

Reds Refuse To Release Two Pilots

PANMUNJOM, Korea (UPI) — Communist North Korea today refused to release two American helicopter pilots or even to disclose whether they still were alive after a forced landing on Communist territory Friday.

The United States believes the pilots, Capt. Ben W. Stuts, 32, Florence, Ala., and Charleton W. Veltz, 29, Frankfort, Mich., are alive. But Maj. Gen. George H. Cloud, who met with North Korean negotiators at this true village, said the Communists "don't have the decency to tell us."

Cloud said after the meeting that "we will ask for another meeting and we will continue to hold meetings until they answer."

He told the North Koreans that the flight was unintentional and was regretted. The two pilots were flying a United Nations Command boundary-spotting mission when they apparently strayed into North Korea from the demilitarized zone separating North and South Korea.

Cloud said the aircraft carried neither cameras nor weapons and "it is unreasonable to treat the pilots as criminals."

Portland Drops CD

PORTLAND (UPI) — Portland's 13-year-old Civil Defense agency will be no more after July 1.

The City Council voted 4-1 Tuesday to abolish it. Mayor Terry Schunk cast the only vote to keep it. The action came when a \$56,000 budget was turned down.

Jack Lowe, city CD director, is one of 11 persons whose jobs will be affected. He was in Salem discussing CD with state officials at the time the vote was taken. However, staff members are Civil Service employees so will have other jobs.

The decision means the \$650,000 Kelly Butte center, built in 1955, will be made obsolete, plus a halt to the federally-financed community fallout shelter program. Civil defense duties likely will be carried out by a committee of city departments heads. Schunk named a committee to phase out the program.

Oregon Farmers Reject Program

PORTLAND (UPI) — Oregon wheat farmers joined those of the rest of the nation Tuesday in rejecting President Kennedy's program. The Oregon vote was 5,032 to 4,837 against the plan, the Department of Agriculture reported.

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Governor Hatfield To Open Indian Festival At La Grande

Gov. Mark O. Hatfield, "Head Chief" of Indians, will open the fourth annual Indian Festival of Arts, Inc. (non-profit) at La Grande on Friday, June 21. His invitation to participate was presented by Mrs. J. Edward Poitras, Portland, and daughter Suzie in the governor's office. Mrs. Poitras, a Klamath, is an IFA official.

Miss Indian America, Ramona Soto, Klamath Falls, will be present after an extended eastern tour, to represent all American Indians.

The Indian Festival of Arts, an endeavor in brotherhood and understanding, has become nationally famous, drawing work of some of the finest Indian artists for display from many parts of the United States.

The festival theme is "Then and Now." Tribal groups will compete in pageantry for the best presentation of the transition from the past to the present.

Against a background of proud tradition, of totem and teepee, Indians of many tribes will gather June 21-24 in the Grande Ronde Valley, "Kop-Kop-It," which means at the cottonwoods. Many moons before the coming of Soyapoo (white man), northwest Indian tribes met each year "when the silver threads of the spider were spun, and floated unfettered against the sky." It was a time for friendship and fun, for competition in handicrafts and games.

Again there is friendliness "at the cottonwoods," and Soyapoo extends the hand of fellowship and brotherhood. Something has been added to the early traditions. For the first time the first Americans prove excellence in contemporary music, art, voice, drama, and writing.

Cash and other awards will be

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given to the winners. Arthur S. Junaluska, Cherokee Indian Broadway producer, will help produce the "Dance of the Twelve Moons," with a cast of 20 Northwest Indian people, under joint auspices of Eastern Oregon College and the festival.

There will be an Indian village with families living as of old; "oxoxsee" (Indian games); and Linn D. Pauahy, a Kiowa, pastor of the Methodist Mission at Williamson River in Klamath County, a noted teller of authentic Indian legends, will be on the program.

Jesse Redheart, Nez Perce, on an Appaloosa, the breed made famous by his tribe, will lead the parade on Saturday, June 22, expected to be one of the finest in the history of Indian gatherings in the Northwest.

There will be a huge barbecue Saturday noon followed by sports competition.

On Sunday, a "Land of Winding Waters" tour will take guests to Wallawa Lake, the home of famed Nez Perce Chief Joseph. There will be a display of fine art by Waa no Gano, internationally known Cherokee Indian artist of
