

McNamara's TFX Award Said Not 'Supportable'

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A former Pentagon employee said today that McNamara had "no real supportable" technical case for awarding the TFX fighter plane contract to General Dynamics Corp.

Albert W. Blackburn, a former Marine major and test pilot who worked on the TFX contract, also implied that in the final competitive round, General Dynamics' design was the superior design.

Use Of Federal Troops In Southland Threatened By Kennedy

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy said Wednesday he would be reluctant to order federal troops to enforce desegregation of the Alabama State University, but he would have "no choice" other than to defend the court order to admit Negroes.

The President told a news conference that he hoped Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace would follow suit.

"These decisions must be enforced," Kennedy said.

He said he cannot believe that Wallace "wants to send federal troops" or "marches to do this."

But the President emphasized that he is "obligated to carry out his plan in Tuesday's referendum."

He said there would be no other chance for a wheat referendum next year and that means it could be seen what the economic effect would be from the choice made by the farmers, who turned down administration proposals to couple strict control with price supports.

—He said defeat of the wheat program will have little effect on prices paid by the consumer.

—Kennedy said the National Aeronautics and Space Administration "will make the final judgment" on whether there will be another space flight in the Project Mercury program. He said the Mercury astronauts told him while they were in town earlier this week that they feel another flight would be worthwhile and "useful."

Kennedy was asked whether Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York, Gov. George Romney of Michigan and Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona "in your experience" look like Republican presidential candidates in 1964.

Kennedy laughed and said with a broad grin: "I would say that if the call of the party came to any one of them they would answer the call."

He paused for a minute, then added, still grinning: "And that's about my position too."

—The President described as "completely untrue" suggestions that the United States might be planning to abandon its Guantanamo Naval Base in Cuba. He was commenting on a statement last weekend by Republican National Chairman William F. Buckley Jr. that he thought there was "political motivation" in GOP questions raised about Guantanamo. He said such action had never been considered.

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Controversial Tennessee Valley Project Conceived In Depths Of 'Great Depression'

EDITOR'S NOTE: The Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) Act became law May 18, 1933. Now, 31 major dams make up the integrated water control system in the Tennessee Valley for flood control, navigation and power, and one major dam is under construction. The following dispatch traces TVA's origin, progress, its effect on the people and its potentials.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (UPI)—Thirty years ago this June, when the nation was gripped by the "great depression," three men began to plan a project that would change the life of a vast area of the South.

It was not a depression-burn idea of the Roosevelt New Deal. Thirty years earlier, in 1903, President Theodore Roosevelt vetoed a bill for private development of the Muscle Shoals power site on the Tennessee River.

The TVA idea was not simply to control floods, generate electric power, conserve and use natural resources or operate the huge fertilizer plants at Muscle Shoals.

Roughly, the job was to take an area of the country that was in bad shape economically, agriculturally and industrially and create opportunities where none existed.

When A. E. Morgan, Harcourt A. Morgan and David E. Lilien, that sat down in that Washington hotel room 30 years ago they didn't need desks or fancy furniture. They were setting up a government agency that had little to do with Washington and would be responsible to the President and the congress for results.

The law establishing the Tennessee Valley Authority specified that its headquarters be remote from Washington, placed among the people with whom TVA was to work.

The TVA's job was to take an area of the country that was in bad shape economically, agriculturally and industrially and create opportunities where none existed.

Some control had to be established immediately over the Tennessee River — 600 miles of raging water once called America's "worst river." The Tennessee River was stripping away the fertile soil of the mountains and the red clay of the cotton lands and pouring it into the Ohio and Mississippi. It was single crop farm economy — tobacco and cotton — and erosion was a problem as frightening as the agricultural poverty on which it fed.

Scientists at the University of Tennessee knew what was needed on the Bull Run steam plant near the hills into pastures of the electricity — gabling facilities. They needed phosphate and iron ore.

Dams were built and are still building.

High Bumpus, the m.a.s. who grew up on a tenant farm near Paducah, Ky.

And in the end, it gives away nothing but advice.

Red Wagner, the present chairman of the TVA directors, has spent all his professional life with the agency.

"TVA is in no sense a 'do good' agency," he said.

"The future of this region is manufacturing. It is way beyond what any of us has yet visualized and the beauty of it is that there is room to plan. We don't have to build industrial slums. We can see years ahead."
