Oregon Retains Big Hopes

EUGENE (UPI) — Oregon kept its Northern Division baseball title hopes alive by coming from behind to edge Oregon State 2-1 in 12 innings in the second game of a doubleheader Friday.

Oregon State won the first game 3-0.

The decisions left the defending champion Beavers with a 10-3 record and the Ducks with a 9-4 mark. They ended their regular seasons and the division title race with a doubleheader at Corvallis today.

Oregon won the second game when winning pitcher Wally Palmberg squeezed home Eric Hardin from third base in the 12th inning. Hardin doubled and was sent to third on a single by Ken Jensen.

Palmberg pitched six innings of hitless relief.

The Ducks sent the nightcap into extra innings on consecutive, two-out singles by Fred Pettengill, Cal Dean and Ed Vetter in the seventh inning.

In the first contest, Cecil Ira pitched a three-hitter and Al Lehner slammed a two-run homer for Oregon State.

Rangers Roosting Atop PCL's Heap

They make 'em big in Texas and the Dallas-Fort Worth Rangers of the Pacific Coast League are no exception.

Seemingly out of nowhere the Rangers came to roost today atop the Southern Division after winning 13 of their last 17 games. The Texans became the fourth team to hold first place in the tighter Southern Division since the beginning of the season.

Hawaii knocked San Diego out of first place Friday with a 7-2 win while the Rangers tallied two wins in the ninth to beat Denver, 6-4.

In other contests, Ken McMullen drove in four runs to give Spokane an 8-4 comeback victory over Portland. Tacoma scored six unearned runs in one inning to top Seattle 10-8, and Oklahoma City's Jim Golden fired a six-hit bid to tame Salt Lake City 4-1.

On May 8, Dallas-Fort Worth was in last place in its division with a miserable 9-14 record. Seventeen days later the Texans were in the king's room with a 22-18 mark. Only 4½ games separate the Rangers from last place Salt Lake City.

How come the rapid rise? Mainly because Ranger Manager Jack McKeon shows little patience with his pitchers. Once one of them falters, in comes another.

Other reasons are the timely hitting of outfielder Joe Nosske and infielders Ray Jablonski and Cesar Tovar. Jablonski, a veteran of the National League, leads the club in homers with nine. Nosske is batting around .320 and Pepito Tovar, a Venezuelan, is matching Nosske's average.

Tovar's line single to center scored the winning run for the Rangers in the ninth inning Friday. The Texans capitalized on three Denver errors in the ninth to score two runs. The loss snapped Denver's five-game win streak. Reliever Don Williams (5-2) was the winner.

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Yankees Retain Walker Cup

TURNBERRY, Scotland (UPI) —The United States, led by Billy Joe Patton, Labron Harris Jr., and Charlie Coe, staged a stirring comeback Saturday to retain the Walker Cup, 12-8, crushing Britain's amateur golfers by sweeping the four foursome matches and winning five of the eight singles.

Trailing 6-3 after Friday's play, the U.S. stars played brilliantly as their game improved with the weather. They won the first seven matches Saturday to clinch the cup—the 18th time America has won it in the 19 times the international golf competition has been held.

It wasn't until the U.S. had built up an 11-8 lead Saturday that Britain was able to win a match. David Sheahan of Ireland defeating Richard Davies of Pebble Beach, Calif., 1 up.

Then the U.S. won another singles, halved the next, and Britain was able to win a match, nailing the final singles match when Ronnie Shade of Ireland defeated Downing Gray of Pensacola, Fla., 2 and 1.

U.S. Game Improved
The U.S. golfers lost no time Saturday in showing the Brits that their game had improved along with the weather.

Patton of Morganton, N.C., and Dick Sikes of Springdale, Ark., started the Americans off on the right foot in the morning foursomes play when they defeated Mike Bonalack of England and Stuart Murray of Scotland, 1 up, under overcast skies which later cleared. But the weather was in direct contrast to Friday's when the British found the rain and wet fairways and greens to their liking.

Then came victories by Downing Gray of Pensacola, Fla., and Harris, of Stillwater, Okla., over Sheahan and Michael Hunt of England, 3 and 2; by Bob Gardner, Essex Falls, N.J., and Dr. Edgar Updegraff of Tucson, Ariz., over Charles Green and Sandy Saddler, both of Scotland, 3 and 1; and by Deane Beaman of Bethesda, Md., and Coe of Oklahoma City over David Madeley of Ireland and Shade, 3 and 2.

Kept Streak Going
Patton kept the winning streak going by beating Murray in the first of the eighth singles matches, 3 and 2. It was Patton's third victory in the two-day affairs, tying him with Harris and Coe as the U.S. leading point-winners.

Updegraff then defeated Joe Carr of Ireland, 4 and 3, and when Harris beat Bonalack, 3 and 2, America was assured of a tie.

Then Gardner, a last-minute substitute for Charley Smith of Gastonia, N.C., beat Hunt, 3 and 2, and the British saw their hopes of victory dashed again.

Gardner was called on when Smith was forced to withdraw after his back ailment flared up again.

After Sheahan broke the U.S. victory string, Coe added to the U.S. margin by defeating Green, 4 and 3, and Beaman halved his match with Saddler. It was the fourth half of the matches and they did not count in the point standings.

Shade closed out the matches with his triumph over Gray—but it was far too little and too late.

Laughlin and teammate Bob Woodie, who shot 72-76-148 were named to the all-district team along with Paul Vetsch and Mike O'Toole of PSC, Chuck Arnold of Linfield and Ron Getchell, Southern Oregon.

Willamette will compete in the NAIA championships at Kansas City June 4-8.

Willamette University scored a seven-stroke victory in the NAIA District 2 golf tournament at Ilwaco Hills Country Club Friday.

The Bearcats had a 603 score with Mike Laughlin's 75-71-148 leading the way. Portland State was second at 610, followed by Linfield at 639, Lewis and Clark at 652, Oregon College of Education at 687 and Southern Oregon at 694.
