh place. They're second now and have apparent designs of moving even higher.

Southpaw Johnny Podres scored his first victory in more than three weeks Thursday night when he went the distance for the first time since April 24 in beating the Pittsburgh Pirates 1-0.

Podres scattered seven hits, struck out five and walked only one as he took only an hour and 30 minutes to record his second victory of the season.

Loser Don Schwall also gave up seven hits, including two in the ninth inning that did him in.

Gilliam Scores Winner

Jim Gilliam opened the ninth with a single, moved up on a sacrifice and went to third on an infield out. Wally Moon was purposely passed and John Roseboro followed with a single to center that scored the only run of the game.

The league-leading San Francisco Giants kept pace by edging the New York Mets 6-5, the Chicago Cubs clipped the Cincinnati Reds 2-0, the Milwaukee Braves completed a three-game sweep against the St. Louis Cardinals

5-2, and the Philadelphia Phillies continued their mastery over the Houston Colts 5-2.

Only three games were played in the American League, with the Cleveland Indians defeating the Chicago White Sox 5-4, the Baltimore Orioles beating the Washington Senators 9-1, and the Boston Red Sox taking over first place with a 3-0 win over the Los Angeles Angels.

Willie Mays and Willie McCovey each connected for his sixth homer of the season with one on in the Giants' victory over the Mets. Southpaw Billy O'Dell ran his record to 5-0 although Gaylord Perry had to rescue him when the Mets rallied for four runs in the sixth.

Shuts Out Reds

Larry Jackson whitewashed the Reds on six hits to register his fifth victory in nine decisions for the Cubs. Loser Jim O'Toole, now 6-3, allowed only four hits in the seven innings he worked, with Ernie Banks singling home the run that was enough to beat him in the seventh.

Eddie Mathews' three-run homer off Ray Washburn highlighted a four-run first inning rally that assured the Braves their victory over the Cardinals. Lefty Denny Lemaster held the Cards scoreless until the ninth when he was nicked for homers by Stan Musial and Gene Oliver.

The Phillies' victory over the Colts was their 21st in 23 games since Houston entered the circuit. A two-run homer by Don Demeter that helped hand Dick Drott his first defeat. Ray Culp limited Houston to five hits in six innings and gained his fourth victory although Jack Baldschun had to halt a two-run rally in the seventh.
