Hailstones Slap Texas

A Texas-sized hail storm left hailstones piled 18 inches deep in south Texas Wednesday. Crops were flattened and cars were dented by the golf-size stones and at least two roads were closed. At least two persons were dead after a tornadoic wind and rain storm lashed North Carolina Tuesday.

An 18-inch layer of hail was reported seven miles north ofovina, Tex., where wheat, cotton, and corn crops were damaged heavily. The hail, which fell during the night, was followed by torrential rains which caused minor flooding. Two roads were closed because of high water.

Four inches of rain fell on the Texas-New Mexico border during the night. Thunderstorms, packing winds up to 75 miles per hour and 1/4 inch hailstones, pounded North Carolina. Two persons were killed in an automobile accident during the height of the storm near Clayton.

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New Major Announced At Linfield

McMINNVILLE — Linfield College has announced a new major in medical technology in the science division of the college. Dr. W. W. Dolan, academic dean, said the program as approved by Linfield and Good Samaritan Hospital in Portland calls for three years of study at Linfield and one year at Good Samaritan Hospital.

Upon successfully completing this program of study, the student may receive the bachelor of science degree from Linfield with a major in medical technology.

Among specific Linfield courses required for the medical technology major during the student's three years at Linfield are General Chemistry, Qualitative Chemical Analysis Laboratory, General Mathematics, Probability and Statistics, General Biology, Quantitative Chemical Analysis, General Bacteriology, Organic Chemistry, Organic Chemistry Laboratory, and General Physiology.

The student, while at Linfield, would also complete all the basic courses necessary for a Linfield degree.

When the student goes to Good Samaritan Hospital for his final year of study, he would be concerned with urinalysis, hematology, blood banking, clinical chemistry, bacteriology, serology, and histology.

In addition some of his course work would be involved with advanced clinical chemistry, electrocardiography, clinical isotope chemistry, the donor process at Red Cross Blood Centers, and the management of a clinical laboratory.

This affiliation makes the second link between Linfield and Good Samaritan in less than a year. Last summer the Linfield-Good Samaritan Graduate Studies Program was started with the Laboratory of Neurophysiology at Good Samaritan. The first student in this program will receive a master of science degree from Linfield next month.

Bonneville Power Okayed

PORTLAND (UPI) — The Interior Department said today it has approved low-cost Bonneville power to southern Idaho and parts of Wyoming, Utah and Nevada. The announcement said that, effective immediately, power generated at federal hydroelectric projects in the 61,000-square-mile Upper Snake region will be marketed by the Bonneville Power Administration rather than the Bureau of Reclamation.

The department said Bonneville will make its standard wholesale rates effective in the new area "as rapidly as possible," with a target date of Sept. 1, 1963.

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LEAVING — Mrs. Ruth Dyer, Klamath County Home Economics Extension Agent since January, 1958, has resigned to join her husband, Larry Dyer, in the San Francisco Bay Area in late June. She will attend commencement at California State Polytechnic College, San Luis Obispo, June 15, when her husband will receive his BA degree in air conditioning and refrigeration engineering.

Ruth Dyer Resigns Position In Home Extension Service

Mrs. Ruth G. Dyer, home economist, extension service in Klamath County, will retire to private life in June. She has been in extension work since her graduation in 1950 from the University of Minnesota.

Before coming to Klamath County in 1958, she was county home agent in East Otter Tail and Douglas counties in Minnesota, where she worked with 4-H and adult home programs. In Douglas County there were 500 women enrolled in 40 homemaker groups and 450 boys and girls in 24 4-H clubs.

She returned to the University of Minnesota to further her education in her chosen field and married Larry J. Dyer, who will graduate in air conditioning and refrigeration engineering from California State Polytechnic Institute with a BA June 15.

After a brief time in Klamath Falls, Mr. and Mrs. Dyer will leave for the San Francisco Bay area where Dyer will be associated with Pacific Fruit Express in

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(San Francisco, July 1 as assistant refrigeration engineer. During the time Mrs. Dyer has been in Klamath County in the home economics extension program, units have been increased to 22 with an enrollment of approximately 500 women. She has worked closely with the groups, promoting increased interest in many areas of homemaking and family living.

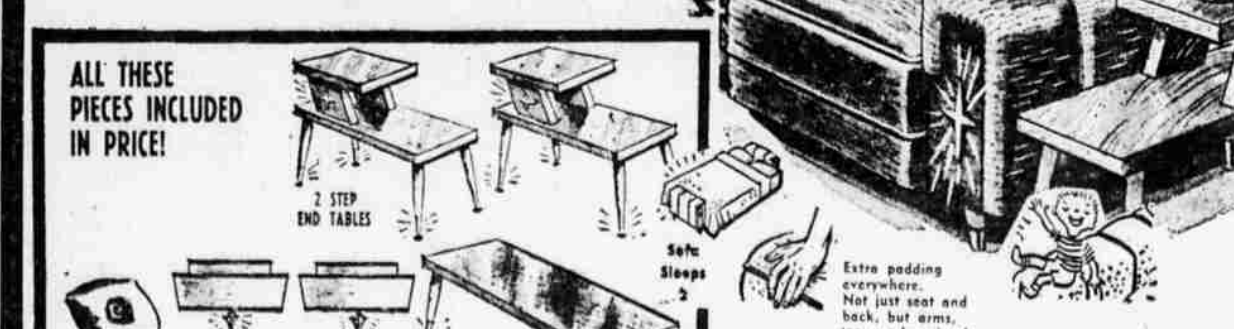
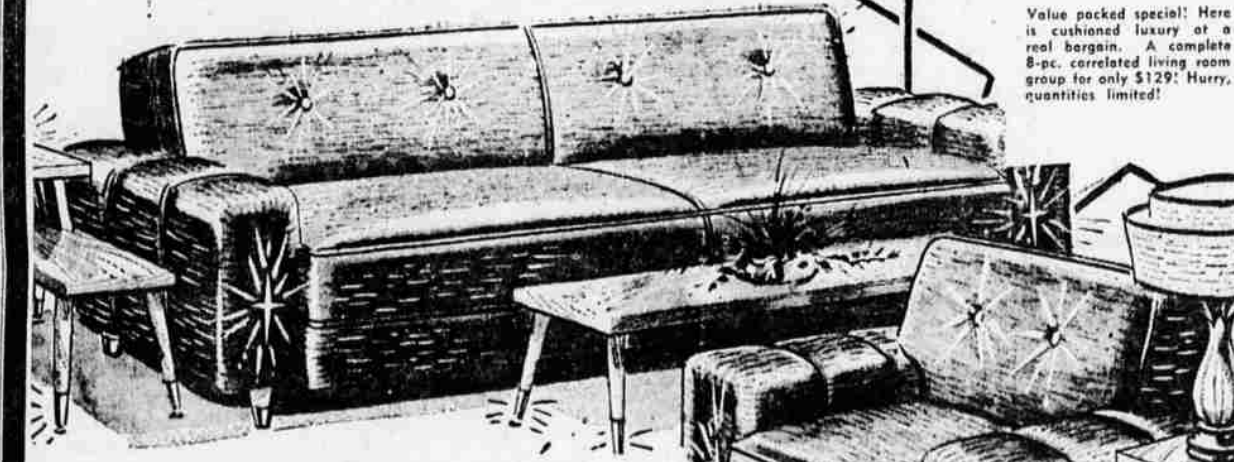
She is a member of the Oregon Home Demonstration Agent's Association, Oregon Home Economics Association, American Association of University Women, Klamath Falls Soroptimist Club, Epsilon Sigma Phi, national extension fraternity for 10 or more years of service. Traditionally, Mrs. Dyer is also eligible for graduation with a PHT (Pushing Hubby Through) degree. Diplomas verifying that the recipient "has completed the major project of badgering, admiring, overseeing, praising, and otherwise aiding and assisting her husband to complete the requirements for a baccalaureate degree from college," are to be presented to 125 wives at a special commencement on June 9.

She will accept the degree in absentia.

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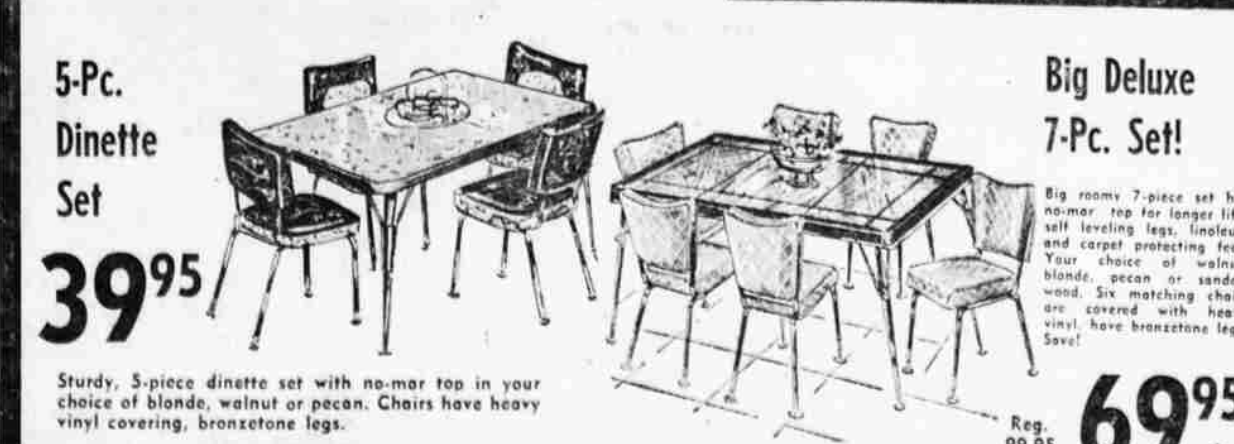
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
