Bo Belinsky Sent To Bullpen By LA

CLEVELAND (UPI)—Bo Belinsky has been sent to the bullpen by the Los Angeles Angels and they're looking for another left-handed pitcher and they'll take the 26-year-old Belinsky even with his disappointing 1-7 record, his inflated 6.43 earned run average and his fondness for the bright lights.

Only hitch up to now is which players the Angels would get in return and among the possibilities are infielder Mike De La Hoz, pitcher Jerry Walker and utilityman Gene Green.

Manager Bill Rigney of the Angels and Cleveland Manager Birdie Tebbetts huddled for some time before Monday night's game and although neither revealed the nature of their conversation, it was known to have centered around Belinsky.

Rigney has another appointment today with Cleveland General Manager Gabe Paul, who told General Manager Fred Haney of the Angels last season, "If you ever get tired of Belinsky, I wish you'd give us first crack."

Actually the Kansas City A's had first crack at the colorful Belinsky last September and a winter deal for him already had been agreed upon, but Commissioner Ford Frick nullified it because the deal was made public prematurely.

Due to his recent poor showing, Belinsky was assigned to the bullpen Monday night for the first time this season by Rigney.

The Los Angeles manager emphasized the move was not a punitive measure and also took the opportunity to deny a published report that Bo would be shipped back to the minors.

Belinsky, who pitched a no-hitter for the Angels last year, made frequent headlines by his after-hour escapades and recently became engaged to movie actress Mamie Van Doren, managed only two innings against the Yankees in his last start in New York Sunday.

The Yanks shelled him for eight runs and went on to win the nightcap of a doubleheader, 10-4, after the Angels won the opener, 6-2.

Bo has completed only one of his nine starts, has failed to get past the fourth inning in his last three outings and has given up nine home runs — more than any other major league pitcher.

Questioned as to the possibility of his being dealt to the Indians, Belinsky shrugged and said: "It makes no difference to me. I'll do the best I can wherever I'm at."

Heffner Hurls Seattle Into PCL Contention

Big Bob Heffner of Seattle is trying to pitch his way into the major leagues, and Seattle is a Pacific Coast League contender because of his efforts.

Heffner fanned 13 and blanked Tacoma on eight hits Monday night in a 1-0 sizzler with the Giants' Jim Constable and John Pregarer, two men who have hurled in the National League.

The win moved Seattle to within a half-game of Tacoma in the Northern Division chase.

Heffner has knocked around the minors for seven years now. His 22-33 lifetime mark shows that he has got the winning habit, but he's never put together that one big year a pitcher needs to make the majors.

Now he is 4-1 with the Rainiers and the 26-year-old Pennsylvania Dutchman may finally make it yet.

In other action Monday night, Dallas-Ft. Worth blanked Oklahoma City 2-0 behind the five-hit pitching of Ted Sadowski; Tom Satriano's homer with one on in the 8th gave Hawaii a 7-5 win over Spokane; and Denver out-slugged Salt Lake City 11-7.

Sadowski doubled in the fourth, came to third on a fly ball and scored on an infield out. Then he walked in the sixth and roared home on a double by Joe Noveck.

Satriano's homer capped a see-saw affair at Honolulu before 1804 fans. Dick Simpson of the Islanders led off the first with a home run, while Al Ferrara of Spokane poked two fourtimes good for three runs.

Hal Griggs won in relief and Jack Smith was the loser.

Ethan Blackaby and J. W. Porter paced Denver against Salt Lake. They accounted for five of the Bears' 16 hits and drove in five runs. Believer Dick Kelley got the win.

Seattle scored its run against Tacoma off Constable in the first

inning. Stan Johnson got an infield single, and went to third on Bobby Gene Smith's single.

Seattle tried a double steal and Tacoma used the cut-off play. Johnson was out by a mile but catcher Tim Talton dropped the ball and that proved to be the difference.

San Diego and Portland took the night off.

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'Kid Prodigy' Becomes Man With Second Shutout Win

They've taken the "kid prodigy" label off pitcher Milt Pappas of the Baltimore Orioles because this year he's become a man.

Immaturity of outlook has been the only rap against the 6-foot-7, 200-pound right-hander from Detroit, Mich., since he started American League hitters with his pitching savvy as a 19-year-old rookie in 1959. Pappas compiled a 55-49 record from 1959 through 1962 but he still was regarded as a "problem child."

But so far this season all the problems are being encountered by rival hitters.

Pappas turned in his second shutout and his fourth straight victory of the season Monday night in a 6-0 win over the Detroit Tigers that enabled the Orioles to move into a first-place tie with the Chicago White Sox.

Pappas allowed only one run in each of his other two victories, has struck out 25 batters while walking only nine and has a 1.15 earned run average.

Pleasingly Cocky
Known in the trade as "pleasantly cocky," Pappas has been dubbed for stardom since he vaulted into the majors virtually direct from American Legion ball. Only four pitchers have won more big league games at his age and his shutout Monday night set a club record of 14 for a career.

The Orioles backed his five-hit pitching with salvo of four home runs that produced all their runs and dealt Phil Regan his fifth loss against two victories. Jim Gentile and Jerry Adair hit solo homers and Jackie Brandt and John Fowell each slammed one with a man on base.

The Orioles have won six of their last seven games during which Baltimore pitchers have allowed a total of 51 runs and 32 hits.

The White Sox ripped the Washington Senators, 5-4. The Minnesota Twins knocked the Boston Red Sox out of first place with a 6-5 triumph and the Cleveland Indians downed the Los Angeles Angels, 7-5, in other AL games.

Colts Beat Pirates
Dick Drott pitched a five-hitter as the Houston Colts defeated the Pittsburgh Pirates, 2-0, in the only National League action.

The White Sox overcame an early 3-1 lead held by Tom Cheney and snapped a 3-2 tie in the sixth inning when Floyd Robinson singled. Joe Cunningham doubled and both scored on sacrifice hits by Dave Nicholson and pinch-hitter Charlie Maxwell. Eddie Fisher went 3-1 in his third victory although he needed the late-inning relief help of Frank Baumann and Jim Brownson. The loss was the fourth in a row for the White Sox.

Rosewall Beats Laver in Match
MEDFORD, Ore. (UPI) — Ken Rosewall defeated Rod Laver 6-1, 6-3 and Earl Buchholz topped Andres Gimeno 11-6 in professional tennis court matches before about 300 persons Monday night.

The decisions gave Rosewall a 10-4 lead over Laver and cut Gimeno's lead over Buchholz to 5-6 in their best-of-20 matches' series.

In a doubles match, Rosewall and Buchholz teamed for an 8-5 win over Laver and Gimeno.

E. Davis Lying In State

ELMHURST, N.Y. (UPI) — The body of this city's greatest sports hero, halfback Ernie Davis, lay in state today in the community gymnasium where he got his athletic start.

City officials expected thousands of persons to pay their respects to the 23-year-old All-American who died Saturday of a acute leukemia. Among the mourners was Arthur Modell, president of the Cleveland Browns football club for which Davis never got to play under an \$80,000 contract.

Davis' illness was discovered last summer after he was graduated from Syracuse University.

U.S. senators in Washington Monday heard tributes to the 1961 Heisman Trophy winner from Sen. Kenneth E. Keating and Jacob K. Javits of New York. Authorities here said the two lawmakers plan to be at the funeral Wednesday, along with three congressmen and a representative of Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller.

Keating called Davis a "legendary hero to sports fans of all ages," and said he may have been the "greatest halfback of all time."

Flags flew at half staff here Monday in silent respect for the modest athlete. Students at Elmira Free Academy, where Davis attended school and played his first football, circulated a petition to name a new high school being built this summer after their famed alumnus.

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
