Young Pitchers Grab Victories

The Klamath Union Pelicans, making ready for their big tussle with Medford for the Southern Oregon Conference championship, warmed up Friday with a doubleheader victory over the Bend Lava Bears, 7-3 and 3-1 in nonconference games.

Coach Bill Mansfield again used some of his young pitchers to save his aces for the Medford tilt. And the youngsters came through with flying colors. Kim Coon won the first game, his first win of the year, despite a couple of streaks of wildness and some spotty fielding support and Rich Grow went all the way in the second game.

The victories gave the Pelicans a 16-5 record for the season. They played Medford in a doubleheader Saturday at Gem Stadium. Medford was 10-1 going into the games and Klamath second with a 9-3 mark. Medford played Ashland Thursday but the outcome isn't known.

The Pelicans had the first game all the way from the first inning. Coon's mates gave him a three-run cushion to work on in the first inning on the big bat of Mike Kitching who just returned to the lineup after a bout with an illness.

Larry Binney and Tom Osa hit back to back singles and Kitching drove them home with a screaming line drive triple to left center. He scored on John Parisotto's single.

The game was put on ice in the fifth by the Pelicans when they tallied another four runs off

relief hurler Dick Hollenbeck. He took over for loser Paul Wardlaw.

Hollenbeck was greeted unkindly when Coon led off with a single. Larry Guyer followed with a single as did Binney to drive Coon home. Osa flied out to center and Kitching was walked to fill the bases. Guyer tallied on a wild pitch and Binney and Kitching pulled off the double steal to let Binney score. Kitching proceeded to steal third and he also scored on a wild pitch.

All three of Bend's runs were unearned. After one was out, catcher Val Lewis walked. He was balked to second by Coon and took third on an infield out. He scored on an error when Mary Yunch threw low to first base.

The other two Bend runs came in the seventh, also unearned. Doug Williams walked and Mike Clark singled after one was out. They both scored when a throwing error by Binney in centerfield went past Parisotto at third. He got up and threw the ball to Gray, who was covering home, and the ball went past him and to the Klamath dugout. The second runner then scored. But Coon got out of it by whiffing the third out.

The Pelis got the jump in the second game also. Rick Horn reached first when the centerfielder dropped his fly ball. He stole second and was driven home by pitcher Rich Grow's single. Two more runs were added in the third. Binney led off with a line shot triple to the right center fence. Parisotto walked and Jay Paxton was cut down at second on Horn's fielder's choice but Parisotto scored. He had gained third on an error.

Bend's only run came in the third when pitcher Glen Cook led off with a single. Clark hit another safety right behind him and he scored after two were out on a single by Lewis.

Don Nottebart Fires No-Hitter At Philadelphia

The guy with the big win was Don (No-Hit) Nottebart, but the man with the big grin was Houston teammate Don McMahon.

McMahon was the fellow who first recommended Nottebart to the Colts so you can imagine how he felt sitting in the bullpen last night and watching the right-hander from Lexington, Mass., pitch the National League's second no-hitter within a week.

Nottebart's masterpiece over the Philadelphia Phillies was slightly tainted in that they scored an unearned run off him in his 4-1 victory.

But Nottebart wasn't the least bit unhappy, particularly since it was the first time he pitched nine innings since 1961 and the victory brought his season record to 5-1.

The only run the Phils scored off Nottebart came in the fifth inning as a result of a two-base error by shortstop J.C. Hartman. Don Demeter reached second on the miscue, took third on Clay Dalrymple's sacrifice and scored on Don Hoak's sacrifice fly.

That run matched a first-inning homer by Carl Warwick and tied the score at 1-1 but Howie Goss untied it with a three-run homer in the sixth off Jack Hamilton, who had beaten the Colts three times last year and twice more this season without ever losing to them before.

Nottebart's no-hitter came only six days after the first one of the season turned in by Sandy Koufax of the Dodgers against the Giants.

En route to his no-hitter, Nottebart walked three batters and struck out eight.

Strictly a reliever with the Braves last season, Nottebart told McMahon he would like to be with the Colts while they were chatting one night last summer. The two were good friends, having pitched for the Braves together, and as soon as McMahon returned to Houston, he passed the word along to General Manager Paul Richards. The Colts obtained Nottebart last Nov. 29.

Dodgers Whip Pirates

In other NL action Friday night, the Los Angeles Dodgers pounded the Pittsburgh Pirates 9-2, the St. Louis Cardinals ended a four-game losing streak with an 11-2 victory over the Cincinnati Reds and the San Francisco Giants beat the New York Mets 4-3 in 11 innings. The scheduled game between the Braves and Cubs was rained out.

Frank Howard drove in three runs for the Dodgers with a double and a two-run homer against the Pirates. Bob Miller gained his third victory and Joe Gibbon was charged with his first defeat. A barrage of four home runs by George Altman, Julian Javier, Dick Groat and Stan Musial carried the Cardinals to his fourth victory at the expense of the Reds. Joey Jay, a 26-game winner last year, was routed after two innings and suffered his seventh loss against one victory.

Freshman Track Team Finishes Second In District Tournament

Always a bridesmaid and never a bride. That seems to be the destiny of the Klamath Union Freshman track team. The fledgling Pelicans finished second in the district track meet Friday at Crater for the third straight season.

The neophyte Pelicans finished second with 76 points as compared to 106 1/2 for the winning North Grants Pass team which is a strong track school. But the Pelicans are coming along rapidly and broke five school records this season.

All but one of those records were broken in the Friday district meet and none of them were winning records. Larry Meller broke one of the oldest records in the

1200-yard run when he finished third in a fine clocking of 3:31.5, a half second better than the old record of 3:32 flat by Ken Coffman.

Bob Williams was second in both the hurdles events and broke the school record in the high with a fine clocking of 9.6. The boy that won the event ran the event in 9.2, an outstanding time. Mendenhall, who beat Williams in both hurdles, also won the low in an outstanding 13.9. Williams was clocked in 14.6 in second place.

Bob Moore, the giant freshman who, like Williams, doubles in baseball, set a new school record in the 150-yard dash in finishing second to South Grants Pass' Shep-

ard. Moore ran a 15.5 to the 150-yard dash. He also finished third in the 330-yard dash in 38.5. Curt Peterstener, who holds the freshman high jump mark at 5-9, won the only first for the Pelicans with a 5-6 leap in that event. Vern Huck, who owns the pole vault mark at 10-6, was still vaulting when six were tied at 10:30 p.m. Friday night.

John Barnes got a third for the Pelis in the high jump. He tied for second but lost on more misses. The KU relay team also was third in a fine 47.8, two-tenths of a second behind the winning 47.6 clocking.

Mickey Bender got a fourth in the broad jump with a leap of 19-3. The event was won by Williams

of North Grants Pass at 20-1 1/2. Bender had a leap of 20-8 but scratched. Greg Scott was fifth behind Bender. Scott and Bender also tied two for others for fourth in the 75-yard dash. Merkle Britt was fourth in the 660-yard run. David Holland was fifth in the 330 and sixth in the low hurdles. Bender was sixth in the 150.

North Grants Pass pulled out six first places to win the meet. Hedrick of Medford was third with 62 1/2, McLoughlin fourth with 48, Ashland with 40, South Grants Pass 33, Savage of Grants Pass 22. Monument of Grants Pass but had points coming in the pole vault, and Crater 0.

Allison Hits Three Homers, Leads Twins To 11-4 Win

Bob Allison is only doing what comes naturally when he plays Paul Bunyan so it isn't surprising that he's trying single-handedly to carry the Minnesota Twins out of the American League wilderness.

Allison, who stands 6-foot-4 and weighs 218 pounds, is generally recognized as the strongest man

in the AL—perhaps in big league baseball.

And he sure looked 30 feet tall with shoulders half as wide Friday night when he hit three homers and drove in six runs to lead the Twins to an 11-4 victory over the Cleveland Indians. The win snapped a four-game losing streak and lifted the Twins out of last place.

The Twins have been one of the most disappointing teams in either league this year but it's no fault of Allison, who leads the AL with 29 runs batted in, has hit nine homers and is batting .330.

Allison's three homers Friday night came off Jim Grant, Jerry Walker and Ron Nischwitz.

Jim Perry, obtained recently from the Indians, went 6-2-3 in his first game of the season.

The New York Yankees beat the Los Angeles Angels 4-3, and the Kansas City Athletics defeated the Houston Red Sox 2-0 in the only other games. Chicago at Baltimore and Detroit at Washington were rained out.

Joe Pepitone drove in all four Yankee runs with his sixth and seventh homers of the season while two homers by Leon Wagner produced all three Los Angeles runs. Jim Bouton pitched a four-hitter for his fourth win as the Yankees extended their winning streak to five games.

Ted Brexfield pitched a three-hitter for the Athletics to snap the Red Sox five-game winning streak. George Alaka's two-run double produced both Kansas City runs and dealt rookie Dave Morehead his first major league loss after three victories.
