

Liz's Film Income Tops \$10 Million

NEW YORK (UPI) — An announcement that actress Elizabeth Taylor can expect to make nearly \$10 million from the film "Cleopatra" turned the normally staid annual stockholders' meeting of the 20th Century-Fox Film Corp. into a catcalling, whistling session Tuesday.

The announcement, made by company President Darryl F. Zanuck, also was greeted by a demand from stockholder Evelyn Davis for the person responsible for the actress' "ridiculously large contract."

"It was her going price," Zanuck explained.

Stockholder Gloria Parker got into a pushing, screaming argument with Miss Davis when Miss Parker suggested that the film star be made a member of the board of directors because "this girl has done a lot for our corporation."

Zanuck, who directed the \$34 million film, promised never to make a picture "as costly as long as I am a member of the board or president of the corporation." The veteran movie director wrestled control of the company last year from Spyros P. Skouras.

Zanuck reported a net loss from the firm's operations last year of \$39,766,094. He said 20th was starting to recover from these reverses and showed earnings of \$2,292,000 or 90 cents a share for the first quarter of 1963.

"I will consider my job as being successful only when we have reached the point where we are logically justified in paying cash dividends," he said.

Zanuck said Miss Taylor's salary was \$1,725,000, plus 10 per cent of the gross earnings from the film. Richard Burton, her costar, got \$250,000 plus overtime, he said. To break even, the film will have to earn a gross of \$62 million, Zanuck said.

Study Colors Tax Picture

It's summer school time again and many teachers will be thinking about educational expenses as a federal income tax deduction.

Expenses for education, Director of Internal Revenue A. G. Erickson said today, are deductible if the course or courses are for improving skills required by the person in his job, or in meeting requirements set by the employer.

But expenses are not deductible if the education or training is undertaken to obtain a new position, or to attain general educational improvement.

If you travel as a form of education, your expenditures will generally be considered as primarily personal in nature and not deductible. This includes travel as a form of education while on sabbatical leave.

Deductible school expenses are to be claimed on Page 2 of Form 1040 if you itemize your deductions. They cannot be claimed if the standard deduction is used.

On the other hand, the cost of travel, meals, and lodging while away from home overnight for qualified educational activities are deductible on Page 1 of the return 1040, whether or not the standard deduction is used.

There are many situations involving educational expenses which would or would not be deductible. If a teacher has any specific question, it is suggested he either write or call his nearest Internal Revenue office.

Service Suit Won By Negro

PORTLAND (UPI) — A Circuit Court jury Monday awarded \$500 to Mrs. Vivian James, a Negro woman, who filed suit against a tavern under the state's civil rights statute saying she had been refused service.

She was given the award from James and Bessie Barr, owners of the Lombard Inn. They testified the woman had been refused service because she was intoxicated.

Winema Forest Work Summarized

A summary of work projects on the Winema National Forest resulting from the Accelerated Public Works program was issued today by Forest Supervisor Alex Smith.

Both contract and force account work programs have been utilized to provide an orderly work program.

The program has allowed us to forge ahead, Smith said, on a number of projects which would not have been within reach for several years. These include additional housing at both Chiloquin and Chemult ranger stations, water system and restroom facilities at Lake of the Woods, range fences, timber stand improvement projects, and other campground developments.

Three major contracts are underway at the present time; two residences and an equipment storage building are being constructed at the Chemult Ranger Station under an Accelerated Public Works contract. M. R. Holst of Oakridge, Ore., is the contractor.

On the Chiloquin Ranger Station site the Kyle Construction Company of Portland is building three two-bedroom residences and an equipment storage building also under an Accelerated Public Works contract, and at the Aspen Point Campground at Lake of the Woods, Eldon Alt of Klamath Falls is about to start construction on six restroom facilities.

Nearly 1,000 acres of immature Ponderosa Pine forest have been

thinned in a winter project which provided over 75 man-months of extra employment to Klamath County residents.

In total the Accelerated Public Works Program on the Winema Forest has provided over 150 man-months of employment. This includes both the force account and contract time. This figure is growing each day as the contract construction proceeds. All of the current force account projects have been completed.

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Kennedy In, Students Out

BURBANK, Calif. (UPI)—President Kennedy is in, but 600 high school students are out.

School officials confirmed Tuesday that a \$1,000-a-couple Democratic fund-raising dinner June 7 featuring the President had bumped an \$18-a-couple high school graduation prom from the grand ballroom of the Beverly Hilton Hotel.

Vernon H. Weybright, principal of John Burroughs Senior High School, said the class made arrangements for the ballroom about a year ago. He said the hotel notified the school Monday of the change.

Eugene Wyman, chairman of the Democratic State Central Committee, was startled when told by United Press International of the mix-up.

"Oh God, no," was his immediate reaction. He was profusely apologetic.

"I deeply regret any inconvenience caused the students," he said. "I had no knowledge the school had made arrangements to use the room. If it had been called to my attention earlier we could have moved our dinner."

The school principal said all the students were not reconciled to the change, "but most of the students were aware of the problem and reacted as a group."

"After all," said the student body president with the courtesy of one chief executive to another, "it is the President of the United States and we have some responsibility to recognize the problem and accommodate him."

House Funs With Rules

SALEM (UPI)—The Committee on Natural Resources budget which included funds for the Rogue River Coordination Board, was sent back to committee today after a rules battle in the House.

Shortly before the measure came up for consideration, Speaker Clarence Barton turned the chair over to Rep. Joe Rogers, R-Independence. The session has been punctuated with rules clashes between Barton and Rogers.

When the budget measure was presented, Rep. William Holmstrom, D-Gearhart, said it violated House rules to include the Rogue River budget because the bill had been "indefinitely postponed," and therefore was still technically under consideration by the house.

There followed a tangle over technicalities that resulted in several of Rogers' rulings being overturned by votes of the full house.

When Rogers pleadingly commented "The chair would accept a motion for a five-minute recess," House members roared with laughter, then voted to reject the plea.

Barton, who for months has been the victim of Rogers' use of rules technicalities, sat placidly puffing his pipe throughout most of the 20-minute uproar.

As soon as the measure was sent back to Ways and Means, Barton resumed the chair and commented "We must all have our baptism of fire."

RAPS BRITISH ATTITUDE

LONDON (UPI)—Prince Philip, noting reports that Britons are "malicious and intolerant" toward foreigners, said Wednesday they should mend their ways.
