Play Gains From Error

South played dummy's four of clubs on West's deuce. East won the trick with the ace and returned the eight of diamonds. South played low and West's jack held the trick.

A club lead put South in dummy and he promptly led the queen of trumps. East covered with the king and South cashed his ace and jack. Then he led the jack of spades to East's queen.

East returned the five of diamonds and South went right up with the ace.

By this time South was quite sure that he had counted the hand perfectly. He assumed West had opened a fourth best club and that East's diamond plays had indicated a doubleton. Each opponent had shown up with two trumps so South was convinced that West had started with four.

Therefore South led a spade to dummy's ace and returned the ten. East ducked quickly, but South was sure of his count and promptly discarded the queen of diamonds on the ten of spades.

"Nice play," said North.

"Right," said West. "My partner deserves half the credit. If he had played the jack of clubs at trick one South would not have had enough entries to dummy to make the play."

East's error did not detract from South's fine performance. He was given a chance and he made the most of it.

New membership plaques will be mailed out this week to all chamber members in good standing. The new plaques will be similar in design to those now held by chamber members, but they will be green, imprinted with gold ink, and they will be dated "1963." In succeeding years, the plaques will be brown and maroon in color.

Within the next several days, the sign department of the State Highway Department will erect specially prepared "Tourist Information Center" signs in the downtown area of Klamath Falls, directing tourists to the chamber office. Under the Tourist Host program, developed by Oregon Chamber Executives and the Travel Information Division of the State Highway Department, the local chamber office has qualified as an official tourist information center.

The signs, which will be four by four feet, will be the usual blue color for informational signs, with lettering in white. Within the outline of the State of Oregon will appear the words "Tourist Information Center." Below the state outline the highway department will stencil directions for reaching the chamber office. Present plans call for two signs on Main Street within two blocks either direction from the chamber office, a double-faced sign in front of the office itself, and possibly a fourth sign on South Seventh Street for motorists arriving into Klamath Falls via the Winnemucca - to - the - Sea Highway or from Reno.

As a major segment of the 1963 Intra - State Travel Promotion program, the week from June 1 through June 7 has been designated as official "Oregon Welcome Week." During that week, speakers will appear before several groups.

Kennan Quits Slav Position

WASHINGTON (UPI) — George F. Kennan, a prominent expert on Communist affairs, resigned Friday as U.S. ambassador to Yugoslavia. He denied he was quitting because of a disagreement with President Kennedy.

The White House issued a statement saying the resignation "is in accord with Ambassador Kennan's long-standing plan" to return to private life.
