

Candy Spots Captures Preakness In Stretch

BALTIMORE, Md. (UPI) — Candy Spots, the oddly-marked colt from California who failed as favorite in the Kentucky Derby, swept to the front in the stretch at Pimlico Saturday to win the \$100,000 Preakness Stakes by 3 1/2 lengths as Chateaugay, the Derby winner, struggled hopelessly to overtake him.

Never Bend was third in the mile and three-sixteenths classic after going to the front at the start and leading until Candy Spots, owned by Rex C. Ellsworth of Chino, Calif., charged into the lead.

That was at the start of the stretch where jockey Willie Shoemaker, who was criticized for his ride aboard Candy Spots in the Kentucky Derby, gave Candy Spots the gun. The colt shot to the front in a few strides. Never Bend, the 1962 juvenile champion which finished second in the Kentucky Derby ahead of Candy Spots, faded out of contention.

Big In Stretch
Jockey Braulio Baeza, who held Chateaugay back in sixth place just as he did two weeks ago at Churchill Downs, had started a big run on the turn into the stretch. Once again Chateaugay roared around horses and moved up to third as he came whirling off the final turn.

At that point, Chateaugay was moving fastest of all but Shoemaker, winning the Preakness Stakes for the first time in four tries, still had a horse under him. The little jockey champion roused the rangy Candy Spots into high gear and Chateaugay was unable to match the challenge.

The crowd of 35,263 roared as Candy Spots started to pull away for they made him favorite in the field of eight 3-year-olds.

Candy Spots, which charged home in one of the fastest runnings of the Preakness, paid \$5.00, \$3.20 and \$2.20 across the board. Chateaugay, owned by the Darby Dan farm of John W. Galbreath,

paid \$4.40 and \$2.40 while Cain Hoy Stable's Never Bend, four and one-half lengths behind Chateaugay at the finish, paid \$3.20.

Missed Record
Candy Spots, carrying 126 pounds, was timed in 1:56 1/5, well off the stake and track record of 1:54 3/5 set by Nashua in 1955 but still the third fastest in the long history of the race. Capot was timed in 1:56 in 1949 and Bold Ruler in 1957 and Greek Money last year were clocked in

the same time as Candy Spots. The track had dried to fast after rains Friday night left it "good" at the start of Saturday's program.

Manny Yenza shot Never Bend to the front at the start with Rural Retreat, the outsider in the field, second and Candy Spots third. That was the way three leaders raced until Shoemaker moved Candy Spots around Rural Retreat as the field left the back stretch.

Dyrall Barleson, brother of OTI coach Larry, said it was one of the best run small college meets he had seen, that everything went like clock work. That takes a good effort on the part of everyone and it was carried out to the tee. The Klamath Basin Athletic Association, which is sponsoring a meet May 25, hopes to run the meet off just as smoothly.

DAVIS, Calif. (UPI) — Sid Nickolas of Fresno State won three events Saturday as the Bulldogs rolled up 70 points to capture team honors in the NCAA Pacific Coast Regional Division track and field meet.

He didn't set any records, but captured the 120 yard high hurdles in 14.2, the broad jump with a leap of 24 feet, one inch, and the 220 yard dash in a 21.6 clocking.

Three meet records toppled. Jeff Owens of Redlands bettered one standard by taking the pole vault with a leap of 14 feet, 7 1/4 inches.

Jones Wins Pole Post For '500'

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (UPI) — Daring Parnelli Jones defied treacherous winds and roared around the speedway at a record slip Saturday to become only the fourth driver to win the 300-mile auto race pole position two years in a row.

Only seven cars were qualified for the Memorial Day classic on a sunny but windy day, leaving 26 spots to be filled Sunday and next weekend but the record crowd of nearly 200,000 was treated to plenty of thrills as Jones shattered his own one and four-lap records.

The 29-year-old baldish speedster from Torrance, Calif., hit a stop speed of 151.847 m.p.h. for one lap and averaged 151.153 m.p.h. for the 10-mile test to grab the inside spot in the first row on race day.

Only the immortal Ralph De Palma, Rex Mays and Eddie Sachs had that spot two years running.

The field now checks in at an average of 150,040, compared with the 1962 average of 147,330 for the 33 starters.

Parnelli's old records, set in the same car he was driving Saturday, were 150.729 and 150.370 for one lap and four laps, respectively.

Jim Hurtubise, North Tonawanda, N. Y., the former track record holder became the second fastest qualifier at a clip of 150.257 m.p.h. in one of the powerful eight-cylinder Novis.

He did it on his second attempt late in the day to win the middle spot in the front row and Don Branson, Champaign, Ill., will be on the outside of the first row on race day with an average of 150.188.

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Bonanza Surprises Field, Finished Third In State

BEND — The Bonanza Antlers, felt that his boys fell down in some of the places where he thought they would be the strongest, but came around in some other places where he didn't figure.

Denny Ralston Wins Tourney

SEATTLE (UPI) — Top-seeded Dennis Ralston from the University of Southern California lived up to his advance billing and won the Big Six singles tennis championship here Saturday by beating Art Ashe, UCLA, 6-3 and 13-11.

Ashe won his way into the finals with two upset wins Friday, one over second-seeded Jim McManus, California, and another over third-seeded Rafael Osuna, USC.

Ashe gave Ralston his toughest competition of the tourney. Friday Ralston took an easy 6-0, 6-3 match from Dave Reed, UCLA, and a 6-2, 6-3 win over his teammate Tim Edleson.

Southern Cal had the overall title sewed up before they went into the finals Saturday, since Trojans filled five of the six final positions. Both pairs of contenders, for the doubles title were from USC. They were Osuna and Ralston against Bill Bond and Ramsey Earnhart.

Don Fairfield Takes Lead In Oklahoma City Golf Open

OKLAHOMA CITY (UPI) — Don Fairfield, riding the crest of a revived putting game, shot a 4-under-par 68 Saturday to seize the 54-hole lead in the \$35,000 Oklahoma City Open with a total of 211.

Fairfield, who plays out of Perdido Bay, Fla., and has not won in nearly three years, led a par-sweeping field by one stroke. Trailing him at 212 were Bob Rosburg, Ernie Vossler, Frank Beard, George Bayer, Dow Finsterwald and rookie Al Kelley Jr.

Two strokes back at 213 were Jerry Edwards, Hal McCommas, Bobby Nichols, Miller Barber, Bob Duden and Julius Boros. Edwards made the biggest jump, coming from a 36-hole tie for 60th when he shot a quail creek record 8-under-par 64 Saturday.

Australian Bruce Devlin, who led by one stroke going into Saturday's action, stumbled in with a 5-over-par 77 for a 54-hole total of 216.

Fairfield sank six birdie putts, one of them a 22-footer, and took

two bogies. He made the nine-hole turn at 2-under-par 34 and repeated the feat on the back nine.

"I just started making putts," Fairfield said in explaining his game which has shown great improvement after poor showings in the Waco Turner Open and Colonial Invitational. "That's the secret of the game. I only made 30 putts today."

The 33-year-old professional who makes his home in Urbana, Ill., missed only two greens and

said he used the 1, 3, and 4 irons most of the way. "This course will eat you up if you use a driver," he said. "You have to use caution."

Fairfield, whose last tour victory was in the 1960 St. Paul Open, thus moved into Sunday's finale five strokes under par for the tournament.

For a change, the usually windy Quail Creek course was calm and the scores showed it. Twenty-one players bettered par 36-36-72.

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
