NEW YORK (UPI) — Investment adviser James L. Frazer points out that until now the public has bought only quality stocks and occasionally a low price stock that had "instant appeal."

"Public participation in sound secondary issues has been negligible," he says. "And as a result, numerous secondary stocks have grown in investment caliber and are available at a very reasonable price-earnings ratio."

R.E. Buchsbaum of W. E. Hutten & Co. says that even though the market may not have serious excesses to correct it is still "possible that it may have to back track a bit before meeting head on the strong seasonal influences always evident in late June through early August."

Elton Janeway says "it looks like the Dow-Jones industrial average is headed towards 600 and maybe beyond. No doubt it may have a sinking-spell back into its recent area but this will only be temporary. The important thing is that a big move has got underway."

NEW YORK (UPI)—Strength in sugar issues featured an otherwise narrowly mixed stock market today.

Gains in the sugar group have reflected a series of boosts in the price of refined sugar. Holly and Malmagated paced the sugar leaders.

Du Pont and Rohm & Haas rose about a point apiece in the chemicals. Steels were mixed but Chrysler rose roughly 1 in a steady climb to section. Oils weakened fearing General American and Amherst nearly a point each.

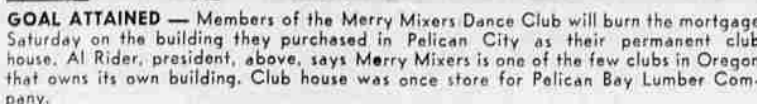

Merry Mixers, organized about eight years ago with a few couples. The club is one of the oldest in Oregon. Present membership is 72 couples.

A jury of six men and six women returned a verdict of guilty against Byron Patt, 21, charged with assault and battery by means of force likely to do great bodily harm, it developed in circuit court late Thursday night.

The vote was 10-2 with two men opposing the majority. Judge Lyle Wolff received the decision at 10:36 p.m. and set 10 a.m., Wednesday, May 22, as the time for the passing of sentence.

The jury was impaneled within 35 minutes early Thursday and began deliberating at the close of the trial, about 5 p.m. Excluding a recess for dinner, the jury deliberated four hours before agreeing on the verdict.

Patt, a Warm Springs Indian, was accused of assaulting Rudy Saluskin in a Fort Klamath motel during the weekend of March 16. The attack developed after the two men had an argument about the results of the Indian basketball tournament held earlier this year in Chiloquin.

Bill Lorenz Death Told

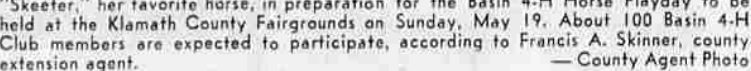
