South Bid Said Crime

Today's hand comes from an Oregon reader. His comments were: "In my opinion the worst bid a bridge player can make is to pass one trick below game. If the hand plays badly the contract won't make. If it plays well there will be over-tricks and game would be there for anyone who had had the sense to bid it."

It seems that the bidding had gone as in the box. West had opened the deuce of hearts. East rose with the ace and returned to suit. My correspondent, who was South, went after spades and wound up losing two spades and two hearts. Since the club finesse was on for him there was no defense to beat three no-trump and South was annoyed at his partner.

A agree with South in part. Anyone who gets in the habit of passing his partner's two no-trump bids is going to miss plenty of games, but this time North had a good reason. He had heard his partner's original pass and felt that it was most unlikely that three no-trump could make.

Hence in my opinion the blame for missing the game rests 99.99 per cent on South's shoulders. South had committed a real bridge crime. He had passed an opening bid!

Even then he had a chance to correct things. No one was twisting his arm and ordering him to bid two no-trump. He could have jumped right to three no-trump and saved all the trouble.

Climbers Exhaust Oxygen Supply After Scaling Peak

KATMANDU, Nepal (UPI)—James W. Whittaker, first American to conquer Mt. Everest, had to struggle down from the world's highest peak for three and a half hours without oxygen, he disclosed Monday.

Whittaker, 32, Redmond, Wash., was accompanied by Nepalese Sherpa guide Nowang Gombu on the successful summit assault May 1.

Details of the climb were made known in Whittaker's first radio expedition on the slopes of the 29,028-foot peak.

The broadcast also brought word that a five-man team attempting to scale the unexplored west ridge of Mt. Everest would be "very, very lucky" to reach the summit but another team was proceeding on schedule by the relatively familiar south col route.

The two teams had hoped to meet at the summit Wednesday. Storms slowed the west ridge team, scattered its equipment and nearly swept away two of its members.

Whittaker and Gombu carried special new lightweight oxygen project, cleaning the cemetery, on Memorial Day. A potluck dinner is planned at noon, and everyone is invited to participate.

Following the business session, the program consisted of quizzes, skits, and readings about Mothers' Day by the members.

Whittaker said he and Gombu reached the summit side by side and remained there about 20 minutes. It was previously reported they had spent a half hour on the peak.

"I was so busy I did not check my watch all the time," he said.

U.S. Flag at Peak

He said he drove a four-foot aluminum pole bearing the American flag into the snow "at the highest point of Everest."

"The flag was unfurled and flying in the high wind," he said.

There was no sign of a bust of Communist Chinese party leader Mao Tse-tung at the summit.

Whittaker said. A Chinese team claimed it scaled the peak in 1960 and left the bust there. Whittaker said it might have been lodged among rocks just below the summit on the Tibetan side, where he did not venture.

Barry C. Bishop, 30, Washington, and Luther G. Jerstad, 26, Eugene, Ore., were reported following the route of Whittaker and Gombu through the south col in good weather today, with a good chance of reaching the summit sometime Wednesday.

The National Geographic Society in Washington said James B. Corbett, 29, Jackson, Wyo., and Allen C. Auten, 36, Denver, along

with four Sherpa guides, spent last Thursday night clinging to the edge of a crevasse while being buffeted by 80-mile-an-hour winds. The men had slid 100 feet down the ridge during a storm that blew away their tents. They were pulled to safety unhurt by another member of the team who had inched down from a higher camp.

Corbett, Auten and Dr. Richard M. Emerson, 37, Cincinnati, set out on a reconnaissance climb today, according to radio reports from the base camp. They were attempting to establish Advance Camp 5 W as close to the summit as possible.

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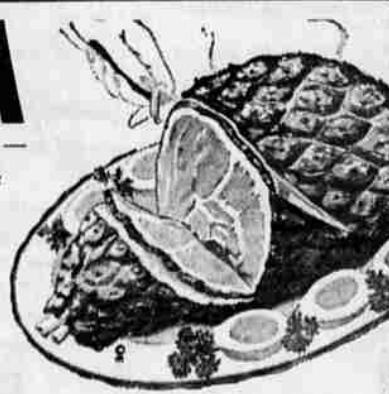
