Light-Fingered Brink's Guard Nabbed With Cash

PHOENIX, Ariz. (UPI) — The party was over Saturday for a moonlighting Brink's armored guard accused of stealing more than \$70,000 for a fling in the Arizona sunshine.

Arthur Henry Page, 51, a trusted Brink's employee for 11 years, was arrested Thursday night at a swank motel where his high living had failed to arouse suspicion.

He was turned over to Federal Bureau of Investigation agents after a policeman spotted his car—listed on wanted circulars—in the parking lot of the Sands Motel. An acting U.S. commissioner ordered him held on \$50,000 bond Friday at an arraignment.

Page had been living lavishly here for about a month, with two expensive automobiles, a glittering \$2,000 wardrobe and two living quarters—a \$20 to \$30-a-day motel room and an apartment in the suburban university town of Tempe, agents said.

\$32,000 Left

An estimated \$32,000 in cash and property was located in Page's room, safety deposit boxes and several bank accounts.

One of Page's cars, a 1959 Cadillac, was loaned to a girlfriend. Agents sought both the woman

De Gaulle Shadows NATO Talk

OTTAWA (UPI) — The long shadow of French President Charles de Gaulle fell across the meeting here last week of the NATO ministerial council.

None of the visiting NATO leaders mentioned the basic split on European strategy and policy between the aloof French president and his British-American allies.

The conferees were most careful, however, to avoid digging into any issues which might widen the breach.

The council's action in reorganizing existing nuclear forces in Europe to give NATO a more direct hand in managing them was accepted with amused tolerance by the French, represented by Foreign Minister Couve de Murville.

The French agreed to go along with the plan when Secretary of State Dean Rusk and British Foreign Secretary Lord Home promised not to trumpet it as a big NATO-wide "integration" of nuclear forces, which De Gaulle opposes.

Rusk said the "assignment" of Britain's nuclear bombers and three American Polaris submarines to NATO was an "important step." But he acknowledged that its value was principally "psychological."

The "considerable wall" packed by these bombers and submarines already was available in Europe. The new plan simply gave the NATO commander a more direct hand in targeting arrangements.

The psychological gain stems from the part of the plan which assigns European officers of NATO to the nuclear staff at NATO headquarters and to the liaison group at U.S. Strategic Air Command headquarters in Omaha.

As Rusk explained, this gave the non-U.S. members of NATO, for the first time, a direct sense of participation in planning nuclear strategy against missiles behind the Iron Curtain which are aimed at Europe.

Spring Crops Stunted By Eastern Cold Snap

Scattered frost was expected in northeast valleys Saturday in the wintry cold snap that has cut deeply into spring crops.

The Weather Bureau said a "slow warming trend" would ease the possibility of more damage to fruit and vegetable crops throughout the Ohio Valley. But a new storm in the northern plains threatened to drive more arctic air eastward.

Heavy rainstorms swept Florida again during the night and 1 1/2 inches fell at normally dry Reno, Nev. Nearly an inch of rain fell at Cocoa Beach and Daytona Beach, Fla.

Scattered showers and thunderstorms spread westward from Tennessee across the Ozarks and Central Plains. Nearly an inch fell at Walnut Ridge, Ark., and West Plains, Mo.

The three-day onslaught of record-breaking low temperatures across the nation's northeast may have repercussions at the market place.

The cold wave coupled with the harsh winter may give Michigan its smallest cherry crop in a decade and boost prices at grocery counters.

Wine producers in western New York assessed freeze damage to the \$100 million grape crop today. One producer said 15 or 20 percent of the crop had already been destroyed by freezes earlier this month.

Farmers in Erie and Chautauque counties hired helicopters to fly above strawberry and grape fields Friday, warming the air with their rotor blades and disturbing frost pockets.

Thousands of acres of cherry trees in Door County, Wis., were subjected to temperatures as low as 19 degrees this week. Growers had been counting on a good crop to take up the slack left by damage to Michigan cherry trees.

Market Suffers First Setback In 12 Weeks

NEW YORK (UPI) — While most Wall Street soothsayers were preoccupied with predicting a higher stock market last week, stocks themselves were quietly suffering their first setback in twelve weeks.

The turnabout was nearly as tricky as a magician's sleight-of-hand. Even some veteran market observers had to look twice to make sure the popular Dow-Jones industrial average—down 4.28 on the week—hadn't erred in recording the market's action.

What you saw depended upon where you looked.

On some days the overall market outperformed the Dow-Jones averages as could be confirmed by glancing at the advance-decline line or the high-low index and comparing these with the averages.

As a typical example: On Wednesday new highs for the year outnumbered new lows 129 to 12 and advances outweighed declines 596 to 489—yet the D-J industrial average was off 1.20.

Further evidence that interest had switched from the blue chips into a large number of secondary issues could be found by looking at the list of the day's most active stocks. Many of the issues appearing there hadn't been seen on this list in years—and most of them showed at least small gains.

While many of the spokesmen for these companies could find "no reason" for the sudden interest in their company's stock, at least one broker interpreted it this way:

"The phenomenon is probably related to our income tax laws. It usually seems to arrive after six months of a steep market advance when traders have been impatiently waiting to realize profits and seek new movers to switch into."

"On the last two occasions when this happened (1959 and 1961) the speculative phase provided numerous juicy trading opportunities," he added.

With the exception of Monday, when the senior average suffered its worst setback in more than two and a half months on heavy

Saleswoman Not Guilty

PORTLAND (UPI)—Former insurance saleswoman Sara Ann Chaffee has been found innocent of forgery in connection with the sale of an insurance policy to the David Douglas School District here.

A jury returned the verdict Friday after 3 1/2 hours of deliberation.

The Multnomah County Circuit Court immediately granted the state's request for an order holding Mrs. Chaffee as a material witness against her alleged employer, Kenneth Randall of Seattle, Wash.

Randall is in Seattle pending extradition on a forgery indictment.

Mrs. Chaffee was accused of adding unauthorized "riders" to a policy she sold to the school district. The state alleged she used that sale to promote policy sales to some 38 other districts in Oregon and some in Washington.

Mrs. Chaffee testified she was acting under orders and did not know she had done anything wrong.

The case broke when the parent company, California Life Insurance Co., refused to pay claims submitted under the riders.

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Video's guys and dolls primped Saturday for Sunday night's 90-minute spectacular, the tri-city telecast of the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences Emmy awards.

Comedian Joey Bishop, entertainer Arthur Godfrey and newsman Chet Huntley will handle the master of ceremonies chores respectively from Hollywood, New York and Washington.

Emmy presenters in Washington include two senators, the head of the nation's space effort and one of the State Department's top trouble shooters. The Hollywood and New York segments of the show will be handled by show business personalities.

Some 6,000 members of the academy voted for nominees in 28 categories in this, the 15th annual show, which also will see simultaneous parties in San Francisco, Seattle, Wash., and Phoenix, Ariz.
