

Three Persons Hurt In Traffic Crashes

Three persons received injuries in two traffic accidents reported by city and state police Thursday.

Injured were John M. Shirley, 53, 301 South Eighth Street, Nancy A. Groves, 30, 4406 Onyx Street, and Roberta G. Warner, 427 Denver Street.

Shirley received minor leg and hip injuries in a crash reported by state police on U.S. 97 near Sand Creek. The accident occurred at 11:25 a.m. Wednesday as Shirley attempted to pass a truck driven by John Houston, 35, Route 1, Box 610, as the truck was turning into a service station. According to police reports, Shirley's car collided with the back of the truck as Shirley tried

to swerve back into the right-hand lane.

Damage to the truck was minor, but Shirley's car was damaged extensively.

The two women were injured when the Groves' car collided with a vehicle driven by Shirley O. Hoffman, 25, 4481 Memorial Lane, on the Sixth Street viaduct, Wednesday at 10:45 a.m.

Mrs. Groves complained of knee and wrist pain and a passenger in her car, Roberta G. Warner, 427 Denver Avenue, received cuts and bruises on her forehead. Neither woman was hospitalized. Both vehicles received moderate damage and no citations were issued.

According to city police reports, both cars were traveling west on the left-hand lane over the viaduct while city street cleaners were working in the right-hand lane spraying the street.

Water from the hose struck Mrs. Hoffman through an open window and she stopped her car, and the Groves car collided with it.
