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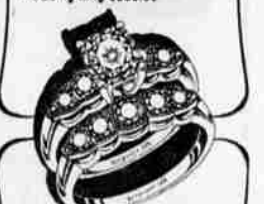

Mrs. Poole presented each girl with a seed pod, Job's tears, which she had brought from Hawaii.

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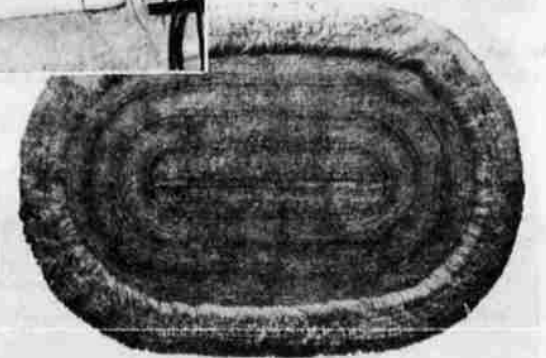
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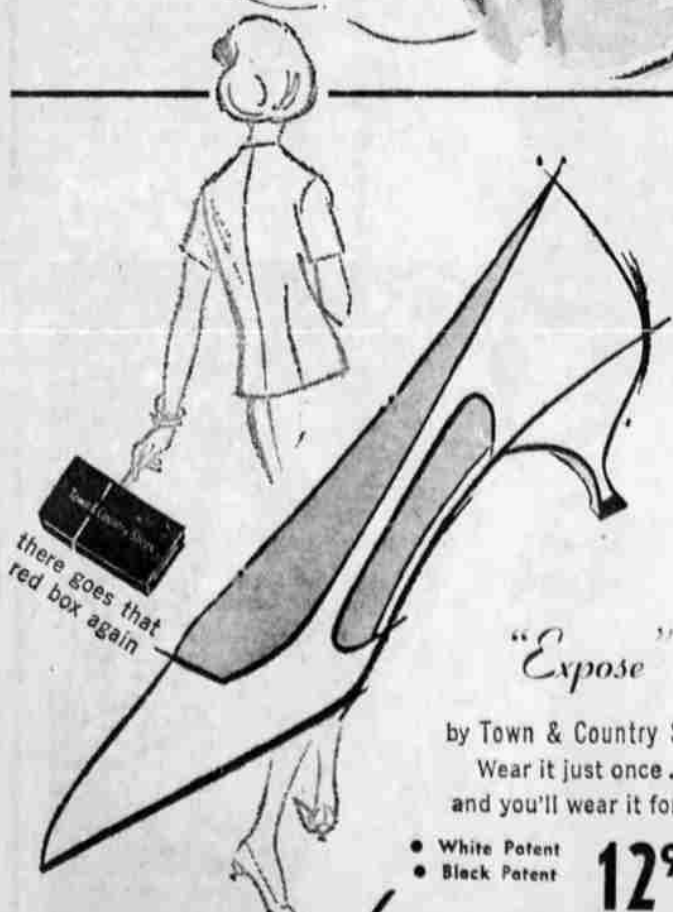
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
