

Road Work Bids Asked

A bid invitation for construction of approximately four-tenths of a mile of road in the vicinity of Lost Creek on the Klamath Ranger District was announced May 22 by A. E. Smith, forest supervisor. The proposed project will connect the Lost Creek timber sale road, which has been constructed through a timber harvesting program, with the existing Pelican Butte road.

This short section of road will provide an important tie in the forest transportation system, Smith said, which was not possible through timber sale procedures.

Interested bidders may pick up plans and specifications at the office of the forest supervisor, 411 Main Street, Klamath Falls, or from the office of the regional forester in Portland.

Bid opening has been set for 2 p.m. Pacific Daylight Time June 14, 1961. All bids should be received by that date.

Children Made Guards In Filthy Cuban Jails

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Ten-year-old children armed with machine guns are serving as guards at dank, rat-infested Cuban prisons, according to a report of the Inter-American Human Rights Commission.

A two-million-word report released Thursday said the treatment of the estimated 60,000 prisoners in Castro jails was "humiliating, oppressive and despotic."

One girl said there was no sunlight in the prison, and "the place was full of big rats, mice, mosquitoes, flies, cockroaches and frogs...I woke up with my body all covered with blotches from bites."

The report said testimony from prisoners "specifically indicated that the complaints were more serious concerning the treatment of female prisoners."

The girl was one of them.

UN Fights To Retain Solvency

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (UPI) — The United Nations, confronted with its gravest crisis since the Korean War or Russia's 1960 drive for a "troika" administration, made slow progress today toward solving its financial crisis.

It was U.S. Ambassador Adlai E. Stevenson who told the Latin American countries in a private meeting Thursday that Russia's sweeping extension of its "no pay" policy to include other budgetary items confronted the world organization with one of its situations.

Appeals For Unity

Stevenson appealed for the same unity that created the U.N. Command in Korea and that overwhelmingly defeated the Soviet attempt to put in a hamstringing "troika" administration — so dubbed after the famed three-horse Russian sleigh teams.

The Latins listened to Stevenson — as the 56-nation Afro-Asian group listened to Soviet Ambassador Nikolai T. Fedorenko the day before — but there was little indication that either group was won over.

Consultations on a financial formula continued as the General Assembly's Budgetary Committee went back into session after a one-day lay-off, with China the only listed speaker.

Aggravates Crisis

Fedorenko aggravated the financial crisis at the committee's last previous meeting on Wednesday after he announced that, in addition to refusing to pay a single kopeck for U.N. peace-keeping operations in the Congo and the Middle East, Russia would withhold payment on other budgetary items. These included interest and retirement payments on the \$137 million U.N. emergency bond issue; the world organization's activities in Korea and Palestine; the U.N. Field Service, and contributions on the technical assistance program except in red rubles to pay only for Soviet technicians and materials used in the development schemes.

Stevenson, dramatically emphasizing the grave consequences of Russia's new position — which would cost the nearly bankrupt United Nations an additional \$1.16 million a year in contributions — declared that the current special assembly session must find ways of financing the Congo and Middle East programs for the rest of this year. Secretary General Thant has requested \$42.5 million for that purpose.

Cotton Legislation Okay Expected After 5 Months

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The chairman of the House Agricultural Committee appeared confident today he had enough votes to insure committee passage of new cotton legislation after five months of bickering.

Chairman Harold D. Cooley, D-N.C., predicted enough Democrats would support him in approving the measure providing a multi-million dollar subsidy for the nation's textile mills.

Any Republican effort to tie new wheat legislation to the cotton bill also would be defeated, Cooley indicated.

Stayton Firm Given Contract

Rex Kimsey Construction Company of Stayton, Ore., has been awarded a contract for construction of a central pumping and water system in the Lake of the Woods recreation area. It was announced today by A. E. Smith, forest supervisor.

The contract price for the water system which will serve the national forest campgrounds along the east shore of Lake of the Woods was \$17,203. Work on the installation is expected to begin in the near future.

buyers by August, 1964, the measure would provide an additional 10 per cent price support on the first 15 bales to help the small grower.

A provision that no price support could exceed the present 32.5 cents per pound also would be included.

The bill also contains a provision to enable growers to plant additional acreage up to 20 per cent over the national allotment when the allotment reaches 17 million acres.

Other congressional news:

Information — A House government information subcommittee holds its first secret session in its eight year history when it calls Roger Hilsman, assistant secretary of state for Far Eastern affairs, for testimony. The subcommittee, which is conducting a study of government information policies, said the closed session was necessary for security reasons.

War Claims — Prospects were brighter today that the House would accept a Senate rider to make a lump sum payment of \$72 million to the Philippine government for war claims instead of paying the money to individuals. If the House rejects the Senate amendment to a House passed spending authorization bill, it must be returned to a House-Senate Conference Committee.

Debt — The Senate Finance Committee Thursday approved stopgap legislation to raise the national debt ceiling to a record \$309 billion. The group made one change in the House passed bill — to extend the \$309 billion temporary ceiling a full 12 months until June 30, 1964, instead of terminating it on Aug. 31, 1963, as voted by the House. If the Senate approves the committee change, the bill may go to a conference committee.

Shelters — A House armed services subcommittee has scheduled hearings starting Tuesday on President Kennedy's controversial fallout shelter program. Last year, the President was unable to persuade House or Senate even to consider legislation to authorize the mass shelter program he believes necessary. There was no indication now that Congress, traditionally cool to civil defense,

Sugar Price Probe Eyed By Congress

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A congressional subcommittee today began an investigation into soaring sugar prices and the government tried to discourage housewives from hoarding.

Sugar prices leaped as high as 83 cents for five pounds and grocers in some areas cut purchase limits on sugar when their sales suddenly doubled.

But the Agriculture Department assured housewives there is plenty of sugar "either in hand or in sight" to meet national needs.

Chairman Wright Patman, D-Tex., of the House Banking Committee said late Thursday he had ordered a subcommittee on con-

sumer affairs to begin hearings on the price increases early next month.

The price increases involved a complicated world sugar situation.

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
