



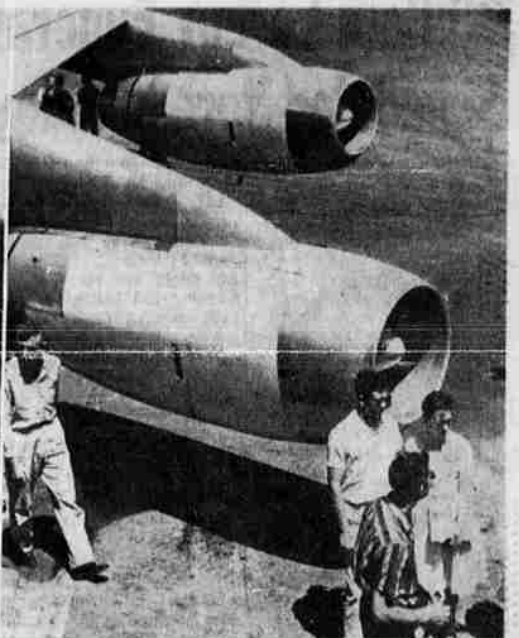

The carpet must be provided by the town of Abergavenny.

This year it was different. There was no red carpet. There was no red carpet because the town could no longer afford to buy or rent one. A special tax would have had to be levied, and the town fathers came to the conclusion that the people just couldn't afford to pay any more taxes.

What do you think about it?

In San Francisco, postmen have begun arming themselves with a new weapon for their everlasting combat with the dog kingdom.

As a part of a four-city test in the Bay Area, some 500 mail carriers are to be supplied with a new anti-dog weapon called Halt. It consists of a mixture of ordinary mineral oil and capsaicin—an extract of cayenne pepper. Each carrier volunteering for the test program will be supplied with small half-ounce aerosol containers loaded with the mixture. The idea is that when the dog starts to bite the postman will spray the stuff in the canine's face.

Preliminary tests show that dogs thus sprayed put their tails between their legs and beat a hasty retreat. In most cases, the experiments show, dogs exposed a time or two to the stuff never again attack a postman.

The experiment is to be carried out over a fairly wide area. In addition to the Bay Area, postmen in Baltimore, Miami and Detroit will be supplied with the anti-dog weapons.

They will be expected to keep track of the number of times they are bitten and the number of times they succeeded in repelling canine attackers. The experiment will be carried out over a period of three months and if it proves successful mail carriers throughout the nation will be supplied with the Halt equipment.

Well, our kindly old Uncle is to be congratulated because of his solicitude for his employees, but it just might be that he is picking the wrong kind of individuals to be mail carriers.

Up in the Hot Springs district here in our own city there has been for many years a mail carrier who has no need for anti-dog contraptions. Each morning, he is joined at a certain point on his route by a friendly neighborhood dog that conveys him all the way around. Never, so far as known, has he been even looked at crosswise by any of the numerous canines of the vicinity.

Hawaii Crowds Greet Astronaut

HONOLULU (UPI) — Astronaut L. Gordon Cooper who rocketed to glory by orbiting the earth more than 22 times stepped back on United States soil Saturday to accept greetings from proud fellow countrymen and keep a sentimental reunion with his wife.

He was flown to Hickam Air Force Base by Navy helicopter from the USS Kearsarge, the aircraft carrier recovery ship. Cooper's brief flight from the carrier ended at Hickam at 7 p.m. EDT. It was the first time since blasting off from Cape Canaveral Wednesday that America's longest flying space pioneer had touched solid ground.

A crowd of about 2,000 was on hand for the astronaut's arrival, and cheered when his wife Trudy ran tearfully to greet him. Cooper's two daughters, Camala, 14, and Janita, 13, were right behind to greet their now famous father.

Mrs. Cooper threw her arms around her husband and kissed him.

The 36-year-old former jet pilot then took his wife firmly by the

U.S. Shows Disapproval Of Duvalier

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States has interrupted diplomatic relations with Haiti as a gesture of "disapproval" of the dictatorship of President Francois Duvalier, officials disclosed today.

The action was taken Wednesday, the day the United States claimed Duvalier's term of office legally expired, but was not made public.

U.S. Ambassador in Port au Prince Raymond L. Thurston and his staff were instructed then to have no "formal" contacts with the Haitian government.

State Department officials said, however, the action was technically not a "suspension" of relations. They said the U.S. position remained flexible and contacts could be resumed at any time as long as nothing had happened, if the need arose.

Fire Closure Starts May 21

SALEM (UPI) — Closed fire season will begin Tuesday (May 21) in the Klamath Fire District, and portions of the Rogue and Fremont National Forests, the state forester announced Friday.

The fire season begins Friday (May 24) in all of western Oregon, and most of eastern Oregon.

Eastern Oregon exceptions are Umatilla, Wallowa and Baker counties, and the Vale - Burns grazing district in Malheur and Harney counties.

Burning permits will be required after the beginning of fire season, the forester declared.

Barry Goldwater Address Highlight Of Ceremonies

Sen. Barry Goldwater (R-Ariz.) will be the top speaker at ceremonies dedicating the almost-\$3,000,000 Presbyterian Intercommunity Hospital in Klamath Falls today.

The ceremony is scheduled to get under way at 2:45 at the hospital site adjacent to Oregon Technical Institute site. To reach the site, go north of Klamath Falls on Highway 97 and turn right onto the new OTI access road. Drive to the end of the road where attendants will guide motorists to parking facilities.

In addition to Senator Goldwater, the dedication ceremonies will be highlighted with the appearance of regional, state and area dignitaries.

Senator Goldwater is a major general in the Air Force Reserve and will be guest of honor at Kingsley Air Force Base Sunday night in activities concluding Armed Forces Week. More than 20,000 persons participated in exercises at Kingsley Saturday.

Senator Goldwater will fly from Phoenix, Ariz., to Kingsley Field Sunday afternoon. From there, he will be flown by helicopter to the hospital site. A color guard will escort him to the speakers' platform.

Present on the speaker platform will be county and city officials, hospital association officers and directors, hospital planners and architects, area Air Force officers and others.

Among the Air Force high officers will be Maj. Gen. Henry Spicer, 25th Air Division Commander, McChord Field, Tacoma; Col. Leon W. Grey, Portland Air Defense Sector Commander, Adair Air Base, Corvallis; Col. Ed Witzgenberger, commander, Kingsley Air Force Base, and Col. William Pitts.

Also on the platform will be Klamath Falls Mayor Robert Veatch; Rt. Rev. Msgr. T. P. Casey, pastor Sacred Heart Catholic Church; Ross Ragland, president, Presbyterian Intercommunity Hospital Association, Inc.; Rev. John O. Color-Troubled Southland Welcomes Kennedy On Tour

HUNTSVILLE, Ala. (UPI) — Gov. George C. Wallace of Alabama greeted Kennedy with a stiff handshake.

The President stopped first at Nashville, Tenn., where he attracted a crowd of 200,000 persons — by far his largest of the day.

He told a capacity audience of 32,000 in Vanderbilt Stadium at Nashville that the South must put aside prejudices that have led to recent racial disorders. His remarks were cheered.

From Nashville he proceeded to Muscle Shoals, Ala., for a talk marking the 20th anniversary of the Tennessee Valley Authority.

Gov. Wallace, who just a few hours before filed a suit in the U.S. Supreme Court demanding the withdrawal of troops from Alabama, was there to meet the Chief Executive.

Wallace greeted the President politely and stood listening while Kennedy delivered a brief address praising the work of TVA.

Later the President and Wallace

flew to Huntsville together in the same helicopter and briefly discussed the Birmingham racial situation en route. Details of the discussion were not disclosed.

The junior rodeo queen will also be crowned at that time. Qualifications for the roundup queen are that she must be between 16 and 18, reside in the Klamath Basin, and be able to ride, of course. The junior rodeo queen must be under 16 years of age.

Stock for the roundup will be furnished again this year by Cotton Rosser. His rodeo stock has become famous as the top bucking stock of the circuit. Among the saddle broncs in his group is the famed "Astronaut," one of the nation's top bucking horses.

Rosser has provided most of the rodeo stock for movies and television rodeo performances.

House Drops Death Penalty

SALEM (UPI) — A proposal to strike capital punishment from the state constitution was approved 45-15 Friday by the House.

The measure would be voted upon at the 1964 general election, and would apply both to the present and proposed state constitutions.

But the House sent back to committee a companion measure which would have set the statutory penalty for murder at life in prison.

Rep. John Dellenback, R-Medford, said he wanted the bill amended so the death penalty could be retained in cases of capital killing, a prisoner killing a guard, and the killing of a kidnapping victim.

Both the proposed constitutional change, and the statute already have passed the Senate.

The Senate version changed the constitutional penalty for first degree murder from death to life in prison. The House amended this to delete all reference to murder from the constitution, and the Senate must agree with this before the measure can go to the voters.

JFK Plans Papal Visit

VATICAN CITY (UPI) — President Kennedy's decision to visit Pope John XXIII next month instead of waiting until next year caused speculation today that his plans were based on reports of the 81-year-old pontiff's failing health.

Kennedy originally planned to confine his June visit to Italy to Milan, then to return next year, when Mrs. Kennedy will be able to travel, to visit Rome and presumably the Vatican.

But Pope John has seemed haggard and worn in recent public appearances, giving rise to reports that the stomach ailment that kept him in bed last fall has returned.

Presiding at the dinner was Bryant Williams, manager of the Klamath Falls Federal Land Bank Association. Master of ceremonies was Bob McCambridge, former Klamath County assistant county agent, now residing in Kansas City, Mo. McCambridge is with Chem-Agri Corp.

Speakers included C. A. Henderson, former Klamath County extension agent, and Walter Jendraczewski, who succeeded Henderson. They paid tribute to the efficiency of Vertrees and the

technical knowledge he displayed while a staff member of the extension office here.

Rev. Robert Groves, pastor of First Presbyterian Church, paid tribute to Vertrees as "a knowledgeable and responsible citizen — a person we love and respect, not as a member of the extension office, but a citizen we love and appreciate."
