

Cassius Clay Back At It Again, Predicts Fifth Round To Finish Henry Cooper

NEW YORK (UPI) — Cassius Clay was on the loquacious loose again today and Britain's William Shakespeare and Henry Cooper were warned to look to their respective laurels.

It is to be doubted that the rhyming Louisville Lip will get much attention from the English literati. But when the boy orator of the ring planes to London on Thursday, May 25, 1963, he will be back in the ring.

Sunday for a June 18 engagement against Henry Cooper the British heavyweight champion will learn that he "will fall in five."

Proving that like the tiger, which he wasn't in his last outing, Clay finds it difficult if not impossible to change his stripes.

Setting forth from Louisville for a foreign invasion he hopes will restore the tarnished luster of his predictive poetry. Cassius couldn't resist announcing:

"London Bridge is falling down, so will Cooper in London town. I am not talking jive, Cooper, will fall in five."

Regained His Voice
There may be something wrong with the meter, if you're real hip to what the fight mob refers to as "peratry," but there can be nothing wrong with a suspicion that the mockingbird has regained his voice.

Yon Cassius has been singularly silent since March when a rival young gentleman named Doug Jones not only refused to fall in a predicted four rounds but very nearly clouted the gabby Clay to the canvas. Cassius won a 10-round decision but it was quite evident that he was lucky to register his 18th straight triumph.

And there were some who thought that Jones had been Jesse James. Clay allowed after the votes had been counted that it possibly would be a good thing henceforth and forevermore to forget poetic predictions.

NFL Will Increase Player Limit

ST. LOUIS (UPI) — The National Football League Wednesday increased the player limit for 1963 to 37 and appointed a veteran Los Angeles law enforcement officer as "watchdog" to keep an eye on player associations and "undesirable elements."

The 14 club owners, winding up their two-day spring meeting today, were set to discuss one of the more pleasant aspects of the game—future television policy and how to divide the \$225 million for the 1963 championship game between the players' benefit plan and the players' pool.

Contract's Final Year
The NFL is currently entering the final year of a two-year pact with the Columbia Broadcasting System that brings the league \$19.5 million.

At Wednesday's meeting owners decided to try a 37-man player limit per team for the 1963 season only. The league operated with a 36-man limit in 1961 and 1962, after operating with 35 men per team in 1960.

The proposal finally worked out was a compromise from the suggested return to the 38 men.

Earlier, Commissioner Pete Rozelle announced that James E. Hamilton, 33, would begin work June 1 as the league's roving watchdog to help prevent future incidents such as the Paul Hornung and Alex Karras cases.

Uphold Title Award
In other developments the league:—Reaffirmed the awarding of the 1963 championship to the Chicago Cardinals—thereby overruling objections by Pittsburgh, Pa.

Revised the cutdown numbers. This year rosters must be cut to 43 players by Aug. 27; to 40 by Sept. 3; and to 37 by Sept. 10.

Ordered clubs to make injury reports to the league office in order to study various injuries with a view to taking preventive measures.

Brazil Takes On Russia Cage Team

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (UPI) — Defending champion Brazil, after knocking off contender Yugoslavia earlier this week, takes on unbeaten Russia tonight in their showdown battle for the world amateur basketball championship.

Both Brazil and Russia are unbeaten through four games, while Yugoslavia has just that one loss to Brazil in four starts of the round-robin final series. The United States defeated Puerto Rico 83-64 Wednesday night but is out of the running for the 1963 title with a 2-2 record.

After tonight's game, Brazil has only one game left to play and that is against the United States Saturday. The Russians play Yugoslavia in the windup game for both, also on Saturday, closing day of the 1963 championships. Yugoslavia meets France Friday night.

Russia enhanced its chances for the title by routing Italy 83-63, a victory that eliminated the United States from the running. In tonight's other game, the U.S. meets Italy.

Willis Reed's 17 points paced the Yanks to their win over Puerto Rico, which has lost four games.
