

Giants, Dodgers Win; Mantle Hits Longest Homer In History

Drysdale Winning For Bums Again

Don Drysdale and the Los Angeles Dodgers have a two-word reply today for National League winners who were hoping the 25-game winner of 1962 would fall victim to the Cy Young Award jinx: "Forget it."

Drysdale backs up his portion of the record with three straight victories, giving him a 5-4 record, and the Dodgers back up their end with eight consecutive wins, giving them the longest winning streak in the major leagues this season.

The Dodgers and Drysdale extended their strings Wednesday night with a 7-3 triumph over the New York Mets. The win enabled the Dodgers to remain one game behind the first-place San Francisco Giants, with whom they open a three-game series in Los Angeles on Friday night.

Started Slowly
Drysdale started slowly this season and NL rivals hoped he might be victimized by the pitcher of the year award which previously had claimed Don New-

combe, Bob Turley, Vern Law and to a slightly lesser extent Early Wynn in the year after each won the honor.

But Wednesday night Drysdale was sidetracked by a 11-hit attack that included homers by Tommy Davis and Frank Howard. The only hit off him were homers by Duke Snider and Tim Lincecum, who struck out six while walking three.

The Giants hit the Philadelphia Phillies 10-2, the Pittsburgh Pirates nipped the Houston Astros 4-3, and the Chicago Cubs scored a 7-6 11-inning triumph over the St. Louis Cardinals in other NL action. Cincinnati at Milwaukee was postponed by cold weather.

Hits Grand Slam
Tom Haller hit the first grand slam of his career to climax a seven-run fourth-inning rally that made it a breeze for the Giants' Jack Sanford to raise his record to 7-3. Haller's homer was off Jack Baldschun, who hadn't yielded a homer in 33 previous appearances on the mound.

Don Nottebart, in his first start since pitching a no-hitter against the Phillies on May 17, carried a five-hit shutout into the ninth before the Pirates rallied for all their runs. Bill Mazeroski's double started the flareup and a walk and singles by Smokey Burgess and Donn Clendenen chased Nottebart in favor of Don McMahon. Then an error and Roberto Clemente's two-run double completed the game-winning rally, which gave Earl Francis his second victory.

Cahoon Tops Shooters
E. H. Cahoon, with a 93, was the high scorer in the weekly shoot of the Klamath Gun Club last Sunday at the Woon Flats club grounds.

D. Winters followed Cahoon's 93 with a 94 and Pat Miller netted 92. Cahoon and Miller were tied with 46 each at the end of the handicap event.

Cahoon won the leg of the Nelson Reed Doubles trophy with a score of 44. The next shoot is slated Sunday at 10 a.m.

Islanders Set For Belinsky

Yankees' Feat Ranks With Cooper

The dateline was New York, May 22—Gordie's day and Mickey's night.

Astronaut Gordon Cooper "owned" the big town Wednesday during a tumultuous ticker-tape parade and dinner, but the night belonged strictly to fellow Oklahoman Mickey Mantle.

Of course, Mantle, or anyone else for that matter, would have to go a long way to match Gordie's 22 trips around the world in a capsule, but Mickey came close to accomplishing what no other major league player ever has done in the 40-year history of Yankee Stadium, and that includes such stars as Babe Ruth, Lou Gehrig and Joe DiMaggio.

Mantle almost sent a baseball into orbit when he crashed a homer—"the hardest hit ball of my life"—against the uppermost facade of Yankee Stadium, a liner at least 100 feet in the air and 350 feet from the plate. The drive, which still had "rise" when it bounced off the fence, gave the Yankees an 8-7 victory over the Kansas City A's in 11 innings. Had the ball cleared the fa-

cade atop the third tier it would have been the first fair ball ever hit out of the mammoth stadium. As it was, it topped any of the tape-measure homers the Oklahoma kid has unloaded in a brilliant major league career, even the celebrated 365-foot honor he hit in Washington in 1953.

Orioles Stop Tigers
In the other American League games the Baltimore Orioles defeated the Detroit Tigers 2-1, behind the effective pitching of Steve Barber and Wes Stock; the Chicago White Sox whipped the Washington Senators 9-3, with new Nats' manager Gil Hodges watching from the stands; the Los Angeles Angels nipped the Cleveland Indians 7-6 in 11 innings, and the Minnesota Twins defeated the Boston Red Sox 3-1 on Jim Kaat's seven-hit pitching.

By winning, the Orioles and White Sox remained tied for first place in the American League race, with the Yankees a game behind in third place.

Barber Wins Eighth
Barber gave up four hits and walked eight batters in the six innings he worked and gave way to Stock when he started the seventh inning with another base on balls. Stock promptly set down nine of the 10 batters he faced to nail down Barber's eighth victory of the season—tops in the majors.

The White Sox chased Washington starter Bennie Daniels in the eighth inning after scoring eight of their runs off him. Pete Ward's two-run homer in the first and Jim Landis' bases-loaded triple in the eighth were the big blows.

The Angels blew an early six-run lead and then won out in the 11th when Gary Bell, the fifth Cleveland pitcher, hit Lee Thomas with the bases loaded and two out to chase over the winning run.

Minnesota's Jim Kaat held Boston to seven hits. The only run off him was Lu Clinton's fifth-inning homer. Kaat helped his own cause along with a run-scoring single in the fourth inning.

Clemons, who at 205 expects to hold about a seven or eight-pound advantage, has lost only four of his 42 starts and has never been kayoed. He boasts 38 victories, 32 by kayo, and one draw.

Folley Meets Cleroux Tonight

MONTREAL (UPI)—Fifth-ranked heavyweight contender Zora Folley and former Canadian champion Bob Cleroux meet tonight in a scheduled 10-round rematch bout that may be the turning point for both fighters.

Veteran Folley of Chandler, Ariz., remained a heavy 3-1 favorite to repeat his lopsided decision of a year ago in San Francisco. Cleroux, ranked seventh by the Ring magazine, has won his last two local starts by knockouts in unimpressive fashion.
