Mail Box Week Named

The week of May 20-25, 1963, has been designated Mail Box Improvement Week. Mail Boxes on mounted city routes, rural routes, and star routes with delivery and collection should receive attention.

Patrons are encouraged to furnish mail receptacles which are convenient and safe to use, neat appearing, and which protect the mail. Boxes that are properly erected and maintained contribute to efficient, speedy delivery of mail.

On mounted routes with curbside delivery, the box may be of the rural type or a model which will protect the mail from the weather. Where receptacles are not directly in front of residences, the patron's name and address must be shown on the box.

On rural routes, names of the owners should be shown on the side of the box visible to the carrier as he approaches, or on the door if boxes are grouped. The box number should be shown on the box. Boxes and supports should be kept painted.

Boxes that are not properly in serviceable condition retard the delivery of mail and expose it to the weather.

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Senators Begin Probe Of Automation Effects

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A Senate labor subcommittee begins a six-month investigation today of the effects of automation on education, social welfare, labor and industry.

Witnesses called to open the hearing were Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz, Commerce Secretary Luther H. Hodges and Ivan Nease, undersecretary of health, education and welfare.

Sen. Joseph S. Clark, chairman of the labor manpower subcommittee, said the hearings were being held to examine the "drastically changing" opportunities for employment resulting from a shift from a "manual to a computer and automated economy."

"We must look at the total problem so that we can measure the task of developing a national manpower policy which will respond to the terms of the new economy."

Causes of the changes will be examined, Clark said, and efforts made to find out how to help individuals adapt to the new life.

Other congressional news:
Education: Sen. Abraham Ribicoff, D-Conn., today offered a compromise program to quiet strong feelings over religious issues which has ended congressional efforts to aid education. His program would provide income tax reductions for parents sending children to private schools, federal funds to public schools which allow their facilities to be used by private schools for some instruction and subsidies for teachers to take advanced training.

Philippines: The Senate is expected to act on an amendment to make a lump sum \$73 million payment to the Philippines for war claims. The amendment is designed to prevent Washington lobbyist John O'Donnell from receiving large fees for his work in connection with the war claims bill passed during the last congressional session.

Young Mother Suicides After Finding Baby Dead

FAIRFAX, Calif. (UPI)—There was little to distinguish it from any other Saturday night at the home of a young Fairfax couple until death paid a tragic double visit.

The time was 10 p.m., and Robert DeAngelo, 24, was busy in his downstairs workshop. His wife, Patricia, 22, was finishing up her household chores.

But Mrs. DeAngelo could not push from her mind the nagging concern for her 15-month-old son. He was teething and had been running a fever for a week. She had checked with the doctor daily by telephone.

The child still was running a fever when she had put him to bed an hour earlier, but Mrs. DeAngelo decided to make one final check of the nursery. Within seconds, she came stumbling down the stairs to her husband's workshop.

"I think the baby's dead," she cried hysterically. The husband grabbed the child and drove to the Fairfax police station where he asked for a police escort to Marin General Hospital.

His thoughts flashed briefly to his wife, whom he had left alone with her other two young children. He asked the police to make certain his wife was all right.

The baby was pronounced dead on arrival at the hospital at 11:08 p.m. At about the same time, officers found Mrs. DeAngelo lying beside the baby's crib, dead from a .22 caliber bullet in her temple.

A note found nearby said, "It's my fault he's dead...I don't want to live any more."

There was no chance to tell Mrs. DeAngelo her child's death was no one's fault. He had died of purulent meningitis.

Lake County Road Bids Asked

PORTLAND (UPI)—The Bureau of Public Roads announced today it had called for bids on projects in Linn and Lake counties under the accelerated public works program.

The Linn County project includes work on three feeder roads between Foster and Quartzville. Crushed rock surfacing is scheduled on sections of Boulder Creek, Yellowstone Creek and Yellow Bottom Creek roads.

Bids received on the project May 9 were rejected, the bureau said.

Circle K Governor Selected

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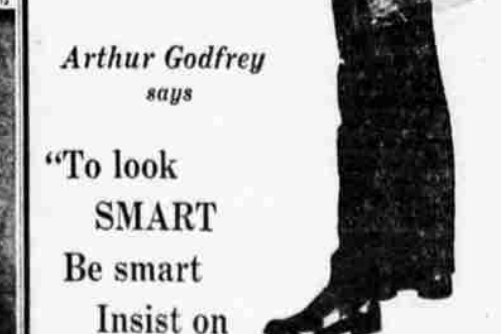
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
