Slam Sought By Bidders

Good bridge players don't make every contract. Sometimes the cards lie wrong, on other occasions it just happens that they find the wrong dummy. In any case there is one principle of play that winning declarers all follow.

When the contract looks doubtful they look for any combination of cards that will allow them to make their contract. Then, if they find such a combination, they give the cards a chance.

North's raise to three spades was a minimum and South certainly bid his hand to the limit when he went all the way to six.

At first glance South saw that he might well go down two tricks and there appeared to be no way to make his contract. Further study showed one possibility and South gave the cards their chance.

He won the first trick with the ace of hearts, led a trump of dummy's king, ruffed dummy's other heart, led out one more spade to draw trumps and played the ace, king and five of diamonds.

West won the trick. There had been no way for him to unblock and West was stuck for a lead. A heart would allow South a ruff and discard so he led a club.

South played the queen from dummy. When he held South discarded his other club on dummy's last diamond.

Road Model Displayed

Chronic Cough In Adults Seen Warning Of Disease

Klamath Falls' wives and mothers may be sidestepping one of their most important responsibilities, Mrs. Eric Majors, secretary of the Klamath County Tuberculosis and Health Association, has pointed out.

"We're falling down on the job

of helping keep our husbands alive and healthy. Most of us are geared to watching our children's health — not our husband's," explains Mrs. Majors, herself the mother of three children.

"We worry about a child's cough and become disturbed if

the youngster seems unusually breathless. But we shrug off the same symptoms in our husbands, blaming them on age, smoking, the weather, or even hard work," she remarked.

Mrs. Majors' comments were made as the local TB and Health Association was in the process of conducting its 1963 educational campaign to alert people to the danger of chronic cough and shortness of breath as symptoms of respiratory disease.

"Chronic cough and shortness of breath are ignored much too often," says Mrs. Majors. "Most of us don't realize that they are common signs of chronic but hidden respiratory diseases — sicknesses of breathing. Chronic RD — which can be serious — is particularly common in men over 40," she added.

The local chapter is urging people to pay attention to chronic cough and shortness of breath, the two danger signals being spotlighted in the 1963 RD campaign which started May 1 and ends June 15.

Not a drive for money, the campaign is financed by Christmas Seal funds and is part of the nationwide alert being conducted by 2,100 local chapters of the National Tuberculosis Association.

Women are urged to ask their husbands to heed the RD campaign slogan: "Cough too much? Short of breath? You may have a respiratory disease. Don't take chances. See your doctor."

The Oregon Army National Guard last week inaugurated a new enlistment program under which men with previous military service are offered a unique opportunity to enlist in a unit for a one-year "trial period," rather than the customary two or three-year minimum.

The program is open to men up to 60 years of age who have previous military service either on active duty or in the reserve components. Provided there are unit vacancies, they may enlist at the last military rank they held.

Announcement of the new program was made here by Capt. Leonard D. Springer, commander of Battery B, 2nd AW Bn (SP), 249th Artillery.

Called "Try One," the program is modeled on a similar plan established by the Oregon Air National Guard several months ago. Army National Guard officials, realizing that a large number of men hesitate to join the Army ranks for a three-year hitch because they are not fully aware of the Guard's opportunities, believe that the "Try One" program will dispel many of their apprehensions.

The Army Guard is hopeful the new program will attract men with considerable experience and training who can fill the gap left by the large number of World War II veterans who are retiring from the Guard after 20 years' service.

Republicans Select July For 1964 Convention

DENVER (UPI)—The 1964 Republican national convention will be held in either the second or third week of July in one of seven cities still under consideration as possible sites.

"We decided our convention would have to be in July in view of the fact we do not have an incumbent," GOP National Chairman William Miller told a news conference following a meeting at the site committee here Friday.

"We need the time to project our candidate, raise the money and perfect our campaign organization," Miller added.

As for the eventual nominee, U.S. Congressmen traveling to and from the Capitol are not subject to local traffic laws. They are granted constitutional immunity.

Miller said he did "not disagree with the general speculation" that the leading presidential candidates were Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York, Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona, Gov. George Romney of Michigan and Gov. William Scranton of Pennsylvania.

But to these familiar names he added three other governors whom he described as "attractive" presidential possibilities: Robert Smylie of Idaho, Mark Hatfield of Oregon and John A. Love of Colorado.

When asked what effect he thought Rockefeller's divorce and remarriage might have on his candidacy, Miller parried: "I'm not a prophet, and not a marriage counselor."

He also denied emphatically reports that Miami Beach was one of the seven cities being consid-

ered as a convention site because of its proximity to Cuba, which is expected to play a key role in the Republican campaign.

Miller said the site would not be announced until after the committee meets here again June 20. Besides Miami Beach, the cities being considered are Atlantic City, Dallas and San Francisco.

Miller said Dallas posed a special problem to the committee because two major conventions are scheduled there during July. But he did not rule the Texas city out, saying "some arrangements might be worked out."

Newsman asked the congressman if Detroit and Philadelphia might be dropped from consideration because Govs. George Romney of Michigan and William Scranton of Pennsylvania have been mentioned as potential pres-

idential candidates. Miller dismissed the question.

"We have no announced candidates at this time," he said.

Miller said the site committee had agreed unanimously to schedule the convention for either the second or third week in July. The 1964 convention was held in the last week of July, about two weeks after the Democratic party met.

"We decided our convention would have to be in July in view of the fact we do not have an incumbent, and we need the time

to project our candidate, raise the money and perfect our campaign organization," he said.

Miller said he thought the Democrats probably would wait until late August or even September to hold their convention.
