WALL STREET CHATTER

NEW YORK (UPI) — Investors' Stock Survey believes the market is steadier and less nervous now than it has been for some time.

It notes "there is every indication that great quantities of high grade stock have moved into strong hands—funds, insurance companies, trusts—those who are not easily made nervous by minor fluctuations or economic gossip."

For the time being, therefore, the survey believes this is an unusually sensible market—one that will not weaken without rational reasons.

Standard & Poor's says that indications are the stock market will maintain a strong tone. It believes that in view of the rise, an increased degree of selectivity is advised in making new purchases, but otherwise a constructive policy remains in order.

"Long term potentials still look promising," says the United Business Service. It advises continuing with a fairly full quota of good stocks.

The Dow Theory Trader looks for new highs in the Dow-Jones industrial average during the month of May—and no later than the first week in June.

tempt," he said, "to reach the governor's budget to \$405 million, and we are trying to provide funds to cover about \$11.5 million for educational construction. There will be a bond program for education presented to the people."

He also indicated that decisions on the capital construction program of the State Board of Control were pending, and had yet to be decided.

On the Constitutional Revision plan, defeated in the Senate yesterday, Flitcraft said he felt they might reconsider since there appeared to be a great deal of pressure for some sort of revision. However, he said that there would have to be some sort of compromise on the apportionment provision in the plan before it would be acceptable to the Senate.

"There is a possibility," he said, "that any compromise might come up close to the previously proposed compromise. However," he added, "it might just stay there in the Senate and die, too."

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Lightning Sparks Klamath River Fires

A team of firefighters was dispatched late Tuesday by the Klamath Forest Protective Association to battle a snag fire east of the Klamath River, near the California-Oregon state line, as lightning p.m.m.elled western Klamath County for the second day in a row.

The fire was the fourth reported to KPFA headquarters since Monday and broke out as the association was in the process of opening some of its eight fire guard stations and 14 lookout towers located in Klamath and Lake counties.

Teams Begin Mt. Everest Peak Climb

KATMANDU, Nepal (UPI) — Two teams of American mountain climbers struck out towards the top of Mt. Everest, the world's highest peak, from the south and west sides today in hopes of meeting at the summit.

An official spokesman for the expedition said there was "high hopes for everybody." But, he said, there was no confirmation that anyone actually had reached the peak when last word was radioed to Katmandu from the base camp today.

Earlier, expedition spokesman Daniel Doody had radioed from the base camp on the slopes of Everest that chances of a team reaching the summit by the previously unexplored west ridge route today were "very slim."

But he said "we hope for good news" from a team attempting the better-known south col route.

Outcome of the double attempt may not be known until Thursday due to weather and communications difficulties, he said.

Dr. William Unsöld, 35, Corvallis, Ore., and Dr. Thomas F. Hornbein, 32, San Diego, formed the west ridge assault team which has been delayed by storms and the unfamiliarity of the route.

Doody said they appeared to have 2,000 feet to go today to reach the top of the 29,025-foot peak, highest in the world. This appeared too much for one day's climb.

"They know they have to give up in time to return to the base camp by Saturday," he said. The expedition plans to come down from the base camp that day.

The south col team of Barry C. Bishop, 39, Washington, and Luther G. Jerstad, 26, Eugene, Ore., reached its final camp Tuesday.

If they reached the summit and found no trace of the west ridge team, they planned to return along the way they came. It had been hoped both teams could meet at the summit and come down the south col route together.

Plan Defeated In California

TULELAKE — Both Siskiyou and Modoc County farmers voted by wide margins to defeat the continuance of federal government controls on wheat Tuesday.

ASCS Office Manager H. A. Karstenson, Tulelake, reported the Tulelake area voted 49 against and 14 in favor, a total of 63 votes cast. There were eight challenged votes.

All of Modoc County tallied 220 against the referendum and 54 hoped both teams could meet at the summit and come down the south col route together.

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fighters were sent to the ridge on Hamaker, while others sought the locations of the two fires near Chase Mountain, according to George Wardell, supervisor of the KPFA.

Wardell said the team dispatched to Hamaker Mountain returned the following morning and reported that lightning had set afire a huge snag which, at that time, was still smoldering. Soon after, a tractor and operator was sent to the ridge to rip apart the snag and extinguish its smoldering pulp.

Meanwhile, the other two firefighting teams returned to KPFA headquarters after failing to uncover the fires at Chase Mountain. Wardell speculated that rain may have put out the burning snags or they may still be smoldering, to break into flames again after the storm passes and the forest dries out.

As firefighters were seeking out "hot spots," a pilot in a reconnaissance aircraft was patrolling KPFA lands and the Winema National Forest in an effort to detect any other fires.

Nearby in the Klamath District of the Winema National Forest, several lightning-strikes were observed but none of them resulted in fire, District Ranger Bud Twombly said. Other electrical storms were also reported in ranger districts adjacent to the Klamath but as yet there has been no indication of fire, he added.

KPFA fire lookouts will continue their vigil until at least Thursday, when the lightning storms are expected to be diminishing.
