

William Lorenz Funeral Scheduled Here Monday

Funeral services for William Lorenz will be held at 1:30 p.m. Monday, May 20, in O'Hair's Memorial Chapel. Interment will be in Lakerville Cemetery.

Lorenz, 55, died Friday, May 17, in Hillside Hospital from a lengthy illness.

Mr. Lorenz was born June 15, 1896, at Elk Creek near Willows, Calif. He was educated in the local public schools and was

apprenticed in the plumbing trade when he was 15-years-old. After attaining journeyman status, Mr. Lorenz moved to Klamath Falls in 1916, and was employed by his brother, G. C. Lorenz, owner and operator of a plumbing and heating firm.

In 1923, the Lorenz brothers with Bert Igl incorporated Lorenz Company, and William Lorenz was plumbing and heating foreman of this firm for many years.

In 1929 he sold his interest and operated his own firm until 1940. He moved to Chilquin that year and opened a grocery and meat market. He sold this business to Clyde Leake in 1960.

Mr. Lorenz retained his property interests in and near Chilquin and built some houses besides re-entering the plumbing and heating field in that area.

He was active in his work until the early summer of 1962 when he was stricken with the illness which claimed his life.

Mr. Lorenz served as mayor and councilman of Chilquin for 12 years. He was a member of the City Budget Committee and Park Board for many years. He was one of the first original organizers of the Chilquin Recreation Area Council which stimulated his great interest in youth activities.

He donated 15 acres in West Chilquin to the city for a park and a playground for youth activities.

He was a veteran of World War I, a member of the American Legion, a 35-year member of the Elks Lodge and held a perfect attendance in the Rotary Club for many years.

Mr. Lorenz was also active in political affairs and was a member of the Klamath County Republican Central Committee for many years.

In 1925 he was married to Claudia Spink who survives him.

Senior M.Sgt. Raymond Milam Jr. was selected to represent Kingsley Field in the Air Force Outstanding Airman of the Year competition.

The selection was based on Sergeant Milam's outstanding military record, leadership and working abilities. He will compete with other outstanding airmen within the 25th Air Division for the honor of representing the Air Defense Command at an Air Force Convention later this year.

Sergeant Milam is the non-commissioned officer in charge of the base fuel supply branch. Under his training methods, the 400th Fighter Group has reduced its "turnaround" rate by more than 30 per cent, making it the fastest in the Air Defense Command.

Pay Raises Given Ways, Means Okay

SALEM (UPI)—Some \$5.1 million in pay raises for college teachers and state employees, over and above automatic merit raises, was approved Friday by the Ways and Means Committee.

Acting on a 21-bill agenda, the committee also:

— Turned down raises for the governor, secretary of state, treasurer, attorney general and labor commissioner.

— Approved a bill to broaden Oregon's two-year-old program of hospital and nursing home assistance for the elderly.

— Okayed a new circuit judge for Washington County, but rejected one for Lane County and one for the Polk-Yamhill district.

— Approved a bill revising the public employees retirement system.

— Recommended a bill to let the Welfare Commission liberalize the food stamp and surplus food programs.

— Approved the establishment of new district courts at Grants Pass and at Gresham.

— Restored a \$750 appropriation for the Rogue River Coordination Board that was turned down earlier by the House.

— Approved district judge salary increases from \$10,500 to \$11,000.

— Okayed budgets for the State Scholarship Commission, the state Labor - Management Relations Board, the secretary of state, and four state institutions.

The sum approved to raise salaries for college faculty members during the 1963-64 biennium was \$1.5 million, compared to \$2.0 million sought by the governor. Rep. John Mosser, R - Beaverton, was unsuccessful in trying to get the committee to increase the sum.

The committee approved \$1.6 million for state employees. The governor had asked \$4.4 million.

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Reception To Honor Ferguson School Principal Retiring After 30 Years

Alvin C. Olson, who has taught school in Klamath County 30 years, and who is retiring at the close of the present school year, is to be honored with a reception, Sunday, May 19, at Twyla Ferguson School where he has been principal for seven years.

Hosts will be the Parents and Patrons. The public is invited. Hours will be from 2 to 5 p.m. The honored guest has devoted much of his lifetime to education.

He is a native of Del Rapids, South Dakota. He attended Morning Side College at Sioux City, Iowa, and came to Oregon to work in a brother's hotel at North Bend.

He attended the University of Washington, then accepted a teaching position at Warm Springs for a few months, served as principal for two years at Tulalip Indian School near Seattle and in a rural school in Montana before coming to Klamath County in 1924.

He had two years each at Beatty and Bonanza, and after a return to the University of Washington, was at Malin and Altamont Junior High School before his last appointment to Twyla Ferguson.

He was married to Nelle Thomas, also a Malin teacher, while teaching there.

His faculty at Twyla Ferguson nominated him for Elementary Principal of the Year in 1962, citing him for providing access to the gymnasium before and after school hours for benefit of the students; his assistance with recreation "off hours," supervision of students during lunch hours and many other acts beyond duty.

He has provided special attention for lagging students, has taught at every elementary grade level, has assigned his teachers to subjects they are best fitted for and has advanced many creative ideas for improving instruction procedures.

As a leader in the community Mr. Olson organized and worked with Boy Scout troops for over 30 years, and served on the adult committee; served as Justice of the Peace two years, has been a 4-H Club leader, summer missionary for the Methodist Church, has been a Sunday School teacher 30 years, conducted Church Vacation Bible School for 15 years and has been a church elder charter member and organizer at Peace Memorial Presbyterian Church where he served as Sunday School

Superintendent for nearly a quarter of a century.

Mr. Olson has taught many two generations in families and knows his more than 500 students by name.

His personal plans have not been announced.

Mr. and Mrs. Olson have one son, Neal Olson, and three grandchildren.

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Tax Discussion Clouded By Referendum Threat

SALEM (UPI)—The threat of a referendum by the voters clouded Saturday's meeting of the Senate-House Tax Conference Committee.

Senate Tax Committee Chairman Boyd Overhulse, D - Madras, was named committee chairman as the four-man panel began discussions at 9:30 a.m.

Others on the conference committee were Sen. Robert Ellstrom, R-Salem, House Tax Committee Chairman Richard Eymann, D-Marcia, and Rep. Victor Atiyeh, R-Portland.

The group was told by a tax commission representative that the state would probably end the present biennium with more than \$100,000 surplus.

Committee members estimated the proposed 1963-64 budget would be about \$465 million, and that \$60 million in new money was needed to finance the state's operations for the coming biennium.

Early discussion centered around the House-approved 4-cent pack cigarette tax.

Ellstrom commented "we would be spinning our wheels by passing a cigarette tax, it would be referred."

Atiyeh agreed it probably would be referred, but he said he felt the people would approve a cigarette tax. "They don't want all this increase piled on the income tax, the people recognize this is a way to get needed revenue."

Overhulse said he felt there was a 50-50 chance the Senate would approve a cigarette tax if they were "convinced" it was needed.

Conferees were relaxed but sincere as they tackled the job of reaching agreement on amount and method.

The House — approved plan would raise \$35 million from income tax hikes, \$12 million by a one-shot, speedup of withholding tax collections, and \$18 million from a 4-cent pack cigarette tax—a total of \$65 million.

The Senate-approved plan would raise \$32 million from increased income taxes, and use the \$12 million one-shot money only if needed—a total of \$64 million.

Three Planes Miss Field

REDDING, Calif. (UPI) — An attempt to put the city out of the airport business was begun Friday following the third light plane crash in two weeks at city-owned Benton Airport.

All three pilots walked away with little more than scratches after their planes overshot the runway, bounded across a public highway and stopped in a ravine.

Following the first such landing May 1, the federal aviation agency checked the field and declared it safe.

Petitions which would put before city voters the question of whether the city should continue operation of the airport were circulated Friday by former Mayor Bud Puryear.

A little over a year ago, voters decided that the city should not only keep the airport but make several improvements.

Mayor George A. Martin said the city council will consider an expenditure of \$100,000 to improve the field "sometime in the future."
